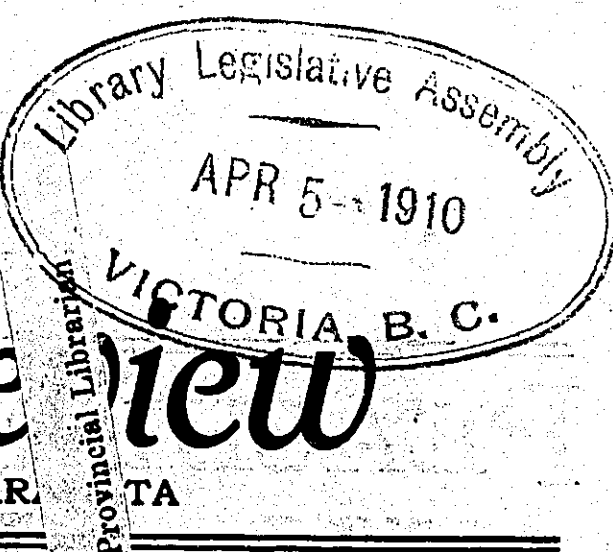

MOST SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION HELD

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS RETURN TO THEIR HOMES. WELL PLEASED.

Officers and Department Heads Chosen for Ensuing Year---Convention Will be Held at Penticton Next Year.

The Sunday school convention of last week proved to be most successful and most helpful to interested Sunday school workers. Fifty-five delegates were in attendance from outside points, Summerland swelling the number to about a hundred.

The district secretary's report was very satisfactory in every respect. Thirty schools were reported in the district, with 240 teachers and 2200 scholars. A general advance was recorded especially in Home department and organized bible class work.

Provincial secretary Williamson gave an interesting general report on the work in the west. The Sunday schools in B. C., numbered 270, with an enrollment of about 23,000.

Much interest centred in the round table conferences. Miss E. Comyn Ching led the conference on Mission work in the S. S.; Miss Greenly the Home Department; Mrs. E. M. Ball, The Essentials of Good Primary Work. Rev. W. C. Merritt, gave the address of the morning session entitled, "How we can train our future S. S. Teachers".

It was decided to recognize the world's Sunday S. S. day on the 22nd of May, on which day special children's services will be conducted.

The afternoon session opened by Rev. M. J. Allen. Rev. D. J. Welsh then gave an excellent paper on "The religious education of the adolescent." This paper was well received. A practical paper was given by Rev. I. W. Williamson, on "How to conduct a worker's meeting." He dealt first with a discussion of the lesson in hand and later with the problems arising out of S. S. work, giving a practical demonstration of how to run a S. S., using the conference members to fill the various offices.

Rev. W. C. Merritt read a paper on "How to study the bible."

The Resolutions committee brought down a number of recommendations, all of which were adopted.

An invitation was given the Eastern B. C. Sunday School Association to hold their next Convention at Vernon during the last week in October.

Dr. Osterhout, of Vernon gave a paper on the advantages of the new graded course.

The evening session commenced with a banquet in the Men's Club, after which an exhibition basket ball match was played between the College and Town, the latter being the victors. The spectators all thoroughly enjoyed the exhibition.

At the closing session a paper was read by Rev. D. G. McDonald, of Peachland and was followed by a paper by Rev. Mr. Merritt, on "The A. B. C., Movement" This was Mr. Merritt's third contribution and was considered by many to be one of the choicest features of the whole convention.

Throughout the convention everything went with precision and the greatest good-fellowship prevailed.

The delegates were all pleased with the sessions and delighted with the reception accorded them by the people of the district.

The regular meeting of the W.C.T.U. will be held on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the parlour of the Men's Club.

A meeting of the members of the Football Club will be held at the Summerland Restaurant on Saturday evening at 8 o'clock.

PEACHLAND ABLAZE WITH ELECTRIC LIGHT

Hon. Price Ellison formally Opens New Era in the Sister Burgh of Peachland by Switching on the Lights for the First Time.

