Nov. 15, 1917.

Dear Mother & all;

I got everything straightened up in  
Bld that Monday P.M. had supper at  
aunt Os and took the train at 10<sup>05</sup> for Van.  
here, we were held up for eight hours a few  
miles above Princeton by a rock slide, thus  
we landed in Van. here at 5<sup>45</sup> P.M. and I  
couldnt find the aerial recruiting office that  
night so stopped at mint zell's and found  
it next a.m. only to find that I was  
about eight hours too late to get in as a  
mechanic and to old for pilot, as they had  
got a wire from the east to take on no more  
mechanics but didn't know any more, and  
might open any day again, so I went right  
down to the P.O. and registered for Exemption

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and on Thursday I met both Jim. & Y.N.  
Ritchie on the street and had a long talk  
with Y.N. and he told me that his son  
told him the artillery were recruiting a few  
and that Cliff McWilliams and Hilton Duister  
were back here again with it, so next  
day I came down and saw them, they told  
~~me~~ when to come around to see the officers and  
who to see, so on Saturday I put my name  
in for a place on the waiting list but chances  
looked slim, I left after both the Barial and  
the Exemption Board but the board refused to  
deal with it untill I could get a note from  
Mr Dennis, Registrar, as I had made a mistake  
in putting the claim thru the P.C. as then it  
had to go thru Dennis office or there would likely  
be a mix up. I didn't get the note, in fact did  
not try, but made up my mind I'd get a  
job here and keep in touch with the arial corps

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On Monday I just tramped around the city  
on Tuesday I went to the Coquihalla ship yard  
and after a time and a lot of waiting etc.  
myself and ~~another~~ young fellow got the  
boss time we wanted and were told to come  
in the morning this was about 1:30 Tuesday  
but instead of going up to join the Union I took  
the car for the park here to see what chances  
were in the Artillery again, I only waited  
a few minutes when I got into the office  
and with only a few words I was accepted  
and signed up by three o'clock and had a big  
part of my kit by three thirty then started  
the marking etc. had supper about 4:30 P.M. then  
filled up the kit and went up town got to  
Aunt Zella's in time for supper so took a cup of  
tea with them, then Uncle told me about the  
artillery calling for me on the phone in the A.M.  
so you see how everything was prepared when

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I handed in. and from the way everything has worked I take it that this is what the Lord was guiding to when I was leaving dear old P.E.I., and what I heard the day I joined from a fellow that had joined the aral Corp but was discharge like Jimmie Moore, that a lot of the mechanics that failed in their trade chance were drafted into the machine, and this is better than that chance.

I haven't been down town the last two days but here fixing up, but expect to be in on Sat. P.M. till Monday A.M. if I wish to stay.

I saw Alice last Friday evening and again Sunday and she is certainly looking plump & fine, I thought better than I have ever seen her.

I was up to J.M's Thursday for supper, they are fine. Have to close as it is lights out time.  
Hoping you are all well as I am and all the rest out here.

Monday Nov. 19, 1917.

Well here I am again, I'll try and get this mailed this time, I did not have a stamp last time and have been kept pretty busy.

On Friday we had pretty hard drill and in the evening a concert or something in which the 68th Battery more than held their own. on Sat. I dressed up in full dress uniform and went to Zell's she was just going out so we both went to the movies which let us out at 6 P.M. Then I went to Hartings street to get some things I needed in camp and got back to Zell's at 7.30 ~~too~~ late for supper after I had some we play checkers and chess till about twelve,

Sunday; Went to Bapt. church in A.T.C.  
& D.D. met Mr & Mrs Hutton & Toy (Mrs Neil)  
or something like that, also Mrs Babitt,  
then had dinner at Uncle (er) then went  
out to see Alice & Jack the first time they  
saw me in uniform, they all thought I looked

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Fine, I had tea with them and stayed till about 8.30 P.M. then started for Zell's and got my kit bag, and while I was away W.J. had called as P. Lilly died sometime last week and he was taking the body home as he expected to go back to night I'll not likely see him.

Alice is looking & feeling fine, so are all at Zell's. I don't know about the others as I haven't been out.

Well I guess I'll close as my news supply has run short, Ok! have you noticed my name in the world lately as I met the City editor at the fair.

Would you send the Family Herald on to me after you finish reading it, or if you don't wish to bother with please have the address changed to me at the fair here.

Has Arch gone before the boards yet, he is the only one left now to make it plain to them that there is two son already in the army

And I think he will get off. please let me know what is doing, it might be well for Constance or you mother to write the board too stating the facts giving our numbers & address so that if they wish to make enquiry they can.

I am going to try and get leave to go home for Xmas and New ~~year~~<sup>year</sup>, if I can only get one I'll try for Xmas unless you folks would rather the new year.

So long for now, will try and ~~wright~~ write every week now since I am getting settled.
