COUNCIL HOLDS USUAL MEETING

MANY ACCOUNTS PASSED AND MANY COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED.

Council Replies to Board of Trade's Request re Enforcement of Trades License By-law--Request for Rink Site in Park.

The regular monthly meeting of the municipal council was held on Monday last.

Communications were received as follows: From Minister of Public Works re grant on account of main roads through municipality; from Board of Trade, Summerland, re Trades Licenses, and a petition from a large number of the rate payers requesting the council to pass a by-law closing all business houses at 6:30 each day except Saturday and before a public holiday; from H. Reynolds desiring to rent a site in the park for a skating rink.

WOULD-BE BRIDE ESCORTED HOME

REAL ROMANCE CRUELLY NIPPED IN THE BUD BY UNKIND FORTUNE.

Hasty Damsel Runs away from Home---Strikes a Matrimonially Inclined Beau---Irate Father Muffles Wedding Bells.

An Okanagan romance was nipped in the bud on Thursday last. It appears that a young woman of somewhat tender years from Gellatly had a squabble with her parents and resolved to "fly der coop." She boarded the S.S. Okanagan and on board apparently bumped into a sympathetic stranger, and into his ear poured her tale of woe. His sympathy was so great that it was resolved that they would disembark at Summerland and interview the priest.

At least, that is the story the girl told. Those on the inside track are inclined to look wise over it. Anyway a telephone message to Mr. R. H. English, J. P., revealed the fact that the daddy was on to the runaway's whereabouts and gave instructions to have her cared for in Summerland and shipped home in proper care by the first boat. Mr. Wellington Watson was sworn in as special constable and camped outside the recreant damsel's door all night, and in the morning flinty heartedly escorted her to the wharf, piloted her aboard the S. S. Okanagan, and took her back to her home and loved ones. It was at one time the plan of the authorities to arrest the man in the case, but he was given a hint to get out of town as soon as possible and accordingly disappeared promptly. Thus the old adage once more fills the bill "The course of true love never runs smooth."

MANY AVIATORS CLEAVE THE AIR

ALL THE CIVILIZED WORLD EXPERIMENTING
WITH FLYING MACHINES.

At Blackpool in England many Machines Give Marvellous Exhibitions—First Honors go to Frenchmen—A Parisian's Great Feat.

Few people realize just how far the aviation bug has bitten the experts of the civilized world. Locomotion on both land and water has been pushed ahead at such a rapid rate that it would appear as though the acme of excellence had been reached and now, while nations are building warships and extending navies, they are spending no less energy in the effort to conquer the air. Aeronautics is the all consuming fad throughout the civilized world and there is no doubt whatever but that in our day and generation aerial navigation will be accomplished and reduced to general utility. A recent issue of the Manchester Guardian devotes two whole pages to a report of the aeronautic contests at Blackpool recently. There were many contestants and the exhibition must have been a delightful and exciting revelation to those who were fortunate enough to be present.

Briefly, the result of the contests was as follows:

Roe's tri-plane assayed to rise but broke a stay and retired. The Paulhans-Farman bi-plane went up several times, sometimes with Paulhans on deck and sometimes with Farman. The bi-plane flew both high and low, rising and falling beautifully, rising to great height and on speed trials easily covering 40 miles an hour.

Rougier, a Frenchman, beat out the first contestants on the point of height and ascended fully 200 feet higher, but the speed attained was not quite so great.

AT DONCASTER.

Le Blon, who used a Bleriot monoplane, made nearly fifteen rounds of the course, flying 22 miles 295 yards in the excellent time of 30min. 04-5sec. He averaged over 44 miles an hour, a speed almost equal to that of Bleriot when the Channel was crossed.

Le Blon's feat did not end the day's sport, as Sommer came out immediately and flew eleven rounds of the course, beating his performance of Saturday by five miles. He was reported officially to have covered the eleven circuits, making 16 miles 660

yards in 28min. 14 2-5sec. His time in the Bradford Cup competition was much slower than Le Blon's record, but Sommer during the latter half of his fine effort was flying in the dark, and one knew of his passing only by the throbbing of his engine.

AT PARIS

A few days ago people in the streets of Paris noticed a speck in the clouds at a height estimated at 1,300ft. which was moving with extreme rapidity. The suggestion that it was an aeroplane was at first received with incredulity, but doubt soon became impossible, and the incredulous spectator beheld a daring aviator soaring high above the Eiffel Tower, which itself rises nearly 1,000 feet from the ground.

Miss Laura Rose of Guelph Speaks on Domestic Science and Organizes Institute.

Mr. Alex. Steuart has a small colony of bees which have set a record breaking pace for other bees to follow and have surely demonstrated beyond a shadow of a doubt that bee keeping may be made an exceedingly profitable industry in this district.

Mr. Steuart bought two hives last spring, took them to his ranch below the Giant's Head and let them get busy. During the season the bees swarmed 14 times, and he was fortunate enough to capture them all, thus making 16 hives.

In addition to the extra hives, and the honey required for the use of his own family, Mr. Steuart sold \$75 worth of honey to his neighbours.

Bee keeping is one of the newer industries in this section and Mr. Steuart's great success will doubtless lead others to go into bee keeping on their own account.

The twenty-fifth of November has been fixed as the day of judgment for the Government of this province. The chief minister has so decreed it. Let it come. The sooner it is over, the earlier shall business get back to its normal condition again, only to be once more depressed in a few weeks by the reaction following the hard work and general jubilation of the Christmas season.

However, let it come. Premier McBride probably feels that he is as ready for an accounting as most merchants will be. He has certainly done business since he got into power. He has, so far as we are aware reasonably endeavored to plough a straight furrow. No grave scandal fastens itself like a barnacle on his administration, and that too, in a day when malodorous and tenacious political barnacles are found "thick as leaves in Vallambroso" in well nigh every sea.

Really, in view of the disclosures of the past five years in reputable prints of this continent, the prime minister who can sit half a dozen years or so on the treasury benches without being charged on grounds more or less reasonable, with having profited thereby, is a man to gage on. It takes a strong man to do it, for no one has more need than the Premier to pray the prayer "Lord, save us from our friends."

Premier McBride seems to have been saved, for whatever Dame Rumor may have hinted now and then about him, no one has ventured to come out into the open with any aspersions on his official record.

That in itself is a whole lot, and this province has a right to be proud of the people's

Richard on that score. But it may well feel proud of his administration for more positive reasons. He is the first man of recent years to so order the affairs of the province as to make them command the confidence of the financial world outside. He has brought order out of chaos, gained us an honorable standing abroad, and shown an able and aggressive policy in the development and exploitation of our natural resources. Incidentally he has stood up for our rights like a little man in the interprovincial shuffle for larger sops from the Federal board, and watched like an Argus to see that no sharp practice in high places should forever silence our just protests.

But it is not less on his past record than on his prospective plans that Mr. McBride will appeal for support once more. He has a large and interesting railway policy to present for ratification. To see D. D. Mann & Co., through in opening up the great north country and to connect up the Boundary with Nicola, to say nothing of minor undertakings, is an ambitious and statesmanlike effort—particularly as he does not have to give the country to the promoters or to build the line for them in the other, to get the road. It is true the credit of the province will be curtailed by the backing of these bonds; but what is our credit for if it is not to be used when occasion demands, and what greater occasion can we have than to develop the magnificent agricultural, horticultural, mining and lumbering possibilities of districts now yielding no revenue? Moreover, the security has been well looked after in giving us a lien on the present Canadian Northern systems and the transaction has earmarks of a legitimate reciprocity to mutual advantage. Mr. Mann has assets but needs money, and a chance to open up our province; we don't give him money and we don't give him land, as has been the custom, but we help him to borrow money by telling the financial world we believe in him, The guarantee we give is to back his note, but meanwhile, just to show there are no hard feelings, and as an evidence of good faith we take a lien on his property. On the surface, it looks all right.

So whether we look backwards or forwards, Mr. McBride presents himself as a man of action such as the opposition will probably find it difficult to disparage before a thoughtful electorate. Constructive statesmen are what every young country needs and whether they be Grit or Tory is entirely a secondary matter.

The third soccer match in the series between the Public Schools and the College Juniors was played on Wednesday of last week and was won by the schools by the narrow margin of 1-0. The two previous games between the boys were draws, thus proving that the teams are very evenly matched and that the games are well worth watching. The conflict was a bloody one and nearly all the lads bear gory tokens of the contest.

Mr. R. H. English begs to intimate that he has purchased the livery and draying business recently carried on by the Summerland Fruit Company, and as in former times he will work same from his stables on Shaughnessy Avenue, where he hopes to receive a continuance of favors from his customers.

C. S. McGillivray, of Ottawa, pure food Inspector for the Federal Government was a visitor in town this week on business connected with his department.

John Tait has been busy this week on the hotel garden. All the beds have been cleaned up, the dead plants and vegetable matter cleared away, and in their place he has planted a splendid variety of rose bushes. Next year the garden should bear a semblance of its former glory.

