ENGINEERS PRESENT DETAILED REPORT.

Agree on valuation of Development Co.'s and Garnett Valley Land Co.'s Systems.

Development Company's Holdings placed at \$109,000 and Garnett Valley Land Company's at \$23,000---Matter to be submitted to ratepayers for approval---Pound Keeper appointed with instructions to hustle after stray cattle.

There was a special meeting of the municipal council on Nov. 30th when the councillors met with Mr. J. M. Robinson, manager of the Summerland Development Company, for the purpose of receiving the reports of the engineers who have been valuing the holdings of the Summerland Development Company and the Garnett Valley Land Company. The reports in part were as follows:

IRRIGATION SYSTEM.

Summerland Development Company's Irrigation System:

Value of system	\$75,000
Expenditure on same necessary during 1910, before 1911	58,000
When this is done, the net revenue therefrom in '11 and after will be	10,000
Capital value on which a net revenue of \$10,000 is earned, calculated is, say	133,000
Less capital expend're required	58,000
Present value	75,000

Estimated cost of necessary improvements, \$58,000.

The total irrigable area under the system is 4489 acres of which 3484 are sold and on which water rates were paid in 1909. Of the unsold lands, we estimate that 600 acres will be paying rates in the near future and 405 acres not cultivable.

Under the Trout Creek Main and dependent upon it for water supply are 2600 acres, and in addition to this, conveyor is used to augment the supply in Prairie Creek and Aeneas Creek.

There appears to be more than sufficient water in the natural flow of the stream up to the end of June. From our examination of the Headwaters of Trout Creek, there is sufficient storage area to meet demands to end of season.

DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM

In connection with the Domestic Water system the engineers reported—

The value of the works based on the cost of installing, less depreciation is \$17,000.

The net revenue derivable therefrom, without allowing any sinking fund for depreciation is \$705.00, about 4 1-4 per cent on the capital.

The system is capable of extension and incorporation with a general system over the municipality.

ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM.

The total value of the Electric Light plant and equipment was placed at \$17,000.

Net revenue at present derivable therefrom per annum—showing a return of 10 per cent without allowing for a sinking fund, \$1,700.00

The full capacity of the plant is now being used for lighting. The only expansion of revenue from the present plant would be in developing a market for power in the day time.

There are 831 lights connected and there are outlets for 1000.

GARNETT VALLEY SYSTEM.

The value of the Garnett Valley Irrigation system at this date is \$23,000.

The net revenue derivable therefrom

after due allowance for operating, maintenance and improvement sinking fund is \$1950.

There requires to be spent on the system in the immediate future, \$5000.

The capital value on which a net revenue of \$1950.00 is earned, calculated at 7 per cent is \$28,000, less capital expenditure required, \$5000. Present value, \$23,000.

Estimated cost of necessary improvements, \$5000.

AREA UNDER SYSTEM.

The total irrigable area under the system is 950 acres, of which 793 are sold and 157 unsold. Computing the maximum revenue chargeable under the Summerland Development Co.'s contract, \$5 per acre on the whole of the sold lands and on one half of the unsold, there would be 872 acres at \$5 per acre—\$4350.00 gross annual revenue.

A special meeting was held in the council chamber with all the members present.

Communications were received as follows: From J. M. Robinson, manager Summerland Development Co. agreeing to hand over the electric light, domestic water and irrigation system as previously arranged with the municipal council.

Thompson—Gartrell—That the award of the arbitrators employed to report on the irrigation system of the Garnett Valley Land Co. be received and adopted. Carried. Councillor Jas. Ritchie refraining from voting.

Ritchie—Thomson—That G. A. McLaine be and is hereby authorized to see that no stray cattle or horses are allowed to run at large within the municipality, and that his duties shall be to impound all animals found running at large, his remuneration to be the pound fees. Carried.

Thomson—Gartrell—That the clerk be and is hereby instructed to write to the Hon. Price Ellison, the Minister of Lands urging the reservation of the water sheds tributary to Trout Creek and Aeneas Creek and that no pre-emption be granted until a survey is made by the government. Carried.

Council then adjourned until regular meeting, Monday Dec. 6th at 9 a.m.

OPERA SINGERS COMING.

Information Received—Opera Singers Will be Here this (Saturday) Night Sure.

A wire was received on Friday to the effect that the blockade on the C.P.R., had been lifted and they would be able to keep their engagement.

It is safe to say that the Opera Singers are the best organization ever procured for this town, and the public can be assured of a musical treat.

The caste embraces eight persons, among whom are Chas. W. Picquet and Juanito Rnsh. Mr. Picquet is a tenor of reputation and long experience. Although a young man he has been connected with church choirs in the leading American cities, has studied abroad and sang the leading tenor roles with the Herald Square Opera Company and others of note. Miss Rush is a beautiful young woman, with a finished musical education. She likewise received her early training in choir work and completed her studies under the great foreign masters. She was for two seasons the prima donna soprano with the Aborn Opera Company in Washington D.C. where she sang all of the leading roles. Both of these artists would be a credit to any organization and Summerland people are fortunate in being able to hear them.

Work will be started on the Custom house at Revelstoke next spring. The sum of \$10,000 is on the estimates to provide for a start being made with the building and tenders will be called about May next. The estimates also include \$1,500 for replacing the telephone poles and repairs on the Golden-Windermere line and \$14,500 for improvements to the Columbia River.

The Poet cannot find words to explain how a small fire started in one of the bedrooms in the Royal Hotel last Monday evening. The reason was only left to one of our electricians to find out. After investigation it was found that the poet had been warming his bed with one of the incandescent globes of the electric light, which he had carried to the foot of his bed by means of an extension cord. Limping about the room with well cooked feet, he made for the door and gave the alarm. Willing hands came at once to stop a spread of the fire. The damage done was little, but the lesson learned against using the electric light globes as foot-warmers is great.—Orchard City Record.

In the sedate, detached manner characteristic of the proceedings in the gilded chamber and in direct disregard of the advice of some of its ablest members, the house of lords recently created a situation unprecedented in English history for at least 300 years by refusing its formal assent to the budget and referring it to the country itself for judgment, thereby making it illegal to collect taxes and carry on the King's government.

MORE PRIZES FOR B.C.

British Columbia fruit is again to the fore in the Old Country, having been awarded medals at the exhibitions at Bath, Bristol and Crystal Palace, while Mr. W. E. Scott, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, who is in charge of the exhibit, confidently expects that the exhibit will meet with the same success at other exhibitions. There are twenty-four shows at which the fruit will be exhibited, while Mr. Scott is also delivering a series of illustrated lectures at the various exhibitions. Recently he delivered thirteen lectures at Crystal Palace to crowded houses. Of the fruit which carried off these prizes at least 75 per cent. was from the Okanagan.

Local News Items.

T. Wanless of Vernon was in town on business this week.

Mr. James Ritchie has returned from a business trip to the coast.

R. C. Patterson and S. Monk, representatives of the Royal City Mills are at present engaged in putting up one of the sectional houses on Capt. Webb's property.

There is a possibility that a local syndicate will be formed to interest itself in the bringing in of a pure bred hackney stallion for the coming season.

Half a dozen men came in from the northwest on Monday's boat and have gone out to Richardson's mill to work. A large amount of timber is to be converted into boards this season.