Mr. C. H. Plant has purchased the Naper residence in Prairie Valley. Mr. Plant is going to England for the winter and will in all probability return to make his home here in the spring.

On Saturday afternoon a Rugby football match will be played between representatives of Summerland and a bunch of ball chasers from Kelowna.

The engineers selected by the municipality and the Summerland Development company have entered upon the problem of valuing the company's holdings. The task will doubtless be a lengthy one and when a decision satisfactory to both parties has been agreed upon the matter will be submitted to the ratepayers in the form of a by-law.

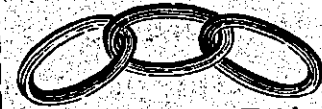

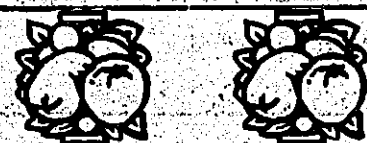

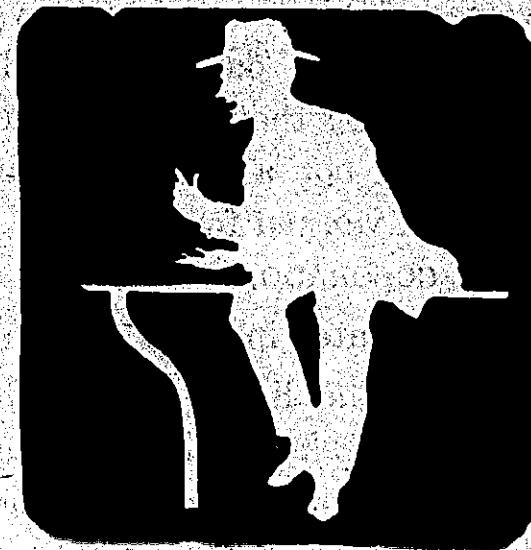

EQUAL SUFFRAGE, HOW IT WORKS

W. C. T. U. MAKES DEFINITE STAND FOR FRANCHISE.

Facts Formulated Showing the Results of Equal Suffrage Elsewhere—It Leads to advancement of Social Purity and Home Protection.

The advocates of equal suffrage are often asked what practical good it has done where it prevails, and they are sometimes challenged to name a single law that has been passed in consequence. It is not hard to answer this demand—we point to the following laws:

IN WYOMING.

In Wyoming equal suffrage was granted in 1869.—Acts providing that men and women teachers shall receive equal pay when equally qualified; raising the age of protection for girls to 18; making child neglect, abuse or cruelty, illegal; forbidding the employment of boys under 14 or girls of any age in mines, or of children under 14 in public exhibitions; making it unlawful to sell or give cigarettes, liquor or tobacco to persons under 16; forbidding the adulteration of candy.

Mrs. F. M. Sheik, president of the Wyoming State Federation of Women's Clubs, says, "The women of this state have always voted since the territorial days and it will be hard to find anything they have not had a hand in. We have not a good law that the women have not worked for."

IN COLORADO.

(Equal suffrage granted in 1893). Laws forbidding insuring the lives of children under 10 years old; establishing a state home for dependent children; making mothers joint guardians of their children with the father; raising the age of protection for girls to 18; establishing parental or truant schools; requiring in public schools lessons on humane treatment of animals; establishing juvenile courts; requiring joint signature of husband and wife to every chattel mortgage, sale of household goods used by the family, or conveyance or mortgage of the homestead; forbidding children of 16 or under to work more than 8 hours a day in any mill, factory, store or other occupation that may be deemed unhealthful; providing that no woman shall work more than 8 hours a day at work requiring her to be on her feet; making it a misdemeanor to fail to support aged or infirm parents.

Mrs. Ione T. Hanna, the first woman

elected to the School Board of Denver, writes: "Some results of equal suffrage are generally conceded, (1) The improved moral quality of candidates nominated for office by the various parties; (2) A decided increased observance of the courtesies and decencies of life at the different political headquarters previous to election, (3) Better and more orderly polling places, (4) A general awakening interest among both men and women in matters of public health, comfort and safety.

"Resolved that this convention of the Okanagan Liberal-Conservative association is in hearty sympathy and full accord with the policy adopted by the provincial government, especially that policy relating to the opening up of new territory by the granting of assistance to reliable railway companies, fully believing as we do that such clauses will be inserted in the agreement as will insure not only the completion of the roads within the specified time, but of a minimum mileage each year.

We desire to further express our appreciation of the excellent work performed by our representative, the Hon. Price Ellison, congratulate him on his accession to the cabinet, where we are sure he will impress upon his colleagues his well-known views upon irrigation and other matters of vital interest to this constituency."

During the session an excellent address was given by Mr. Hector Sutherland.

LIBERALS BUSY.

In another part of Vernon, the Liberal forces were in convention, Summerland being represented by Messrs. Ritchie, Brown and Stevens. There were, including proxies, about 40 present. John Oliver's platform was approved and Mayor F. R. E. De Hart, of Kelowna was chosen to contest the riding in the forthcoming election.

elections. It was the duty of every man to inform himself as to public matters and decide for himself as to the right and the wrong, and to cast his ballot on election day for either one or the other of the candidates seeking parliamentary honors.

The electors held the key to the situation in their own hands. The representatives were elected by the common vote, and if the wrong men were elected, the people themselves must bear the blame. Mr. Robinson said that he was a party man to the extent that one always knew where to find him; he was not narrow, he always recognized his opponent's good qualities, but was sorry that he held wrong views. He was proud of the fact that Summerland always turned out a good vote and he hoped that they would live up to their reputation at the forthcoming election. A large number of Liberals in the Valley were going to support Mr. Ellison this election.

He applauded Premier McBride's statesmanlike policy with regard to the railway question and was satisfied that he had taken the wisest course for the building up of the country and giving the people what they most desired.

Mr. B. C. Moore said that he had come to British Columbia prepared to become a Liberal as he had heard so much about a rotten government and dishonest administration of public affairs. The first man he had met and talked to had been a Liberal and he had said that the government was doing good work. Then he had heard J. M. Robinson and everyone knew just what he would say. He believed that when Mr. McBride had come into power, he had found things in bad shape and out of confusion and deficits he had put things on a paying working basis.

Other speakers were D. H. Watson, H. Cancellor, J. C. Robson, and J. McLean. The most free and easy spirit was manifest throughout the evening and the proceedings were enlivened by the interspersion of a number of vocal selections.

Several of the members of a Rossland syndicate which is interested in a land proposition on the outskirts of Summerland, were in town this week in company with Mr. Renwick the surveyor, and went out to their holdings for the purpose of taking levels and making a proper survey of the territory.

EXPOUNDS VIEWS OF HENRY GEORGE

JOHN Z. WHITE GIVES ELOQUENT ADDRESS
ON "CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS."

Unfolds Theory of Land Tax as Settlement of Financial Problems--Advocates Policy of Initiative, Referendum and Recall.

It is a matter of great regret that so small an audience turned out to hear Mr. John Z. White on Thursday evening. Seldom if ever, has so eminent a lecturer appeared in this section of the world and his message was of such a character that every thinking man and woman should hear it. He was introduced to the audience by the chairman, Mr. J. C. Robson, who called upon Mr. C. S. Stevens to add further words of welcome to the lecturer.

Space and time forbids of any extended report of the lecture which was full enough of good things to be worth columns.

He took for his theme "Civic Righteousness, Initiative and Referendum." He went back to the early Saxon era and showed how the landlords financed the nation. In times of war and peace they were the force that provided the funds for the nation's needs. Industry was never taxed. This had come later, when kings had used their powers of arbitration and upset the trend of the centuries. The Anglo-Saxon race stood for freedom. Many times they had been oppressed and burdened, but they had never submitted. Only in British possessions had man been free. In all other countries the Roman law that man was the property of the State, and was subject to state commands and jurisdiction, was in evidence.

Many people believed that conditions extant could not be improved upon, and that it took years of education to bring about any drastic changes. That spirit had been in evidence since world began which led each succeeding race to believe it had reached the acme of civilization. The lecturer propounded the doctrine of land taxation only with no uncertain sound. Taxation of labor crippled the wage earner.

The world was not overstocked, and the whole of the world's population could cultivate and make productive but a small portion of the world's arable land.

He urged upon the people to seek for legislation, giving them the powers of Initiative, Referendum and Recall. That gave the electors the power to remove from of-

For Local Option

EDITOR REVIEW :

Dear Sir—Sir James Whitney, premier of Ontario, as chairman of a great gathering held recently in Massey Hall, Toronto, to commemorate the 21st anniversary of the Canadian Temperance League's work in Toronto, expressed his attitude toward the liquor traffic in very outspoken terms for a man in his political position.