Gartrell & Co. beg to intimate that all accounts due to their firm may be paid to J. Downton, butcher, Summerland, and must be paid in full by Dec. 15th, 1909, as after that date they will be placed in a solicitor's hands for collection.

Dr. Smith, medical health officer, made an official trip through the public schools last week and had the youngsters lined up for inspection. He found the general health good. A few cases of inflamed tonsils were noticed, but none of such a character as to be a menace to the rest of the children. For their own sakes, one or two of the youngsters were advised to stay home.

T. Kilpatrick and J. P. Forde of the C. P. R. official staff were in town on Tuesday and made another formal inspection of the site for the proposed new C. P. R. wharf. It is possible that there will be something doing around that quarter shortly after new year. The visitors left on board the Maud Moore for Penticton.

Dr. Smith's launch broke adrift in the big storm on Monday, and in spite of the boisterous condition of the lake, the doctor, assisted by A. S. Hatfield went out after her and succeeded in getting hold of her before she drifted onto the sand. The return journey was made amid a shower of surf and the launch was eventually tied up on the lee side of the wharf.

The reptile can be scotched before its Python coils grow so thick that even Teddy and his big stick would make but little impression on it.

If the Laurier government should enact such legislation as would forever throttle the merger octopus, it would thereby atone for some errors of the past years. The fact is mergers aim at the very life of the nation, and when the people fight them they are fighting for their own liberties. We have but to look at the United States to behold how this obnoxious infant of yesterday has grown into the national bully of today. When Standard Oil taught the world something new; when, in place of the previous "combines" from which some member more unscrupulous than the rest, would bolt and undersell till in self defence the others had to follow suit, Mr. Rockefeller came forward with a proposition to merge the various industries into one, the various proprietors to take stock in the new and common company. From this no one could bolt; in it no one could undersell the other, and once the leading manufacturers had come together the little fellows followed with "the big pistol" at their heads, till at last one corporation controlled the oil supply of the nation and fixed its prices where it wished.

Leaders in other large industries seeing how this worked to make millionaires, cheerfully followed a similar course, and in a few years the nation woke up to find that

a handful of men controlled the oil supply; another handful the steel; another handful the coal; still another the sugar, and yet another the tobacco. In each case the little fellow had his option of coming to terms, selling out at a very low valuation, or of being ruined. The merger or trust absolutely controlled prices and output, and the common people, once protected by those natural forces of supply and demand and competition, which, in a state of freedom operate as balances and checks on one another, now found themselves as lambs among wolves—intelligent human wolves that said among themselves, "Let us not kill them, let us keep them alive that they may grow wool for our markets."

At first the trust or merger looked like simply another degree in the natural evolution of trade, like big things being handled in a big way, numerous little plants and less able men giving place to larger plants with highest expert superintendence and big capital. They were defended on this ground. But unfortunately they have evolved in another unexpected and altogether cursed direction that makes them in a new and peculiar way, the enemy of us all. And that is this: the control of the financial markets of the nation.

The control of each of these vast industries means the control of vast sums of money. Put them together and you control the wealth of the nation. Whoever controls the wealth of the nation can dictate terms to the government of the nation, since the nation cannot afford to have its banks all closed and business generally suspended. And this is very nearly the situation today in the States. A financial panic can be precipitated on us whenever the trust managers give the sign. Stocks fall and are gathered in by them at sacrifice prices. Then up with her again; good times once more; good prices for stocks; good time to unload; then order another panic and buy them all over again, and so on till the rich become rich to bursting and the poor become poorer to serfdom.

The Canadian egg of this octopus is now being hatched and if Mr. Laurier and his government will see that it is promptly crushed, he will have accomplished the most blessed and far reaching work of his political career, if not of his generation. The work can be done easily if it be done today; tomorrow it will be done with difficulty if at all, and we shall behold the humiliating spectacle of the people's representatives sparring for wind in some engagement with the serpent they have coddled and warmed.

STRATHCONA TRUST.

A lengthy circular letter has been received from the department of the Hon. Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia and chairman of the Executive Council of the Strathcona Trust for the encouragement of physical training in the public schools, the object of which is to fully explain the aims and objects of the Trust.

The object is twofold; (1) the improvement of the physical and intellectual capabilities of the children while at school, by means of a proper system of physical training calculated to improve their physical development, and, at the same time, to inculcate habits of alertness, orderliness and prompt obedience; (2) the fostering of a spirit of patriotism in the boys, leading them to realize that the first duty of a free citizen is to be prepared to defend his country—to which end all boys should, so far as possible, be given an opportunity of acquiring a fair acquaintance, while at school, with Military Drill and rifle shooting.

No provincial pledge is necessary and the movement must not be considered as in any way compulsory military training.

As stated above, one of Lord Strathcona's main objects is to inculcate a spirit of patriotism in the youths of this country, together with a realization of their duty as free citizens in its defence, and, consequently, their training in the rudiments of a soldier's art is, in his opinion, desirable in order that they may be able to give proper expression to that spirit in time of national danger.

Briefly the conditions are as follows: Physical training to form part of the school curriculum; teachers to be bound to instruct; the Departments of Education to encourage the undertaking; to adopt British public school system with necessary modification, the Militia Department to aid in instruction of teachers until such time as provincial authorities are able to undertake the matter for themselves.

The Department of Militia agrees to pay the authorized grant to teachers qualified and acting as instructors of Cadet Corps.

For the whole of Canada the yield of potatoes is 99,087,200 bushels, which is 25,297,500 bushels more than last year. Turnips are reported at 107,724,600 bushels, being 6,476,600 bushels more than last year. The hay and clover crop is 427,100 tons more than last year, its total yield being 11,877,100 tons. Fodder corn shows a decrease of 148,500 tons, the crop being 2,779,500 tons. Sugar beet yields 10,000 tons.

ELOCUTIONARY ENTERTAINMENT.

On Monday evening last, under the auspices of the Okanagan Lyceum in connection with the college, Mr. W. Eugene Knox, the well known elocutionist, gave a thoroughly enjoyable entertainment in the Men's Club Room, to a fairly good audience.

Mr. C. S. Stevens introduced Mr. Knox with a few brief remarks, and for about an hour and a half without a single stop or rest, this talented gentleman kept the audience fascinated and thoroughly interested.

In all he gave nine selections of which undoubtedly the most clever were "Rubeinstein at the Piano," "The Laughing Apologist" and "The Man with a Cold in his Head who is Moon Struck."

It speaks volumes for any entertainer who can keep his audience with him the whole of the time—this Mr. Knox does in a very capable manner.

CONFESSIONAL SECRETS.

Should the secrets exchanged in the confessional be revealed in evidence in court?

The question was answered, or answered in part, by Judge Frank C. Millikin in the third district court recently. After many days deliberation he decided that while the Massachusetts common law exempts a priest testifying to the disclosures made to him by a penitent, the penitent is not forbidden to testify to what he or she may have confessed to the priest.

So Judge Millikin ordered the Rev. Father Manuel De Sousa Travassos, a Portuguese priest of the Roman Catholic church, to pay \$50 damages to Manuel Amancio.

At the trial pretty Mrs. Amancio testified, against the strenuous objection of the priest's counsel, that she confessed to Father Travassos she had been married only by civil rite. The priest told her she was not married at all and she left her husband, who thereupon sued the priest.

Father Travassos promptly appealed from Judge Millikin's decision.

During his short term of residence in Summerland, the doctor has become very popular with all classes of people, and all unite with the Review in wishing Dr. and Mrs. Andrew a long and happy married life.