After referring to the danger of the consequences to public men holding pronounced views on this question, and to the fact that it was only in recent years that he had formed a definite opinion on this matter, he said that he was prepared to join in every reasonable movement which is shown to have for its object the minimizing and ultimate doing away with the evils of the drink habit.

He then added that if the time comes when the most ardent advocate of stringent restrictive laws against the liquor evil will join hands with those of his fellows, perhaps some of them not abstainers but who are prepared to do something to lessen the drink evil, a coalition will be formed which will enable the cause of temperance to make more progress in one year than was ever dreamed possible.

In these utterances Premier Whitney shows that he recognizes the key of the great movement of the present time against the liquor evil both in the United States and Canada, viz. that the agitation for restrictive legislation is largely a citizen's movement. We feel so much confidence in the good sense of our fellow citizens in this district, who may not be total abstainers but who are willing to do a little to lessen the drink evil, that we believe that class of voters will give the movement to have a local option law enacted a general support on the 25th of November, so that municipalities may have the right to say whether or not they wish liquor sold in their midst.

Is it fair to a government when it breaks up house and comes on purpose with a proposition to the electors, to have those electors say by their actions, "You go hang, I have troubles enough of my own?" Could there be anything more discouraging than that to men charged with the grave responsibilities of public action? or anything more calculated to encourage graft in high places? If the people don't care, why should they? This may not be sound ethics but it is at least, "not ag'in natur'."

In the present instance, every citizen of these communities, in addition to those larger considerations which should always be enough to constrain a man to be at pains to cast an intelligent vote, has to consider the question whether in this case he is voting for his own pocket if he upholds the hands of the government.

We need very sadly a shorter route to the coast than we have, and some relief in the way of reduced freight rates to the large centres. This the Kettle Valley extension will afford us in due course. The province may have to pay \$5000 a mile for the road but the road is too sadly and badly needed

to stop for that. The new country opened up for settlement to say nothing of what is saved in rates, will go far toward wiping out that grant.

It may not be, doubtless it is not good business to subsidize roads which all too soon are declaring fat dividends; but the cost of construction in this province, unlike other parts of Canada, makes us an exception to what is ordinarily a very good rule. McKenzie and Mann don't have to come our way just now while there are so many calls for their money for branch lines in the north west, and we need arteries of traffic right away. Our case is analagous to the first building of the C. P. R., into the unknown west, rather than to that of other road building at the present time.

The government seems to have made the best business arrangement possible, provided they sufficiently guard the rates to be charged, and do not hand us over from one monopoly to another. This part of the deal is yet open, we understand, to public discussion and legislative action.

We need a short route to Nicola and the coast as well as eastward to the prairies.

NOT ALL HONEST.

A few years ago it was considered that in the Eden of Summerland you could leave your purse on the gatepost and it would be there when you returned to claim it, but we are reluctantly compelled to believe that the halcyon days are past and that all the people of the district are not overburdened with that keen sense of righteousness and equity which leads men to consider it a criminal offence to retain possession of a neighbor's goods without giving value therefor.

From time to time through the medium of this paper, cases of wilful theft have been recorded, and the keeping of goods not belonging to the holder, can only be called by the common, unsavory name of theft.

It is a fair guess to say that at least 75 per cent of the people of Summerland read the Review, yet for the past two weeks, advertisements have been published, making known the facts that in one case a buggy robe was lost, in the other, a lady's fur ruff. The owners not only worked through the medium of the Press but they also made the facts public property by placing notices in the hotel and post office, and one of the three agencies used must, in all reason be supposed to come within the ken of the finder. However, so far neither of the articles in question have turned up.

What is the natural inference? Two persons in Summerland at least have an utter disregard for the rights of ownership. The fact that the finders may not have seen the notices is no excuse whatever. The same mediums were open to the finders as were used by the losers, and it was manifestly the duty of the finders to make strenuous efforts to discover the original owners. The parties who have the goods are just as liable to an action for common theft should they be found with them in their possession as though the robe had been taken from the buggy or the ruff snatched from the lady's neck, and if the owners see them in the possession of another party, they would be quite justified in proving property and instituting a suit for recovery.

Again, while no complaints have been made, it seems to be a common thing for transient visitors at the hotel to roll up a magazine or a paper and walk it off. Only last week, a guest was sitting on one chair with a bundle of "Punch's" on a second chair beside him. A young man came in, lifted the papers, sat on the chair; then quietly rolled up the papers, put them in his pocket, and disappeared before the astonished owner could find voice enough to raise a protest.

The Review will be glad to publish any cases of wilful dishonesty which may be presented in the hope of bringing about a more creditable state of affairs.

BASKET BALL.

On Saturday evening last the first game of the season, and the initial game in the building, took place in the Men's Club.

Basketball is quite a new game in this district, but many of the participants in the game seemed to be very familiar with the ball and the method of handling, although of course at the same time, one or two made mistakes and got their opponent in place of the ball, but the referee Prof. Denton, kept the boys well in hand. The town team were much too heavy for the college, but still they kept their end up very well and one could not say that the town had it all their own way.

One or two very pretty goals were scored and the onlookers who crowded the gallery, were quick to acknowledge same.

POLITICAL BIG GUNS BOOM AND THUNDER

Liberal Candidate, F. R. E. de Hart and his Supporter, Dr. MacDonald Hold the Fort in Empire Hall--Hon. Price Ellison Invited to Speak and Gives Good Account of Himself.

There was a large and interested audience in Empire hall on Tuesday evening when the Liberal candidate, Mr. F. R. E. DeHart invited all interested citizens to listen to an arraignment of the government's railway and other policies by himself and his colleague, Dr. MacDonald of Virden. The Hon. Price Ellison the Conservative candidate was present to give an account of his stewardship and to unfold the government's policy with regard to future legislation.

The meeting was a good one and the crowd good humored. All the speakers had a fair and friendly hearing. Anything approaching friction or hard feeling was conspicuous by its absence.

The chair was ably filled by Mr. J. R. Brown, who after a few introductory remarks called upon Mr. DeHart to address the meeting.

F. R. E. DEHART.

Mr. DeHart was well received and only spoke for a few minutes, stating that he would leave the time to his friend Dr. MacDonald who would do the heavy work of the evening. He disagreed with the government's railway policy because for a considerable distance it paralleled the C. P. R.

The chairman then called upon J. W. S. Logie who spoke for a short time in the interests of the Socialist candidate, Mr. Jas. Johnson.

Mr. J. L. Logie spoke for a short time on Local Option. He contended that the question was not a purely temperance one or confined to the license and liquor questions. It dealt with municipal government and personal freedom. He pointed out that

B. C. was the only province that did not have powers of local option. He concluded his address with an appeal to all, independent of party politics to support Local Option.

HON. PRICE ELLISON.

Hon. Price Ellison was received with great cheering. He said that he had come to the meeting prepared to tear the Liberal policy to pieces, but as the previous speaker had failed to tell what it was he must abandon the project. He had intended holding a meeting that evening himself, but had found the hall engaged by Mr. DeHart. However, it gave people a chance to hear both sides freely discussed. He then spoke on redistribution, and explained that the government had had another year to run, and if the Premier had not decided to go to the country on his railway policy, the redistribution question would surely have been dealt with during the coming year. Redistribution was a difficult question and would injure friends on both sides.

In connection with the railway policy, he dwelt on the records of Messrs, McKenzie & Mann in complimentary terms. The proposed C. N. R. route was to be finished within four years. He dwelt on the great advantages to be derived from railroad development. Taxes in the Kootenays amounted to \$26,000 previous to the advent of railways, the revenue had now arisen to in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000. Messrs. McKenzie & Mann had received great assistance from other provinces. The Dominion government guaranteed bonds for 1400 miles, Manitoba 1800, Saskatchewan 425 miles, Alberta, 900 miles. B. C. proposed to guarantee 600 miles at a cost of

\$21,000,000. He spoke for a considerable time on B. C.'s resources and the part railways played in the work of development.

Provincial revenue had increased from \$600,000 to \$7,000,000. This was due to wise administration of public affairs.

The sale of 266 acres of Point Grey lands brought in \$1,115,000. The remaining 650 acres in the block would sell for about \$3,500 per acre. This was bound to result in reduced taxation.

With reference to the criticism of the opposition, the speaker pointed out that the Liberal leaders of other provinces had done the same as Premier McBride had done, while they had only half the resources of B. C. Referring to the Liberal platform—it lacked definiteness, and in the opinion of an expert engineer, the Hope Mountain route was not feasible according to the opinion of an expert civil engineer.

The McBride proposition was both definite and feasible and promised a railway within four years.

The railroad commission would insure to the people of this district a lower tariff which in turn would compel the C. P. R. to reduce the present rates. Mr. Ellison concluded by asking the electors, in the interests of progress, to stand by the McBride administration.

DR. MACDONALD.