LOTS OF CARIBOU.

Charley Paddock and Frank Whitney returned from a caribou hunt on the west side of the river. They killed 16 caribou between them, and have them enroute to West Dawson in charge of a freighter.

The two nimrods report at least 250 caribou have been killed between Dawson and Fortymile house, and say that this is not a drop in the bucket compared to the herds ranging there. However the animals are far from Dawson and it requires considerable difficult mushing to get to them.

Paddock says the animals are to be seen in every direction near Fortymile house, and that it is impossible to estimate the total number.

Some of the Moosehide Indians are back from the hunt with a large number of the caribou, which they are storing at West Dawson, where they will keep them until the river closes. They eat the front quarters and sell the hind quarters.—Dawson News.

EDITOR CLEMENT BEREAVED.

The sympathy of the district goes out to Mr. W. J. Clement, editor of the Penticton Press, in the loss of his beloved partner in life after only eleven months of married life.

The deceased lady came down the Okanagan less than a year ago, a bride, after having been led to the matrimonial altar in Vancouver. During her short residence in Penticton she became generally beloved by her circle of friends and acquaintances which was numerous, and the entire community mourns with the bereaved husband. The remains were taken to Vancouver for interment.

The Review extends fraternal sympathy to Mr. Clement in his sorrow.

The new ordinance, regulating the twenty-eight saloons and two wholesale liquor houses in Vancouver, Wash., is now in effect. The ordinance prohibits treating, raises the license to \$1,000 per year, and allows the places of business to remain open only from 7 o'clock in the morning until 10 o'clock at night. The saloon keepers generally welcome the law, except the treating part of it, and say they will comply. If they do not, they will lose their licenses. In preparation to comply with the ordinance, the fronts of some of the saloons were sawed out and glass inserted so that the whole interior of the room can be seen from the street. All chairs, tables, moving picture shows, phonographs and pianos are prohibited.

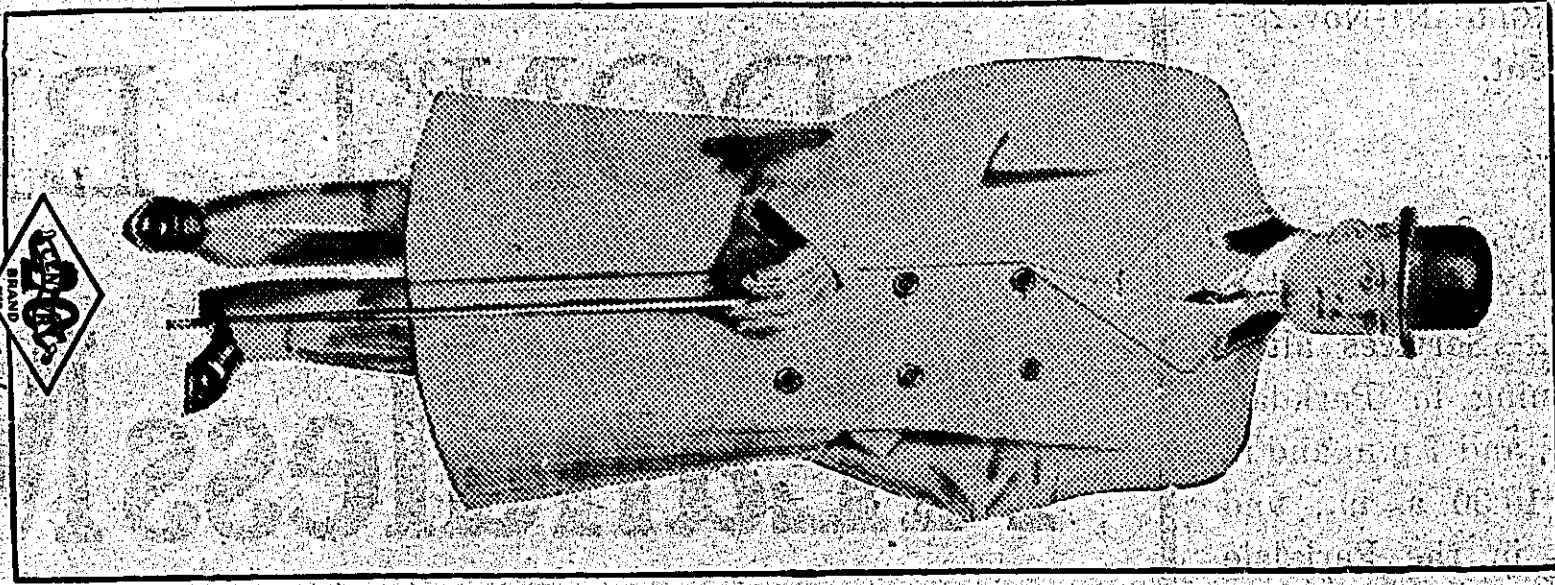

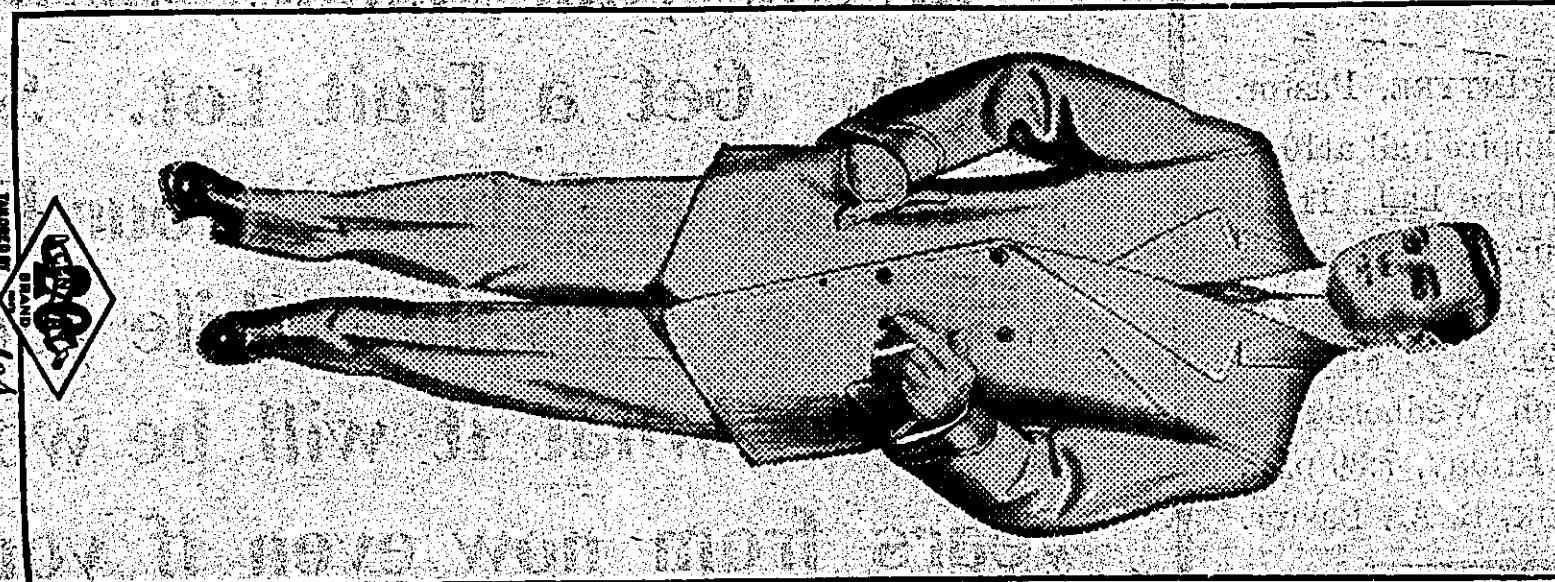

SALE OF WORK.

Ladies of Presbyterian Church Conduct Sale of Fancy Goods and Candies.

The Ladies of the Presbyterian church conducted a sale of work in Municipal hall on Wednesday last and received liberal patronage, in spite of the fact that the affair had not been very fully advertised.

The array of fancy goods was bewildering to masculine eyes, and the display tables were all very daintily arranged and heavily loaded. The articles for sale were both ornamental and useful. The purely ornamental were conspicuous by their absence. Another good feature of the sale was the fact that the prices charged were reasonable and the hold-ups which are so often co-incidental with a bazaar or sale of work were conspicuous by their absence. Fair prices were asked and everybody got full value for their money. The ladies in charge were there for business and acquitted themselves nobly.

The homemade candy tables were loaded with a toothsome array of confectionery and the supply given for money was also generous. Mrs. Graham, Mrs. Gartrell and Miss Tait presided over them and were kept busy on account of the general excellence of their wares. Tea was served during the afternoon and a bevy of fair waitresses attended to the wants of those who sat down in a most finished and professional manner.

A card album was placed on a table by the door, and a notice above it invited all who were charitably inclined to insert a souvenir in the shape of a bill. A considerable number complied with the request and altogether the ladies netted a handsome sum in aid of the finances of the church. Their success was well merited as they must have put many hours of labor and thought into their work.

This (Saturday) evening the balance of the goods will be sold at auction in the council chamber from 7 to 9.

Two hundred miners employed in the Stanley mines around Edmonton, Alberta, struck work, being dissatisfied with conditions. Already a coal famine threatens the city of Edmonton, and the schools and power house will have to be closed owing to lack of fuel.

NEW LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

Thomas W. Patterson Succeeds Mr. Dunsmuir as Lieut.-Gov., of B. C.

The resignation of Lieut-Governor Dunsmuir of B.C., has been accepted and Thomas W. Patterson of Victoria appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Paterson is a son-in-law of Senator Riley and a native of Bruce County, going west twenty-five years ago. The Lieut-Governor elect is a retired railway contractor and formerly a member of the B. C. Legislature.

CAPTURE ROBBERS ROOST.

The capture of a well established nest of robbers situated in the wilds of the Cariboo promises to be the outcome of the investigation made by the provincial police following the dramatic hold-up of the Cariboo mail stage on November 1st. Two arrests have been made. One of the pair in custody is Mrs. Reider, proprietor of the Mountain House, and it is understood that information has been secured incriminating other occupants of the place. In fact, it is alleged that the mystery surrounding the stage robbery and other acts of brigandage which have occurred in late years and which have baffled the police, will be cleared up in a thorough investigation of the quiet little hostelry which up to the present has escaped suspicion.

It was apparent at the start that the looting of the stage was carefully planned. Arrangements were made to put Indian trackers on the trail of the highwaymen, but when the scene was examined no footprints could be found. The two men who held rifles at the heads of the driver and passengers and took possession of registered letters containing thousands of dollars, had covered their feet with sacks or something of a similar character while they walked to their horses. It happened that they hadn't been wily enough to cover up all clues however, and through other evidence secured the author or authors of the robbery have been traced to the mountain inn.

Some 18,000 acres of coal lands were recently staked near Princeton by a Vancouver man and two local residents.

SUFFRAGETTE LEADER SPEAKS.

Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, leader of the suffragette movement in Great Britain, declared on the lecture platform that the English suffragettes are prepared to go to any length even to the actual shedding of blood to gain their end. The leader of the English militants was in deadly earnest and her remarks evoked frequent bursts of applause. "Our movement in England has progressed beyond the point of an agitation," began Mrs. Pankhurst. "It is now an actual revolution against the government. The only reason it does not take on the outer aspect of an open revolt is because we women have more self-restraint than the men. If the methods adopted by men in their revolutions had been put into use by us, there is no telling what would have happened. Probably many of our opponents would have been killed. Lloyd-George would probably have been shot down in his box at the play.

"We want to gain the suffrage peacefully, if possible. We should prefer to annoy and ridicule our opponents into giving women political equity without resorting to more terrible methods. But if necessary, we are willing to give up our lives for the cause. Let it be clearly understood by all those who are opposing that we stand ready to pay the greatest price possible to put woman on a political equality with man."

Weather Report

Abstract from weather records for November, 1909, kept at the Government Station, Balcomo Ranch, Summerland, B.C.

Provincial and General

A remarkable story of a plan to kidnap or assassinate John D. Rockefeller, was made public. The alleged plotters are three in number, so far as known, one principal and two hirelings. The guards about the estate were doubled and plans were made for what appears to be a hasty departure for Pocantico Hills.

One of the Tory five elected in Vancouver on the 25th was H. H. Watson, a business partner of Mr. Milne Atkins, who will be remembered by Truro people. Truro Times.

Neil F. McKay, B. A., M.P.P., for Kaslo B.C., is a Nova Scotian, and a native of Pictou County. He is a son of the late A. McKay who was at one time a member of the local legislature.

While carrying the mail across the ice from the mail steamer which was frozen in Lake Atlin, D. Holland and Fred Taylor broke the ice. Both men and mail were rescued with difficulty. Both men were seriously frozen.

Lake Atlin was frozen over on December 1st. This is the earliest closing of the lake on record.

FIGHTING ON PRINCIPLE.

The suffragettes are still stirring things up in England, and they are into their campaign with such deadly seriousness as makes it evident that something will have to be done either with them or for them before peace reigns in the King's realm once more. Were their effort spasmodic and largely emotional, it would long ago have spent itself leaving things about as they were. That it is not spasmodic and emotional but deep seated and fought on principle is evidenced by the fact that one society alone is able to raise \$250,000 for the campaign fund, the fact that many of the leaders are women of education and ability, and the further fact that the humbler women in thousands are ready to lay down their pride, their scruples and even their lives if necessary, in order that the cause of freedom may be advanced.

Now where there is so much sustained devotion there must be some very real grievances. It is true that now and then some hysterical female will commit some overt act which alienates sympathy and invites ridicule, but the large fact remains that on the whole the women have conducted their campaign with vigor and good sense. It is not the leaders who have overstepped the bounds, and leaders and movements cannot fairly be held responsible for the acts of irresponsible enthusiasts, else there was never yet liberty wrested from the hard hand of tyranny but it should have been hanged on the same score.

The women are clamoring for the ballot for many reasons; among others the following: Because evils which have cried to heaven for redress for scores of years, have

never been attended to by masculine legislators. Notorious among these is the mixed workhouse which has been condemned but left unremedied since 1834. In sixty-four workhouses imbeciles were found in charge of dependent children, and thousands of innocent children are herded with tramps, prostitutes and the victims of contagious disease.

Because the property acts are lopsided, cutting women out of all control of the means of livelihood and the control of their own children, and allowing men the privilege not only of leaving them penniless in death, but of beating them during life at will, provided the chastisement be not fatal.