Speaking on Local Option Dr. MacDonald strongly condemned the action of the Attorney General with regard to his attitude towards Local Option. He declared that the temperance cause was not getting a square deal. The present Attorney General had refused the Lord's Day Observance Act and was not likely to favor

Local Option. Speaking on the railroad policy he pointed out that the C. N. R. was composed of two separate organizations, the McKenzie & Mann Construction Co., and the C. N. R., and that the 600 miles of railroad would involve a liability of \$45,000,000 of principal and interest. He contended that the interests of the electors were not fully protected, in as much as no contract had yet been made and that the terms of the present agreement when it came to be crystallized into a contract might be altered to the detriment of the interests of the electors. He maintained that Liberals were just as anxious to see the country developed as the Opposition but not prepared to pledge the interests of the province to such a corporation as the C. N. R. He contended that the grant to the C. N. R. was not essential as they would be compelled to reach the coast to complete their transcontinental. He pointed out that the Liberal policy of building a provincial railroad by the Hope Mt. Route would give the people of the province a shorter and better system and that at lower rates than the McBride Govt. proposition. The tunnel through Hope Mt. would probably cost \$7,000,000 but if it cost \$14,000,000 it would be in the interests of the electors as the province would then have a railroad of 214 miles as against 417. By constructing this railroad the B. C. Govt. would have the key to the situation and could then dictate terms to other transcontinental roads. He then submitted a plan of the proposed road. Speaking on the security the electors had in their guarantee, he contended that the electors could not possibly have a first mortgage on the road as the purchasers of the debentures held the first charge and the Provincial Govts. of Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta all held charge in priority to B. C.

Dr. MacDonald concluded by a tribute to Mr. DeHart as a fruit expert, and declared that the Okanagan was doing more to bring the resources of B. C. before the world than any other part of the province. He read to his audience the result of the fruit exhibit in the Old Country where it had captured the highest awards and mentioned that 90 per cent of this exhibit was taken from this valley.

The Poultry Industry was first recognized in B. C. in 1906 and since that time it has been progressing rapidly. There are many reasons for this progress. There is a great demand for all poultry produce and the prices are very high. It is true that prices of feed are high but the prices for the produce more than offset the extra cost of feed. Demand and supply regulate the markets. Up to the present the supply has not kept pace with the constant and increasing demand, therefore the high prices obtained. We may reasonably expect that prices will be high for some time to come, because: first, the agricultural area of the province will always be limited with consequent insufficient production; second, the province is being opened up rapidly and the mining and lumbering camps, besides the increase in city population, call for more abundant supplies of all food products of which the fresh egg is one of the most staple.

The owners of the land must practise intensified methods upon their land. This is significant in all branches of agriculture. In the last few years of the history of the province many millions of dollars have been sent out of the province for food products. Last year over \$2,000,000 was sent out for eggs and other poultry products. Such large sums of cash leaving the country means a great impoverishment, and the responsibility of producing enough eggs and dressed poultry rests with the poultrymen. But the situation of the industry is rapidly changing and many fruit-growers as well as dairymen are becoming interested in one of the most important industries of the province. In a few years I hope to see dressed poultry and eggs being sent out of the province instead of the cash. We should be bringing in cash.

The outlook for the poultry industry at Summerland is very good. However, there are some disadvantages, not the least of which is the feed problem. In this connection I would urgently impress upon the poultrymen the need of ordering their feeds in larger lots. You should have some form of co-operation. The profits of the middleman must to a certain extent be eliminated. This can only be done through being united.

I cannot see why large orders cannot be sent direct to Alberta, thus saving many dollars for each individual. You should get together to solve your problems.

It has been proven that there is more money in fattening chickens than in fattening any class of live stock but there is still more money in egg production. But before discussing breeds and strains it might be well to point out that anyone who expects the best of success will keep nothing but pure bred fowls. One unfortunate feature in the poultry industry is to see poultrymen changing their breed so often. If one cannot make a success with one breed, the chances are that he will not make a success with any other. If you have one breed now, stay with it and continually improve it. The most profitable classes of fowls for Summerland will be found in the American, English and Mediterranean classes. In the American class we have the Rocks, Wyandottes and Rhode Island Reds; in the English class the Orpington, and in the Mediterranean class we have the Leghorns and Minorcas. Choose the breed best adapted to your own locality and have no other. Rigid selection should be practised. The culls should be weeded out to save the feed bill and give the good layers a chance. A poor layer will not give returns for the feed she receives. The average flock of hens throughout the province is not laying over 80 eggs per hen. The average egg production per hen should be at least 150. One poultryman on Vancouver Island has a flock of hens which average 180 eggs per hen per year. An increase in a few eggs from each hen in a flock of fifty or more means an increase in the returns when eggs are four cents each.

FEEDING FOR EGG PRODUCTION.

It must be remembered that there are other factors than feeding which influence egg production. The health and stamina of the fowls as well as the method of housing have their influence. The laying hens should be well matured and in a healthy state. The chicks should be hatched so that they will be ready to lay early in the fall. Do not force them through the growing season or the chances are they will moult and then will not lay until spring.

Local News Items.

The plumbers' harvest has commenced. People neglected to turn off the water from outside pipes on Monday night. They are sorry now.

Mrs. McDougald of Peachland was a visitor in Summerland during the past week, returning home in company with her daughter, Miss Alice McDougald.

The office which is to be occupied by Dr. Mathison the dentist, is almost ready for occupancy and is located on Shaughnessy avenue, south of the blacksmith shop,

At the college this (Saturday) evening a number of budding orators will debate on woman's franchise. The debaters have been button-holing all who have an opinion to express both pro and con, some weighty arguments may be expected on both sides.

The young people of the district are eagerly looking forward to the completion of the large skating rink which is being erected at the base of the Giant's Head by Mr. James Ritchie. The structure is pretty high up and will catch the early frosts. The rink will be handy for the college students, and much handier for the town folks than Reservoir Lake. The local sports are already talking eagerly over the prospects of a series of first class hockey matches during the approaching season, skates are being unearthed from the debris under which they have been buried during the past season and the runners carefully oiled. The skate sharpening industry will, if the cold weather continues, soon receive quite a boost. Monday is said to have been the coldest of the season when mercury dropped to 12 below freezing.

A communication has been received from the office of Mr. C. P. Walker, manager of the Walker Theatre, Winnipeg, stating that his representative will be here in a few days to interview a number of the leading citizens relative to the production of Shakespeare's "As you like it," which Manager Walker is sending through the west. HENOLOGY---continued.

Give the pullets plenty of free range so that they may develop large frames. Large frames give the birds good constitutions and allow plenty of room for the digestive and reproductive organs. The laying hen must be fat but she must be induced to take plenty of exercise. The number of eggs she lays depends upon the condition of her ovaries, and the condition of the ovaries depends upon the health of the hen. Through exercise the blood is kept in circulation and the digestive and reproductive organs are supplied with large quantities of fresh blood at all times. In this way the hen is able to stand the strain of heavy egg laying. Supply the houses with 8 or 12 inches of litter such as hay or possibly fruit tree leaves. Give them something to scratch in and they will lay much better.

Wheat is one of the best poultry foods. Frozen wheat is just as good as high grade milling wheat and is much cheaper. Oats also make a good food, but oats poor in quality where the percentage of hull is large, should not be fed. The hull is almost indigestible and if large quantities of poor oats are fed injury may result. Barley is a very good food but should not be used too extensively as it is a heating food. Corn is one of the best grains for winter feeding. If the poultrymen of Summerland would get together to buy their grain probably they could secure corn at reasonable prices.

Besides the grains we have the mashes. A few years ago the poultrymen thought it best to feed wet mash, now they find dry mash feeding more satisfactory. To feed dry mash takes much less labor and there is not so much danger of the fowls getting out of condition. The dry mash is kept in hoppers before the fowls at all times. Some good mashes are the following: equal parts by weight of cornmeal, crushed oats and wheat bran with 10 or 15 per cent beef scraps and with 10 or 15 per cent cut alfalfa or some other green food; equal parts by weight of barley chop, wheat bran and low grade flour. Some poultrymen have been feeding beef scraps in separate hoppers. Since beef scraps is one of your most expensive feeds, I would strongly advise the mixing of the beef scraps with the dry mash. It is much more economical and the fowls will take to the dry mash more readily. In feeding dry mash avoid all possible waste.

OWNING OUR OWN FRANCHISES.

The finding of the engineers who have gone forth to estimate the value of the Summerland Development Company's holdings in this vicinity will be awaited with interest, whether a deal results therefrom or not. And in any case it is creditable to the intelligence of the Council that it should pursue negotiations looking toward the purchase of so large and important a franchise as that now held by the Company referred to. Men of business should be open to consider anything whatever, provided it looks toward the good of the order. Enlargement is usually a sign of life.