Because men have crowded into the occupations formerly belonging to women, such as baking, hairdressing, etc., and have taken the spinning, weaving, lace making, etc., which used to be done in the houses of the people, to factories, and lastly—

Because in the factories women were at the mercy of greedy capitalists who extracted the highest degree of service for the lowest degree of pay, and the only means of straightening them out is by the ballot, which women have not got and the government refuses to give.

By working with the labor unions and showing them that women should be admitted in self protection since they are learning the business anyhow, work for lower wages and so play into the hands of capitalists against the unions, they have brought to bear on politicians a powerful club which the most cynical of them is learning to respect. Union men have votes and in making them their allies in the struggle the women have done a good stroke of business.

Then too, they no longer interrupt and harass a politician at his meeting—they hold meetings of their own and organize the constituency with as much thoroughness as a ward heeler might do in New York. The counter attraction and personal work tell, and so indirectly they become a formidable factor in the election contest.

We have sympathy for the women in their struggle. If men had had the sense to right their wrongs there would never have been this fuss. It is not seats in parliament women want, but the protection of their homes in one way or another. For that they have long pleaded in vain, so let the government of England now take what it gets and other governments in more favored lands learn to "let justice be done though the heavens fall."

COMMONERS AFTER LORDS.

The National Liberal Federation has issued a manifesto on the House of Lords, saying that if the present action of the peers is not repudiated swiftly by the people, the rights and privileges won by their forefathers in great struggles, will all be repudiated. The manifesto declares the peers' right of veto must be restricted, otherwise no Liberal ministry can ever hold office.

Prorogation will dissolve parliament only until January 1st, as it is considered unsafe to end the session irrevocably.

The budget debate was resumed in the House of Commons and Premier Asquith presented a resolution stating:

"That the action of the House of Lords in refusing to enact the financial provision made by the House of Commons for the year is a breach of the constitution and a usurpation of the power of the House of Commons."

The Commons adopted the Premier's resolution by a vote of 349 to 134 which turns the matter over to the people with the official stamp of the strongest disapproval from the Lower House for the Lords.

Significant still is the fact that the whole religious body of the country, Anglican, non-conformist and Catholic, appears to be against the Lords' pretensions. The archbishop of Canterbury's abstention from voting in the House of Lords and the Archbishop of York's frank denunciation of Lord Lansdowne's resolution undoubtedly had a great effect. Following manifestos issued by the National Council of Free Churches which declared that the action of the House of Lords "make reforms supported by non-conformists impossible," the Church Times, an influential and widely circulated church paper, together with the Christian World and the organs of the Methodist, Baptist and Catholic sections, declare for the Commons and struggle against the Lords.

A large deputation representing the veterans of 1866 and 1870 waited on the government to ask for pensions in recognition of their services in defending the country. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replying, intimated that if the government decided to do anything in the matter, some distinction would have to be drawn between those who actually saw service at the front in repelling the Fenian attacks and those who were merely under arms at the time.

AMENDMENTS TO CRIMINAL CODE.

The following amendments to the Criminal Code have been introduced at Ottawa.

"285A. The owner and driver and person in charge, or owner or driver or person in charge, of any motor vehicle commonly called and known as an automobile, which causes a horse to run away or shy or bolt and thereby occasion bodily injury to any person, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to two years' imprisonment."

1. Section 119 of the Criminal Code is amended by adding thereto the following subsection:—

"3. No revolver or pistol shall be sold to any person unless he produces to and leaves with the vendor a permit in writing, from the chief of police or a police magistrate or justice of the peace allowing him to purchase a revolver or pistol."

LOCATING IN PENTICTON.

Rev. F. W. Auvache of the Baptist church preached his farewell sermons last Sunday and leaves at once for Penticton where he has accepted a call. At the close of the evening service last Sunday, C. V. Hall gave a short address appreciative of Mr. Auvache's work as a pastor and preacher of the gospel, drawing attention to the fact that the present church building was a monument to Mr. Auvache's work here, and that numbers could personally testify to the good work done by Mr. Auvache as a teacher of the gospel during his three years residence in Grand Forks. —Gazette.

WOMAN'S SPHERE.

Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard university, believes that woman's highest field of activity is in the home and decries the effort of women nowadays to push their way into occupations more distinctively those of men. In an interview published in a Cambridge paper he says that for the normal woman the most profitable intellectual growth is to be found in the exercise of her talents in the problems presented by home making, companionship with her husband, and the vital problems of the rearing of children. President Eliot said in part:

"The women who follow the ordinary professions of men, who keep shops, carry on business and devote their time to labors of church or charity will, as a rule, contribute far less to the development of themselves and the race than the normal woman who practises the 'household acts.'"

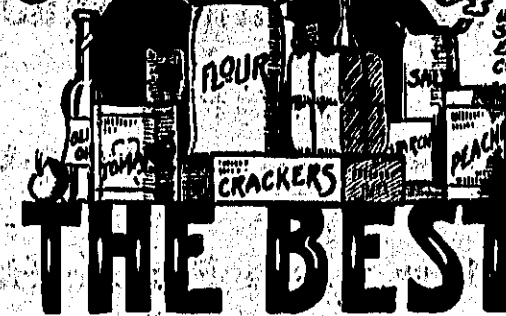

AUSTRALIA WANTS OKANAGAN FRUIT

READY MARKET FOR B. C. FRUIT AT THE ANTIPODES.

Agents Consider B. C. Product Best Yet Received In Sydney.—Can Take All that B.C., can Ship—Local Packing School.

Each year witnesses a growing demand for B. C. orchard product. The brand of goods placed on the market has grown steadily in favor and it is good to know that the future offers a market for all that can be produced at top prices.

The time of waiting may seem long and the rancher may grow impatient with the gradual development of his trees, but a few years soon pass and he finds himself an independent man, with a means of livelihood ideal in itself, in the most ideal climate in Canada, and sufficiently profitable to demand the best he can put into the work.

The Okanagan Fruit Union has done much during the past season towards establishing a pack, and it is stated on good authority that the Union proposes opening up a packing school in Summerland this winter with the Union's head packer in charge.

Keeping in view the apple standard as laid down by Prof. Craig, in the course of a lecture delivered here last fall and with up-to-date methods of packing, there is no reason why the Okanagan should not lead the world in point of size and quality. Quantity will also increase as the years go by.

A letter from a San Francisco wholesale house to E. E. Samson, Manager of the Okanagan Fruit Union, and published in the Vernon News says:

"Now that the season is over and the last of the apples have gone to Australia, we think it only fair to write you, expressing our appreciation of your excellent pack.

We consider your pack the best that has yet gone down to Sydney, and while you continue to treat us in the manner you have done this season we shall continue to buy your fruit; and we are prepared in future seasons to take as many of the sorts and sizes as are suitable for our market as you can supply."

Whereas the said Lake Shore Telephone Company, Limited, has installed, and is now operating a magneto telephone system, within the corporate limits of the Municipality, but has not received a licence or franchise so to do, nor for permission to erect poles, wires and necessary apparatus on the streets and lanes within the said corporate limits.

AND WHEREAS the said Company has applied to the said Municipality for such License or Franchise, and for such permission, and the Municipality has agreed to grant the same, subject to the terms hereof, and subject also to the same being ratified and assented to by the electors of the said Municipality in a by-law to be submitted to them in pursuance of the provisions of the Municipal Clauses Act, 1906, and Amending Acts in that behalf made and provided.

NOW THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH, that, in consideration of the premises, the parties hereto each covenant promise and agree to and with the other of them in the manner following—

First—That the said company shall have the right and privilege to continue the operation of the Magneto Telephone system heretofore carried on by them in the said Municipality, to instal and make any extensions thereof, and to carry on a general telephone business within the said limits.

Second—That the said company may construct, erect, operate and maintain, a line, or lines of telephone along the sides of, and across or under any highways, streets, lanes, alleyways, public bridges or any such place for the purpose of erecting, operating and maintaining its line or lines of telephones along the sides of, or across or under the same, and to construct, erect and maintain such, and so many poles of standard size and other works and devises as the said company may deem necessary for making, completing, supporting, using, working operating and maintaining the system of communication by telephone, and may stretch wires thereon.

Third—The poles and the pole equipment required to instal the said telephone system shall be placed by the said Company in such places and at such distances and of such a height and maintained in such condition as shall be satisfactory to the Municipality they to oversee the placing of such poles and equipment.

Fourth—The said system, now in operation, and any extensions thereof with requisite exchanges shall be in every respect first class and up to date and the said Company shall at all times hereafter properly and efficiently maintain, repair and operate the same. The said company shall not charge to their subscribers a higher monthly rental than two dollars for dwellings and three dollars for business or other concerns.

Fifth—In the event of the said Company allowing their telephone plant to become in a dilapidated

condition, and thus failing to give a good up to date service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality, the Municipality may call upon the Company to place their said system in good condition, and to furnish a good service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality.

(a) Should the Company neglect, or fail to comply with the request of the Municipality, as laid down in the preceding section, the Municipality may call for the appointment of a Board of Arbitrators, who will have the power to examine into the books and affairs of the company for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Company is furnishing or can furnish an up to date service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality.

(b) If the Board of Arbitrators find the service being supplied by the Company is faulty, they shall have power to call upon the Company to make such changes as shall bring the efficiency of the said plant up to date.

(c) The Company shall be allowed a reasonable length of time to make the necessary additions and alterations to bring about the desired result.

(d) If, after a reasonable length of time, the Company fail or neglect to obey the mandate of the Board of Arbitrators, the Municipality by giving one month's notice of their intention so to do, may take over the plant of the Company at a valuation to be fixed by the Board of Arbitrators.

(e) All matters submitted to the Board of Arbitrators, by virtue of this agreement, shall be decided by them with as little delay as possible, and their decision shall be final.

(f) The aforesaid Board of Arbitrators shall be appointed as follows—

The Council to appoint one.

The Company to appoint one.

They two to appoint a third.

(g) The expenses of such Board of Arbitration shall be assessed upon the parties hereto, in the judgement of the Board of Arbitrators.

Sixth—The Municipality shall forthwith pass a bylaw granting to the said Company the rights and privileges necessary to instal, operate and maintain the said magneto telephone system, and (in pursuance of the provisions contained in the Municipal Clauses Act, 1906 and Amending Acts) will submit the same to the electors of the Municipality for their assent.

Seventh—This agreement shall be binding upon and enure to the benefit of as well as the parties hereto as their heirs, executors, administrators and assigns for the term of ten years, at the expiration of which the Municipality shall have the privilege of purchasing such plant, at a price to be agreed upon between the Company and the Municipality, and in the event of their not being able to agree upon a price, the same shall be submitted to a board of arbitration, as hereinbefore provided.

IS TROUBLE COMING?

That seems an idle question to ask in these piping times of peace when we so genuinely feel that we are "brithers a'." Indeed there is a kind of native impulse to hurl the teapot at the man who would even dare to suggest such a thing.

All of which is very creditable to the generous Canadian heart. Yet, until self-preservation ceases to be a mightier impulse than neighborliness or even fraternity, it may be as well not to shy the teapot at our editorial head, since the same forces which are at work in Germany to make her seek war with Britain, are latent in the United States and sooner or later they must become operative.

It is not long since Mr. Jas. J. Hill, that statesman of commerce and transportation, whose declining years seem to be given to the study of economic conditions in the States as a necessary part of the great game of railway absorption he is playing with the other giants of finance, gave utterance in a public interview in New York to a solemn warning to the people of that country. In the course of his remarks he gave it as his opinion that the United States has already entered on the path which ends in the scrap heap. That path he calls "the high cost of living."

It is not in the trusts Mr. Hill sees danger but in the fact that the States will soon not be producing enough to feed herself. Whereas in 1790 there were ninety-six people producing food on the farms to four who consumed it in the cities, leaving a large margin for export trade. There are today about seventy in the cities for every thirty on the farms and last year's export amounted to sixty-

eight million bushels of wheat, which was sixty millions more than could be spared since the wheat had to be re-taken from export storage in Chicago and New York and re-shipped to Kansas and Texas. This in a country which used to export 225,000,000 bushels.

And whereas twenty-five years ago corn sold for 15 cents a bushel and people could afford to feed it to cattle and hogs. Now it is 65 cents a bushel and too dear for feed, hence the increased prices of both corn and meats in the towns.

Mr. Hill points to the 20,000 worked out vacant farms in the eastern states, to farms that forty years ago were worth \$150 an acre and are now worth \$30, and to the fact that while Iowa's wheat crop for the five years preceding 1887 was 26,682,560 bushels, for the five years ending 1908 it was only 8,068,000. This startling evidence of diminishing returns on the one hand and of increase of consuming population in the cities on the other, certainly does not bode well for the future.

Now if the United States had only 8,000,000 bushels of wheat above her own requirements last year, and the consuming population by immigration and by natural increase is growing yearly by leaps and bounds, how long will it be till the Republic finds the consuming pan of the scales heavier than the producing?

And when she gets there she will have but two alternatives, race suicide on the one hand and expansion on the other. She will be in fact where Japan and Germany find themselves today. As with Japan and Germany a war of aggression will be the natural choice of a people irritated by the limitations which fret them and allured by the prospect of broad acres held in the grasp of feebler powers near at hand.

As long before that time the States will have kept faith with the Philippines as she has with Cuba, and given these tropical islands their freedom, but two convenient avenues of expansion will remain, Canada to the north and Mexico to the south, and since of the two the former is preferable both in its arable extent and in the genius of its people and institutions, we may be sure the lot will fall on us and sentiment will die at the hand of necessity.

It is true Mr. Hill thinks there is salvation for the United States in education and consequent fertilization. From the sixty-five agricultural colleges he would send out three teachers and an expert supervisor into every county. Since the farmers can't be got into college he would

very sensibly bring the college to the farmers and work out the experiments on their own farms. Then when they saw on their neighbor's farm what the new fertilizer, new seed or new methods were doing they would follow suit and worked out lands would be restored.

But it will be readily seen that valuable as that hint is, it is but a sop to Cerberus. It simply postpones the inevitable hour when, population overtaking the means of subsistence, a great cry will go up that can be appeased only by finding room for the people to dwell in greater comfort.

Incidentally we may remark that had it not been for England's wonderful astuteness and ability in colonizing, she would long ago have been up against the same situation. Now, however that the globe is pretty well taken up, the neighbor's possessions become the natural object of covetous desire.

WORTH LOOKING INTO.

Is there a blind pig in town? If there is not, someone is certainly generous with fire-water. A number of men came into town on Tuesday last from the bush where they had been working for some weeks previous, and before they had been in town two hours they were all more or less the worse for liquor, and by evening they were all too drunk to be civil.