In this instance the Development Company has shown a very decent spirit in so far as matters have gone. They have not shown a disposition to place a prohibitive price on their holdings and franchises. It is true they will probably want to get their money out of the deal and to stand for a price on plant that is more than its present worth, owing to depreciation; but such a course is not unreasonable, nor anything more than others would do under like circumstances. Presumably they have built up a good business and the good will of a business usually counts for something.

As a matter of fact the Company has shown a commendable public spirit thus far. It has done all that circumstances would allow and even more, to provide modern conveniences for the homes of Summerland. It built, and for many moons operated at a loss we understand, a good, clean hotel. It fixed a water rate at much lower than it might have charged, and than is, as a matter of fact, charged elsewhere, and it has never raised its rates even

though the bulk of its property has been for some time sold. All in all, were we assured that the management of the Company would always be of the same public spirit as in the past, we would be content to leave things as they are.

But we have no guarantee that a new management might not come. The Company might sell out to men who would make it their first business to raise their water rates to the limit, or 100 per cent above what we are now paying, and whose sole concern like that of the Standard Oil Co. would be to "extract the last dollar." Municipal ownership will prevent anything like that, and if the proposition can be financed, the present is perhaps as good a time as any other to take the matter up. Municipal ownership has its own weaknesses, human nature being constituted as it is, but its evils are not irremediable when they come—and besides they may never come; so let the matter be looked at fairly and thoroughly discussed all round as important public affairs always should be, and then when the council gets the business in shape to report to the people, the proposition will not come on them as something infinitely beyond their ken, and they will not feel like a certain poor Scotchwoman who replied, when she was asked if she understood the great Dr. Chalmers under whose ministry she sat, "Guid forbid that the likes o' me should understand Dr. Chalmers."

WOMEN'S FRANCHISE.

Mrs. Sarah Decker of Denver, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, has lived for many years in Colorado. She writes of equal suffrage:

So much has been said and written, both pro and con, upon this subject that it is difficult to present it in any new phase. I shall attempt to give only an individual opinion upon the following much disputed questions:

1. Do the earnest, high minded women of Colorado vote?
2. Does not the vote of the disreputable low class of women counterbalance the vote of the cultivated thinking class?
3. Is it not the case that women generally vote as the men of their household dictate?
4. Has the woman's vote purified politics, and have we banished saloons?

1. In answer to the first question—Yes most emphatically. I do not hesitate to say that the best women of Colorado have

far more conscience in filling their responsibilities as voters, than the men of the same class. It is also true that women of standing in the community have great influence with men who are not particularly interested in public affairs.

We are constantly asked by visitors to Colorado, "But how do prominent women with their many duties and obligations, have time for politics?" To speak to one's grocer, butcher or to a conductor on the car takes only an instant. Then this timid visitor asks, "How do you have time to vote?"—as if voting was like eating or bathing. My dear Madame Behind the Times, it takes about one hour in a year to cast all the ballots necessary and allowable.

2. The women of the half world generally do not vote. They do not wish to give any data concerning themselves.

3. It has not been my observation and experience that women vote as their husbands dictate.

4. Has the woman vote wholly purified politics and have we banished the saloon? No, to both questions—it would be beyond reason to expect such a result. Women have been in churches and in society since the beginning of time, but there are still vicious minds and sinful deeds in both religious and social circles. The most we assert is that if we pour a clear stream into a muddy one we shall have a "moving of the waters" for betterment. The presence of women at the polls as officers and voters has brought quiet and order, while party conventions are much freer from profane language and wrangles because women are sitting as delegates.

Thinking women admit we have made some mistakes since we have had the right of suffrage. This is the experience of newly enfranchised people. In the beginning of equal suffrage in Colorado the guide was the old one of party politics and to me it was a terrible awakening to discover that my party was just as bad as the other, and the other party fully as highminded in its purpose as mine. There is a splendid womanly independence in being a voting citizen and in fulfilling the duty of citizenship.

The last issue of the "Canada Gazette" contained a notice of a call for tenders by the department of public works, for the removal of the wreckage of the Quebec Bridge. This is the first step in the direction of the erection of a new bridge to replace the fallen structure.

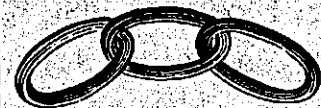

DIED IN SUMMERLAND.

A very sad event occurred on Saturday evening when Mrs. J. R. Elmhurst, late of Central Park near Vancouver, died within an hour of the arrival of the Okanagan, the captain kindly holding up the boat out of sympathy for the sufferer.

The deceased lady had for some time been failing as a result of the ravages of the dread white plague. It was decided to make the trip to the Okanagan in the hope that the dryer climate would to some extent delay the progress of the disease and prolong her life. The train trip was too much for her limited strength and on the boat she started to droop very rapidly. Every assistance available was given her and Mr. Elmhurst speaks in highest terms of the great sympathy and assistance given both by the officers and passengers.

At Summerland the lady was taken into the Supply Company's store and medical aid was called. The sufferer, however, soon passed away. The remains were taken to the home of Rev. Jas. Hood, an old college chum of the bereaved husband, and from that place the funeral cortege took its sad journey to the cemetery where the remains were laid to rest. The service was a most affecting one, the chief mourners being the bereaved husband and little eight year old daughter.

Mr. Elmhurst has decided to remain in Summerland at least for the winter.

SOCIALIST MEETING.

Mr. Jas. F. Johnson, the Socialist candidate for the Okanagan, addressed a meeting of the electors in Empire hall on Thursday night. Mr. Johnson gave a very clear exposition of the principles of Socialism, closing his address with a criticism of the two capitalistic parties.

Mr. Johnson paid special attention to the economic conditions under which the farmer or rancher is exploited, and showed how by his lack of control over the commodity in which is embodied his labor power, he is at the mercy of predatory capital just as much as is the laborer who has nothing to dispose of but his labor power. To control his product, he must own the means of distribution and to get the full value for it, he must vote for the only party which stands for the ownership of public utilities—the Socialist party.

Mr. W. Eugene Knox who is shortly to appear under the auspices of the College Lyceum is certainly a prince of entertainers in his class.

HENOLOGY---concluded

Besides the grains and mashes there are other necessities such as grit, oyster shell or clam shell, green food and clean water. You are very fortunate in having a large supply of green food for the greater part of the year. This means less expense in feeding grains. Field beets and cabbages make the best green food.

I am glad to hear that you are thinking of forming a local poultry association. Through such an association you would be able to better your present conditions, and I wish you every success in your efforts.

In conclusion I would like to call your attention to the fact that we are endeavoring to organize a provincial poultry association. I cannot here enter into the discussion of the objects of such an association. Suffice it to say that it will be of very great benefit to the province as well as to the poultrymen. I trust that we will receive many applications for membership in this association and that we shall with your assistance be able to do something in the way of securing improved strains of breeding stock, cheaper foods and improved methods of marketing poultry products.

FIRST RUGBY MATCH.

In a game of Rugby football played last Saturday, Summerland was beaten 14 points to nil, by the Southern Okanagan team.

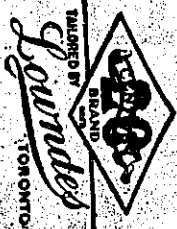
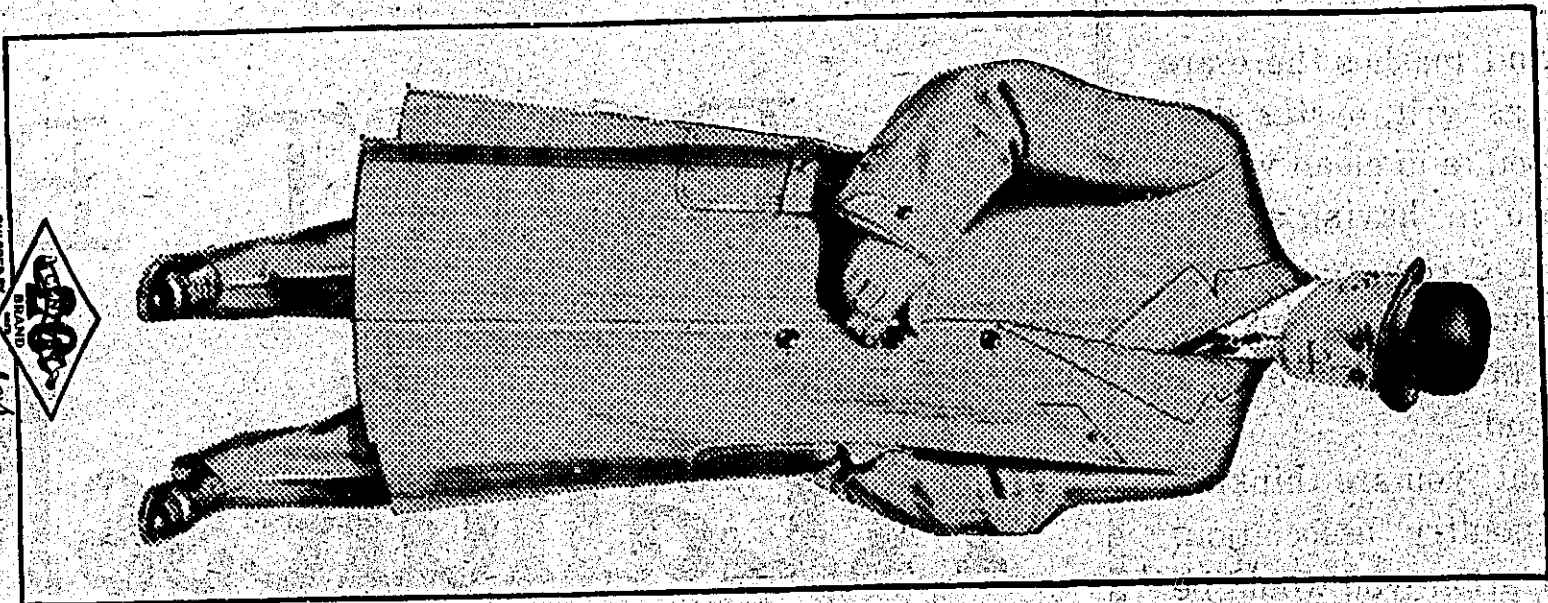