The old theory has been that the liquor was secured on board one of the steamboats, but in the case on hand the theory is untenable as the men in question were among the mountains during the time that the boats were at the town wharf, and apparently, on arriving in Summerland, they knew just where to go so as not to waste a minute before loading up.

There are a great many people in the district who have been talking and working for temperance for a considerable length of time and it would be a good thing to let words crystalize into actions, take the bull by the horns, and find out just where the trouble lies. Several theories might be advanced as to the source of supply, one of them along the line suggested by Longfellow:

"And things are not what they seem."

Theory, however is insufficient to meet the case, and a magistrate's search warrant and a hunting party might be the means of bringing a number of surprises to light. Summerland in the recent election declared strongly in favor of local option and there are doubtless those in the district who are willing to go a step further and assist in doing a little cleaning up.

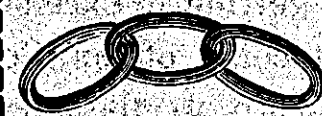

ELECTRIC SERVICE IN TWO YEARS

COUNCIL MEETS REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COUTEAU POWER CO.

**Company Promises to have Cars in Operation from
End to End of Lake in Time to Move out 1911
Fruit crop—Telephone Legislation.**

A special meeting of the Municipal council was held on Monday last at which Mr. Warren and Mr. Perry, representing the Couteau Power Company interviewed the council with reference to securing a franchise for the operating and supplying of electric energy throughout the district from the proposed power plant, which the company is about to install at Shuswap Falls.

The company has undertaken to supply a complete line of tram cars running from end to end of Okanagan Lake in time to take out the fruit crop of 1911. The company on being assured that there will be no difficulty in securing the right of way through the various districts, is prepared to go right ahead.

The matter is one of vital interest to Summerland as it will provide a rapid means of connection with the railway to the north.

A suggestion was made by Councillor Ritchie at the meeting which has been spoken of in an approving manner. He thought that Summerland might be made the terminus of the road and good and regular ferry connection established between Summerland and Penticton and the car system extended from Penticton to Kal-eden.

The following resolution was passed:

Ritchie—Thomson—That we the council of the Summerland Municipality having heard the proposal of Mr. Warren, the accredited representative of the Couteau Power Company, Ltd., hereby express ourselves as being in favor of granting an exclusive franchise for a term of twenty-five years for electric light, power, and tram lines on the basis that the rates which will be submitted to the council for their approval are satisfactory and that the system be completed so as to handle the crop of 1911;

the Company also agreeing to take over the present electric light plant at the arbitrator's valuation.

The council also held a special meeting on Dec. 13. The chief items of business were the passing of a telephone by-law which is to be submitted to the electors, and the making of arrangements for the forthcoming municipal elections. Polling will take place in the municipal council chamber.

DOWN SOUTHERS SHIVER IN THE GRIP OF MIGHTY COLD SPELL.

**Okanagan Valley Temperature Keeps Moderate,
Very Little Frost, no Snow, While the
Sunny South is Frost Bound.**

While bitter Borean breezes blow biting and blighting across the beautiful and usually balmy banana belt, Summerland still keeps warm and comfortable, with very little frost and no snow. Nestled among the mountains whose tops are mirrored in Lake Okanagan, the Okanagan district leads the world for moderateness of climate and freedom from those unpleasantnesses which at present mark other portions of the terrestrial globe.

A report says: Blizzards accompanied by low temperatures have visited North America from Texas to Toronto and from New Mexico to Maine.

Denver, Col., reports 15 below zero; Pueblo, Cal., 18 below zero; Lauder, Wyo., 30 below; El Paso, Texas, general snowfall and water systems demoralized; New Mexico, temperatures centre around 18 below zero; Kansas City, 10 below zero; Colorado Springs, 15 below zero; New Richmond, Wis., 19 below zero.

At Dallas, Tex., the severe cold carries a blessing with it, as experts say the boll weevil has been exterminated. Traffic and telegraphic service is demoralized.

At Omaha, Neb., the mercury stands at 35 below zero and the country is covered with a foot of snow. Ice a foot thick is being packed by the ice companies.

In Wyoming similar conditions exist and strenuous efforts are being made to save the sheep which are deprived of their food supply by the deep snow.

AND WHEREAS the said Company has applied to the said Municipality for such License or Franchise, and for such permission, and the Municipality has agreed to grant the same, subject to the terms hereof, and subject also to the same being ratified and assented to by the electors of the said Municipality in a by-law to be submitted to them in pursuance of the provisions of the Municipal Clauses Act, 1906, and Amending Acts in that behalf made and provided.

NOW THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH, that, in consideration of the premises, the parties hereto each covenant promise and agree to and with the other of them in the manner following—

First—That the said company shall have the right and privilege to continue the operation of the Magneto Telephone system heretofore carried on by them in the said Municipality, to instal and make any extensions thereof, and to carry on a general telephone business within the said limits.

Second—That the said company may construct, erect, operate and maintain, a line, or lines of telephone along the sides of, and across or under any highways, streets, lanes, alleyways, public bridges or any such place for the purpose of erecting, operating and maintaining its line or lines of telephones along the sides of, or across or under the same, and to construct, erect and maintain such, and so many poles of standard size and other works and devices as the said company may deem necessary for making, completing, supporting, using, working operating and maintaining the system of communication by telephone, and may stretch wires thereon.

Third—The poles and the pole equipment required to instal the said telephone system shall be placed by the said Company in such places and at such distances and of such a height and maintained in such condition as shall be satisfactory to the Municipality they to oversee the placing of such poles and equipment.

Fourth—The said system, now in operation, and any extensions thereof with requisite exchanges shall be in every respect first class and up to date and the said Company shall at all times hereafter properly and efficiently maintain, repair and operate the same. The said company shall not charge to their subscribers a higher monthly rental than two dollars for dwellings and three dollars for business or other concerns.

Fifth—In the event of the said Company allowing their telephone plant to become in a dilapidated

condition, and thus failing to give a good up to date service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality, the Municipality may call upon the Company to place their said system in good condition, and to furnish a good service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality.

(a) Should the Company neglect, or fail to comply with the request of the Municipality, as laid down in the preceding section, the Municipality may call for the appointment of a Board of Arbitrators, who will have the power to examine into the books and affairs of the company for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Company is furnishing or can furnish an up to date service, commensurate with the requirements of the Municipality.

(b) If the Board of Arbitrators find the service being supplied by the Company is faulty, they shall have power to call upon the Company to make such changes as shall bring the efficiency of the said plant up to date.

(c) The Company shall be allowed a reasonable length of time to make the necessary additions and alterations to bring about the desired result.

(d) If, after a reasonable length of time, the Company fail or neglect to obey the mandate of the Board of Arbitrators, the Municipality by giving one month's notice of their intention so to do, may take over the plant of the Company at a valuation to be fixed by the Board of Arbitrators.

(e) All matters submitted to the Board of Arbitrators, by virtue of this agreement, shall be decided by them with as little delay as possible, and their decision shall be final.

(f) The aforesaid Board of Arbitrators shall be appointed as follows—

- The Council to appoint one.
The Company to appoint one.
They two to appoint a third.

(g) The expenses of such Board of Arbitration shall be assessed upon the parties hereto, in the judgement of the Board of Arbitrators.