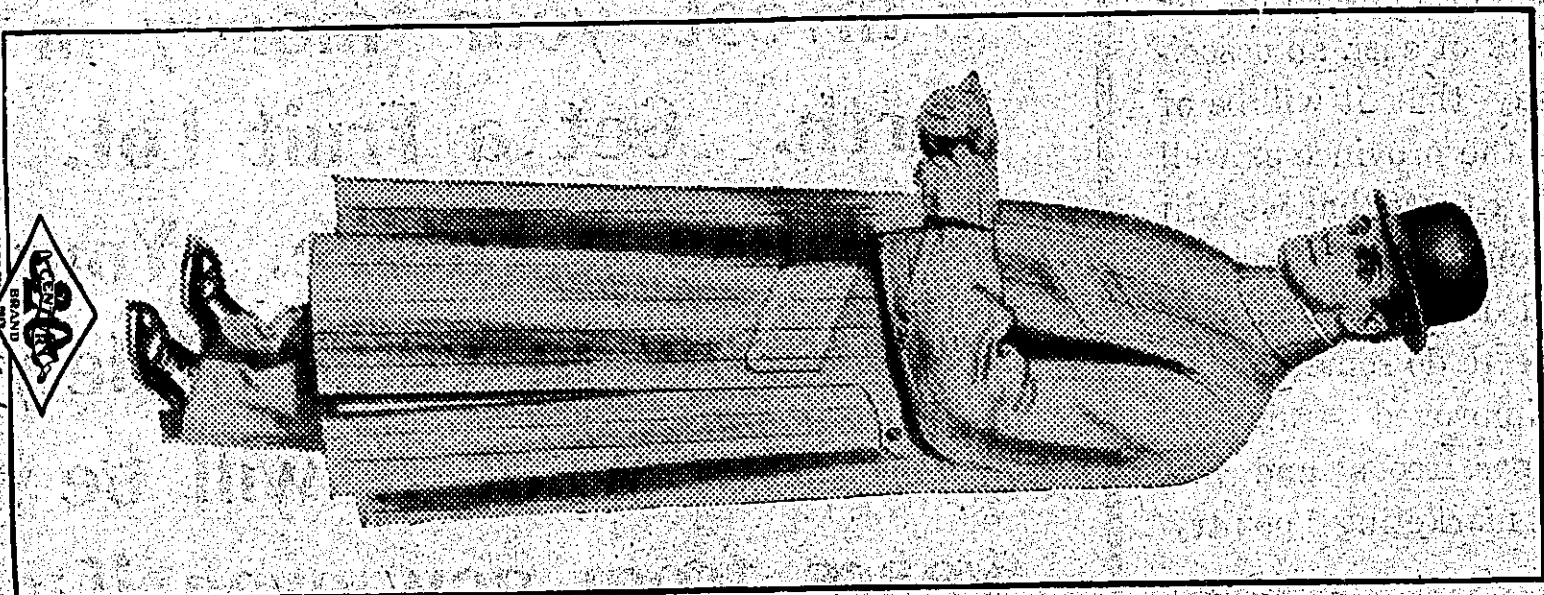

ELECTORS APPROVE THE MCBRIDE POLICY

Conservatives Sweep the Country--Reports to hand only record two Liberals elected--Hon. Price Ellison polls big majority--Minority in only one district--One Poll yet to be reported.

DeHart and Johnson both lose their deposits. Summerland rolls up big vote in favor of Local Option. Local Option Measure believed to be defeated throughout Province. John Oliver defeated in both constituencies and left without a seat. McBride polls majority in both his constituencies.

The elections are over and the hurry, excitement and bustle has given place to either satisfaction or disgust according to the political complexion of the individual.

The Okanagan situation was satisfactory from a Conservative standpoint. Hon. Price Ellison led the procession with 1296 with Mara to hear from. Mr. DeHart followed with 630 and Mr. Johnson, 165. Mr. DeHart and Mr. Johnson both

LOSE THEIR DEPOSITS.

In spite of railway maps manufactured in all sorts of places; in spite of blue ruin prognostications; in spite of forecasts to the effect that McBride's political grave was dug and the mourners had ordered their crepe and white handkerchiefs, and John Oliver of Delta was destined to ride to the Premier's chair on a huge tidal wave of public opinion, the fact remains however that Mr. Oliver was defeated in both his constituencies and is left without a seat. In Victoria, he was defeated by the Premier by 593, in his old stamping ground of Delta, by 20.

The trouble is that the Conservative victory is of too sweeping a character and there is not enough opposition left in the house to keep things lively and healthy. It will need ten fold more wisdom on the part of the premier and his cabinet as a result.

THE FINAL REPORTS

with the exception of Lilloet, state that only two Liberals and two Socialists were elected, and these, strange to say were all on Vancouver Island.

The Local Option returns are not yet in but rumor says the measure has been defeated.

AT THE LAST ELECTION

Summerland did not declare for Mr. Ellison. He and Dr. MacDonald each secured 45 votes, the Socialist captured 13. Without doubt Mr. Ellison will feel satisfied that his constituents have confidence in his wisdom in handling public affairs.

As the government has been returned to power with a largely increased majority, Mr. Ellison's future will be watched with friendly interest.

THE LOCAL VOTE

was a particularly large one. There were in rough figures 350 voters on the list of whom 241 were considered available, of these, 231 exercised their powers of franchise, showing that the public spirit is very much alive in the district.

The campaign has been a warm, but a friendly one and the best kind of spirit has prevailed throughout. There has been no instance in which ill feeling has been manifested and the election campaign has been conducted on fair and above board lines. The opposing parties have conscientiously done their best and the electors have made their pronouncement.

A great deal of profound disappointment has been expressed at the way in which the Local Option vote has gone. The Summerland district did nobly and rolled up a large majority in favor of the measure. Disappointment was also felt on account of the "plumping" system not being workable. A very large number of the leading men of the district had agreed to plump for the measure. The presidents of the two opposing local political bodies had agreed to plump and many others made similar compacts. Summerland however has the satisfaction of knowing fully that her electors did their duty and pronounced in no uncertain manner that they stand for a dry and a clean town.

LAYMEN'S MISSIONARY MOVEMENT.

On Thursday evening twenty laymen representing the different churches, sat down to a dinner in the Summerland hotel as the guests of Rev. C. E. Manning and Mr. Knight of Toronto, who were sent to Summerland to represent the Laymen's Missionary Movement of Canada.

After doing justice to the splendid meal the company adjourned to the church to continue the meeting. J. L. Logie was moved to the chair. Rev. Mr. Solly read the scripture lesson and Messrs. Brown and Stevens opened with prayer. Misses Conway and Brown sang a duet which was much appreciated.

Mr. Knight then delivered a forceful address tracing the movement from its inception three years ago in a Presbyterian church in New York. After three hours of prayer men arose and formulated this scheme for the evangelization of the world. It was born of the spirit. He showed the wonderful difference it had made, in quickened interest and enlarged givings to missions.

Mr. Manning followed with an eloquent appeal, showing the need, considering the crisis in the history of the nations. He said we considered the "Yellow Peril" with all seriousness and sought to plan for the averting of the evil, but a greater peril, a yellow peril, was in our midst—the peril of gold.

The plan of the movement was more fully explained in a splendid address.

The meeting decided to fall in line and a committee for the purpose of calling the laymen together was appointed, with Mr. C. S. Stevens as secretary. A number of the brethren expressed themselves as in sympathy with the movement, and after a vote of thanks a meeting closed which means much for missions in the future.