Sixth—The Municipality shall forthwith pass a bylaw granting to the said Company the rights and privileges necessary to instal, operate and maintain the said magneto telephone system, and (in pursuance of the provisions contained in the Municipal Clauses Act, 1906 and Amending Acts) will submit the same to the electors of the Municipality for their assent.

SOCIALISTS STUDY VITAL QUESTIONS

WILFRID GRIBBLE ADDRESSES AUDIENCE ON SUBJECT OF ECONOMICS.

Lifts Veil of Future and Makes a Forecast—Supporters of the Cause hold Election of Officers and Form School of Instruction.

Wilfred Gribble of Toronto addressed a good-sized audience in the Men's Club on Saturday night. Comrade Gribble is a natural born orator who never orates but talks fluently in a conversational tone, and drives home his points with irresistible logic.

His treatment of the "dismal science" of economics was such as to hold the attention of his audience from beginning to end. He showed that history consists of a series of class struggles between the ruler and the ruled, the exploiters and the exploited, and traced the various elements in society through chattel slavery, feudal slavery and wage slavery. Deducing from the fact that social relations have always depended upon the forms of production and distribution he plainly proved that before long a change must take place in the ownership of socially operated utilities. That which is socially operated must be socially owned.

To bring about this change is the historic mission of the working class, and the Socialist Party is the political expression of its demands.

On Sunday an organization meeting was held and the annual election of officers resulted in the appointment of E. Hayward as Secretary, and J. W. S. Logie as Organizer. A class in Political Economy was formed and meetings will be held every Thursday evening during the winter. The place of meeting will be announced later.

THE PECHERINE.

A new fruit is announced by a Paris contemporary. It has been obtained after experiments extending over two years and is known as the Pecherine.

The new fruit is the result of grafting the peach with the nectarine, and its taste is said to combine the two. In appearance the skin is smooth, that is, without down, and in color it resembles the peach, only more ruddy. An advantage claimed for the Pecherine is that it is firmer than the peach, so that it will bear transport more easily. It can be cultivated in the open ripening quicker than either of its parents. In size it is much larger than the nectarine and smaller than the largest peaches.

A MERRY CHRISTMAS.

We take this opportunity, following a time honored custom, of extending to each of our readers, our best wishes for "a Merry Christmas" this year.

Of all Anglo-Saxondom, England and Canada lay most stress on Christmas as a day of general jubilation. The Yankees exalt Thanksgiving day, which with them is never a moveable feast, to the first place among festivals. The Scotch exalt New Year's eve, "Hogmany" they call it over there but in England and Canada no march is too long, so it brings us to the old home, or the new home, as the case may be, for Christmas cheer.

Associated with the old home or the old home church at that particular time, is the "splendiferous" Christmas tree, apparently imported directly from fairyland for the occasion. The marvellous dolls, miraculous lights, stunning surprises concealed in well wrapped packages; toothsome red cheeked apples, delectable sweets and golden apples of the Hesperides in one wild profusion assembled; the sleds and the skates and the drums and the horns for the elect of our boyhood's world—how it all comes over us as we think of other Christmas days we knew before we ever knew or thought of a home and a tree of our own! We would like to be a boy again for that one night only—just to feel the ecstatic thrill, the bursting, suffocating enthusiasm of that hour and a half with Santa Claus and his magic tree, in the little old church long since abandoned for the grand new house of brick with stone facings and a fully equipped kitchen in the rear.

And now comes along a man who wants to cut out the Christmas tree altogether, or

at any rate to reduce its spreading symmetrical glory, to the poor measure of a healthy branch from a big tree, on the ground that it takes 3000 acres a year of good timber to supply Santa Claus with what he wants, 150,000 acres of forest every fifty years when people in the United States are running out of lumber so fast they wont have a stick left to build a hen house in the course of a hundred years or so.

That may be, but if it be, then we will plant an "extry" for the occasion rather than see childhood deprived of that one spectacular demonstration of the often denied assertion that realization never equals anticipation.

The bald spot on the Christmas tree performance however, is that it is wholly an egoistic exhibition whereas however, the genius of the day, as exemplified in the life of Him whose birth it commemorates, is essentially altruistic. Attempts are being made and have been made for some years, to change polarity of the occasion, getting the children to give to the tree for the less fortunate, instead of receiving anything from it, nuts, candies, etc., being provided them on occasion of their doing so. As there is no child so poor that he cannot bring at least a potato, and classes combining are able to tote in a bag of flour, a ham, or some other equally useful and patent contribution at the proper dramatic moment, the altruistic tree or ship soon acquires a meaning not to be despised.

Strange to say the children get more joy out of this altruistic effort than they get out of the old fashioned egotistic tree. It is not such a fierce joy perhaps, but it is deeper, different in kind, sweeter and more heavenly, and they find out by actual experience the truth of those words of the Master of Christmas understood by few. "It is more blessed to give than to receive." That this is the case is evidenced by the fact that they vote to have the the same kind of celebration the next year.

The old way may be altruistic so far as Santa Clause is concerned, but it is egotistic and sometimes full of jealous heart burnings so far as the the children have to do with it. Since Santa Claus can easily exercise his functions elsewhere, and the celebration is for the children, it seems to us that by far the wiser way is to make it minister to the gratification of the higher rather than the lower self of the child, especially since others less fortunate will thereby find a glad cause to remember the day.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

The next event of importance to the people of Summerland will be the Municipal elections. Nominations will take place on January 10, and the election on the 15th.

There is not very much election excitement at present, although rumor says that there are at least three citizens not hitherto connected with municipal politics who are agreeable to having a whirl at capturing the Reeve's chair. There are also several names mentioned as councillors from among those hitherto outside the hall of municipal government. It is hoped that the change in the personnel of the council will not be of too drastic a character, as men who have served their apprenticeship in municipal affairs are, on account of their familiarity with municipal business, doubly valuable.

CINDERELLA CLUB.

The second dance under the auspices of the Cinderella Club was held in Empire hall on Tuesday evening and once more proved a most enjoyable affair. There was a marked increase in attendance, about 40 couples being on the floor.

The programme of dances was well arranged and there were no unnecessary delays and no untoward events to mar the harmony of the occasion.

Refreshments were served during the evening and the gathering dispersed before the lights went out. The club will hold its next dance on the evening of Jan. 11.

ORGANIST FAREWELLED.

On Friday evening of last week a number of friends and adherents of the Presbyterian church met together at the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. English, in their home on Shaughnessy avenue.

During the evening, Mr. English presented a small purse of gold on behalf of friends of the choir, to Mrs. Hannaford, who for a considerable time has filled the position of church organist, and who was leaving for Vancouver. Mr. G. Thornber replied on behalf of Mrs. Hannaford, and a few words were then spoken by the Rev. Mr. Hood. The evening passed all too quickly and a merry party trooped their way homeward towards midnight.

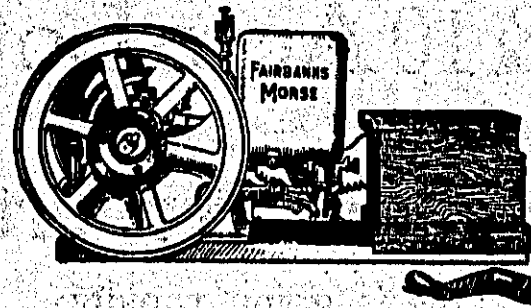