Dr. Grenfell the noted missionary of Labrador was married on the evening of Nov. 18 to Miss Anna E. MacClanahan of Chicago. The ceremony was performed in the Grace Episcopal church by Rev. W. O. Waters, rector of the church. Dr. Grenfell has an international reputation, having been decorated by King Edward as a companion of the order of St. George and St. Michael and was the first individual to receive such honors as the reward for missionary work. The story of his remarkable accomplishments in Labrador attracted the attention and won the praise of the English speaking world.

THE HON. PRICE ELLISON.

Once again the Okanagan Valley has shown its appreciation of a good, clean man by electing the Hon. Price Ellison of Vernon for another term in Victoria. It was of course a foregone conclusion that he would be elected. He has been too long and favorably known in this valley to escape election.

The thirty three years of his residence in the dry belt have given him a knowledge of conditions such as few or none in the whole of the province can possess. His native shrewdness has enabled him to turn his knowledge to practical account. He has amassed such a competency as a gentleman in his position should have in order that the pangs of hunger or the clamours of his creditors may not inconveniently tempt him from the path of rectitude. He is free to give his whole heart and soul to the service of his country in his department, and we may expect something as a result. The wit which enabled him to amass a fortune for himself should now aid the rest of us to better things, a little to each it may be but a whole lot for the aggregate.

Mr. Ellison has always been the champion of the Okanagan valley. He has stood by it through good report and through ill. He has hung on like a pup to a root, in other days when all that Victoria could see was a strip of coast and three or four cities, and he has come off with numerous appropriations for the opening up of this district. He was loud in his praises of the dry belt and shouted for irrigation till he "split the ears of the groundlings" and compelled the attention of the government.

Mr. Ellison has clean hands, a good head

and a good record and these are political assets of no little value to a cabinet. We are glad Mr. McBride and the people have seen their way to honor the member for this district who has so long and so faithfully served his country in the ranks, and we wish both him and his chief a long, happy and useful career.

GETTING US A NAVY.

There seems to be quite a mix-up of opinion in this matter of the naval aid we are to render Great Britain. Mr. Borden's followers have bolted in an alarming manner, because he found it his duty to support the policy of the Laurier administration in this particular instance. Bell wethers of the flock they are too, who have left his side—Hon. Robt. Rogers and Premier Roblin of Manitoba for example, and there are not wanting those who would say that it is the ambitious scheming of a Brutus and Cassius over again.

However that may be we do not know. Mr. Borden is not a Sir John A. McDonald, nor is he on the other hand, a fool in a high place. He has had a hard row to hoe since he became leader of the opposition and it is not at all certain that any of his detractors would have held things together better or given a better account of themselves in face of a powerfully entrenched government, than he has done.

As to the wisdom of the government's naval policy endorsed by Mr. Borden, honest men in both parties must differ. There can be no doubt about the necessity for extending help to the mother country. The Austro-German alliance and feverish activity in building great battleships in great numbers, both in the North Sea and the Adriatic, is a distinct challenge to the naval supremacy of Great Britain, whatever the Kaiser may say. Actions speak more loudly than words and those terrors of the sea are not being built either for fun or for the protection of German or Austrian shipping. The former would be too expensive and the latter is unnecessary.

Those Dreadnaughts are being built for war, and war with Great Britain. As a recent writer points out, Germany is fighting for life, for expansion and for markets. Like Japan she must grow or die. England, France, Russia—but especially England, blocks her way, and England's only mainstay is her navy scattered over the world. If therefore, Germany can break the Channel fleet she will have England at her mercy, while the Austrian squadron takes care of the Mediterranean as it will be well

able to do when completed.

New Zealand says, we will build a Dreadnaught for that Channel squadron. If we lose there all is lost. Australia, we will with mother's help build a small Pacific squadron for the protection of our own isolated shores. Canada's government says, we will do likewise. We will build a few cruisers and torpedo boats and divide them up between the Atlantic and the Pacific seaboard.

New Zealand may be right. If Germany can wipe out the Channel fleet, a few left overs can bottle up Canadian shipping and eat up our little toy navy by way of amusement. On the whole the building of a Dreadnaught with Canadian money to guard the heart of the empire, might be a larger and more statesmanlike policy than that expressed by the powers in Ottawa. If England builds with our money we shall be free from graft and responsibility; if we build our own toy navy, to what good is it if England falls? Pacific cruisers are no use in the Channel and it is conceivable that our Atlantic stingers might arrive too late. If England falls, who likes may have Canada.

PREDATORY CATTLE.

Reports keep coming in to the effect that cattle are running at large in all sections of the district, people apparently having lost sight of the fact that a prohibitory bylaw is recorded on the municipal books. It is possible that some have misconstrued the situation and jumped to the conclusion that the passing of summer cancels the enactment. The Review has however, been requested to state most emphatically that the bylaw is just as much in force as it ever was and that it would be wiser if the violators would keep their animals in captivity. Fences are being broken down and orchards are being tramped over by strays attracted by the bunches of green grass and cover crops. Others are forcing their way into barn yards and borrowing hay which is valued at \$25 a ton, much to the delight of the owners of the hay who are always most happy to entertain their neighbor's cows and colts. The outcome of the matter will be a subpoena to appear before the magistrate and tell just how it happened and perhaps as a means of showing there is no hard feeling, contributing a few dimes to the municipal treasury.

MOVING MICROBE PHOTOGRAPHS.

A young French scientist, M. Jean Comandon, has, according to Reuter's Paris correspondent, succeeded in reproducing magnified microbes on the cinematograph, showing them moving, feeding and warring against each other in a drop of blood.

This discovery which has been reported to the Academy of Sciences, is expected to prove an invaluable aid to bacteriological research. The tripanosomes of sleeping sickness were displayed on the screen as large as eels, and other germs were reproduced under similar conditions, thus enabling their action and characteristics to be examined in a manner not hitherto possible. The scale of ultra-magnification employed would represent a flea the size of a six story building.

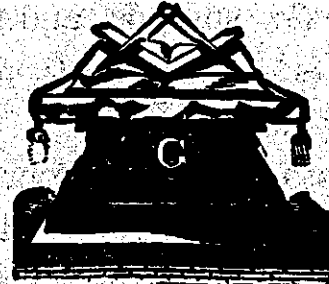

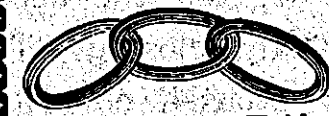

ANENT EARLY CLOSING.

The early closing agreement is not having as good an effect as was hoped when the movement was inaugurated. All the merchants are not, according to reliable testimony, standing by their guns, and as a result, there is a possibility that the clerks may lose the privilege which they have all greatly appreciated.

When a man puts his hand to a document he should at all costs, for the sake of his good name stay by his action. The reason for violating such an agreement is hard to understand, as, if all are closed, no one is getting an advantage. All violators must realize that although they may sell a few dollars worth of goods extra they are losing their popularity, and a business man largely succeeds or fails by virtue of his personal standing with the consumer. A murmur of injustice from the injured ones quickly spreads and the imagined advantage is quickly lost, and once lost is never regained.

The situation will not end with the present crisis as there is every possibility that the municipal council will take the matter up and secure the necessary legislation to compel merchants to do that which they will not perform as a graceful act of courtesy to their fellow men.

In Winnipeg, years ago this matter was fought out. The city secured the necessary power to enforce early closing. The issue was strenuously opposed chiefly by the Jewish merchants of the city, who pooled their interests for the purpose of fighting the enactment. When, however they were pulled by the arm of the law after each violation and fined more heavily for each infraction, they soon sat up and took notice and the matter was settled for all time.

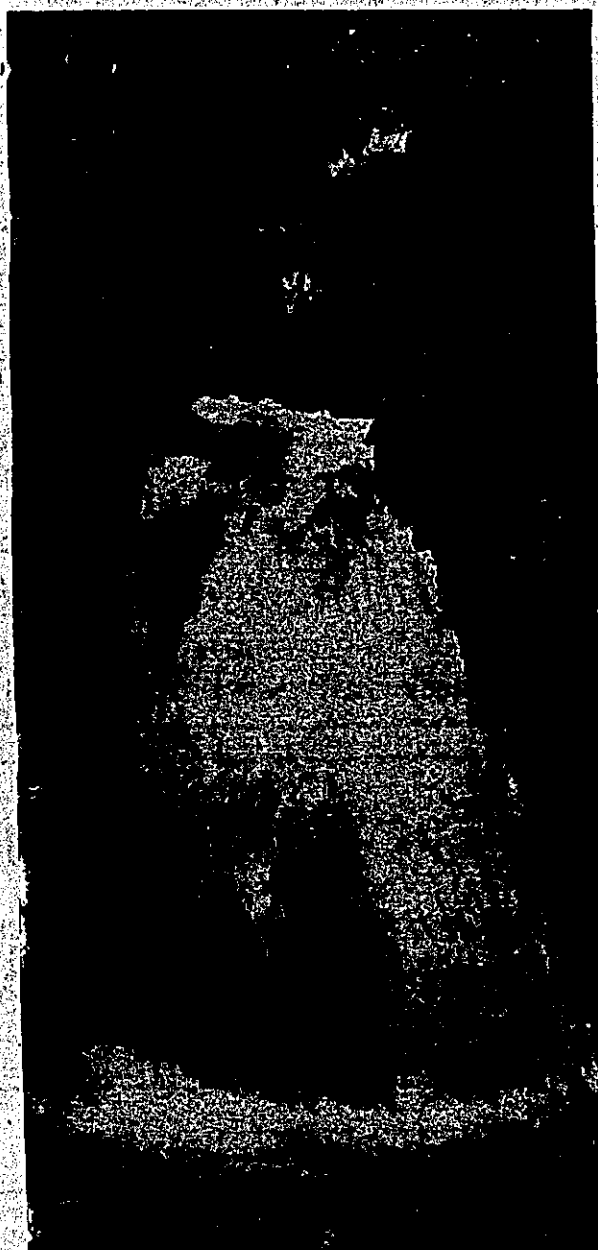

SUCCESSFUL OKANAGAN.

Okanagan Valley Fruit Wins Most Coveted Prizes at Spokane—Samples for the King.

In speaking of the apple show the correspondent to the Province says—Five boxes of the finest Northern Spy apples on exhibit at the National Apple Show will be sent by Canadian exhibitors at Spokane to His Majesty, King Edward VII, through the board of trade, Vernon, the apples being part of the prizewinning Vernon exhibit, which attracted so much attention at the show. Canadian growers also contributed a large part of a present of 21 boxes of different varieties that will be sent to President Taft. Those sending apples to the President are F. G. Funquier, Arrow Lake, B. C., box of Baldwin; Vernon Board of Trade, box of Northern Spys; Kelowna Board of Trade, box of Wagners.

The Vernon exhibits gave to the children in the care of Spokane's Associated Charities six boxes of the best apples while the Salmon Arm, B. C., booth gave the children some fine American Beauty roses.

R. P. Fortune agent for the Salmon Arm Farmers' exchange, has filed with the executive board of the show a protest over the awarding of prizes in the "limited" apple display, claim that the scoring rules in regard to decorative effect were not followed by the judges.

H. C. Mallam of Kelowna, B. C., won the \$100 prize for the best display from the outside the U. S., while the Salmon Arm display was given second in this class.

British Columbia growers beat Montana apple raisers in the contest for McIntosh Reds, Montana's own variety, J. J. Campbell of Willow Point winning a prize offered by Missoula, Montana, people. A. D. Lowe of Vernon was second in the special contest for four tier winter varieties.

Other late awards that went to British Columbia were: H. W. Collins, Carson, second best box Wagners; R. E. Harris, Kelowna, best box Golden Russet; William Cockle, Kaslo, second best box Golden Russet; Coldstream ranch, Vernon, second best box Northern Spies. The Canadian exhibitors had no trouble disposing of their apples for local and eastern consumption.

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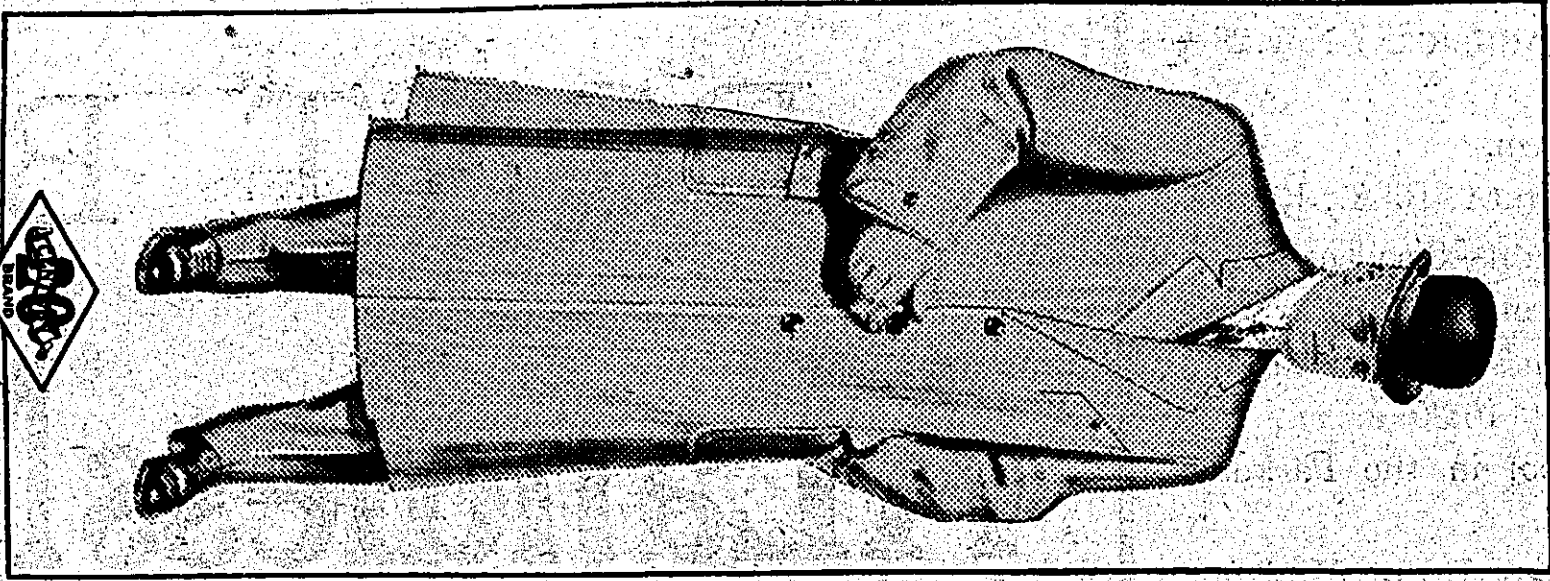

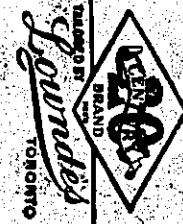
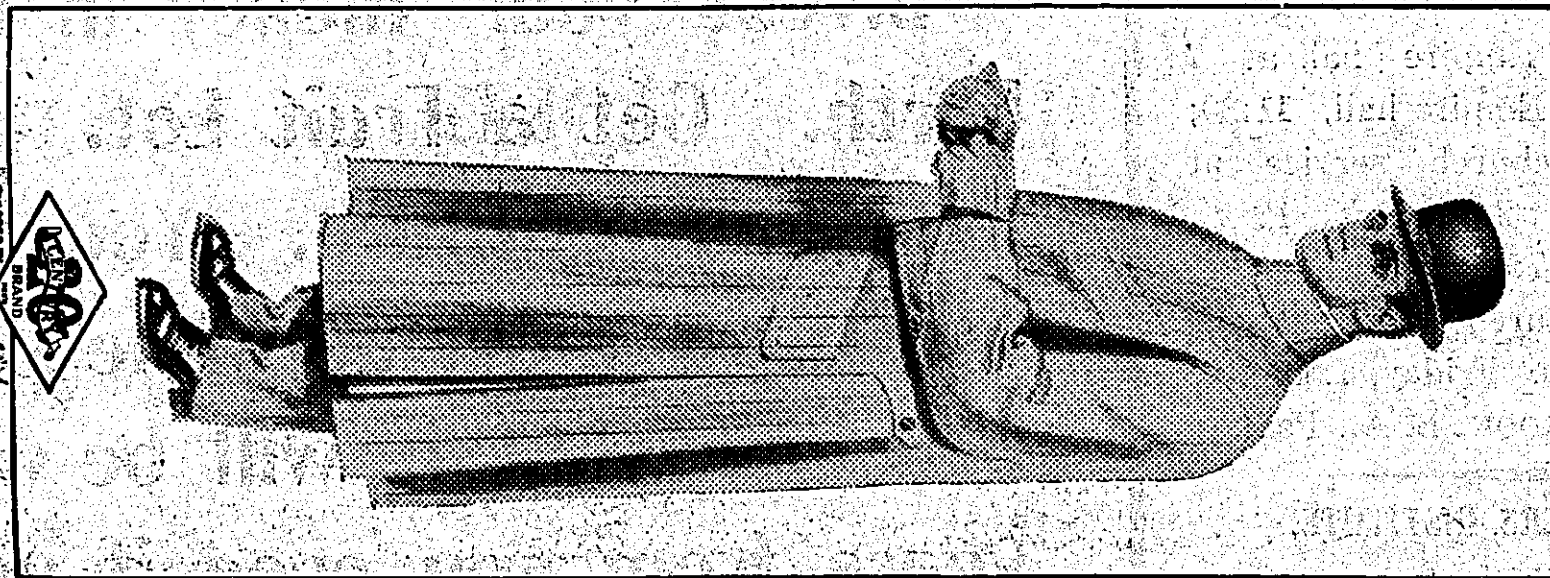