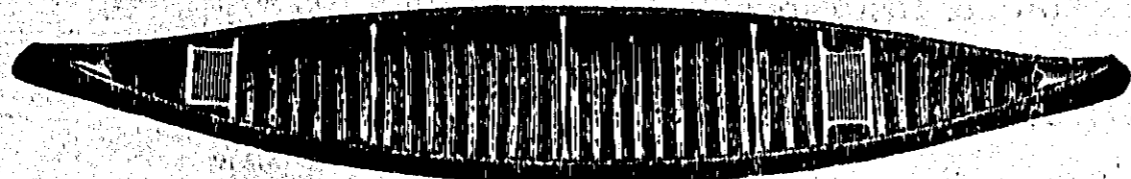

IS IT COMING AT LAST?

The report that the C.P.R. have decided to begin work this year at Merritt, Penticton and Midway, or what will be the extension of the Crow's Nest line is news we are tickled to hear. This not merely because of what it means in itself, but because of its collateral significance, for if the C.P.R. is getting busy in that direction we may be sure it is because they have to. Mr. Hill must be prodding them up with intentions which have somehow become known to them. The C.P.R. has so much opportunity to build on the prairies where freight accumulates faster than in the mountains, that nothing less than the fear of Mr. Hill's big spoon dipping into the trade of this valley would spur them on to such action.

This line will be of inestimable benefit to Summerland. It will bring us into close touch with the great coal fields of Nicola, and that will mean cheaper fuel. It will give us easy access to the coast and shorten the time for peach or man in reaching that market in an age when time is essentially money to the poor. It will place us on the greatest highway across this continent, for the C.P.R. would have built its main line this way in the first place, had it not been for the pressure of the Dominion Government, which feared having its main artery of transportation too near the American knife in case of trouble between the two countries.

It will give us a very direct route to the prairies, Winnipeg and St. Paul, cutting off nearly two hundred miles, to say nothing of the excursion north to Sicamous we now have to take in order to get out. It will have easier grades and consequently lessened charges of transportation. It will

give us direct access to the camps of the boundary country and it will give us what we have long been sighing for, a competition in transportation.

What is more, by the levies of the C.N.R. bill we shall have in addition some kind of check on the rapacity of corporations by reason of the parliamentary control of rates provided for this session.

In fact, in a few years we shall be on the main line of travel, and the flyers to the great cities will be passing by our doors. Yes, that rumour is good news to us and the money spent in the vicinity in railway construction will not prevent our feeling happy over it either. Add that to the civic programme and there should be "something doing" around Summerland this year.

A BLOW TO BOSSISM.

Speaker Joe Cannon was downed by the insurgent Republicans and Democrats some time ago in the American Congress. We were delighted to hear it, for unfortunately Uncle Joe represented one of the greatest abuses of power in the land, and when the bolters locked horns with him they played, in our judgment the part of real patriots.

During the past fifteen years it has become largely the custom to do parliamentary work in committee. This has arisen naturally, and perhaps unavoidably, since there is such a quantity of business to attend to in the affairs of so great a republic, that Congress would need to be in session all the time to attend to it, if every member were allowed to speak to every measure ad lib. as is the custom elsewhere, and as the custom used to be there.

To get around the difficulty increasing powers were put into the hands of the various committees, and as these veterans got accustomed to their work in all its details they gradually became, by virtue of their superior knowledge, supercilious in their bearing toward the House. At length the House itself began to be the tail on the dog. As the great committees wagged it so it went. All important business went before these great committees. Capitalists lobbied with them. In the corner things were fixed up and then good Republicans were expected to vote as directed in the report of the committee on pain of being read out of the party they were elected to support. To protest was to become an insurgent; to swallow what was given and to do it with a smile, became the chief duty of every Republican legislator, and his one hope of securing a few scraps from the

political mess for his constituents at home.

Now the evil spot in all this was not so much that larger powers had been given the more important committees: it lay in the fact that the appointment of the men on those committees lay with the Speaker absolutely. As the Speaker is elected by the party it followed that his appointments had to be good party men first. Then they had to naturally give good evidence that they would see things as they ought to be seen, which is of course as the speaker sees them; and so the powers of government came to rest very largely in the hands of one man, and the Republic came to be ruled by a Czar in the person of Mr. Speaker.

As for the small fry in the House their business is to look pretty and say nothing. As a sop to their constituents, however, they are allowed five minutes on occasion, but as the balance of the two hour oration is found in the Hansard, to which he proudly points ("applause" and "cries of 'hear, hear,'" being judiciously inserted throughout) his Wisconsin constituents naturally think that they have done the proper thing in sending such an influential and persuasive speaker to help make the laws of a great nation.

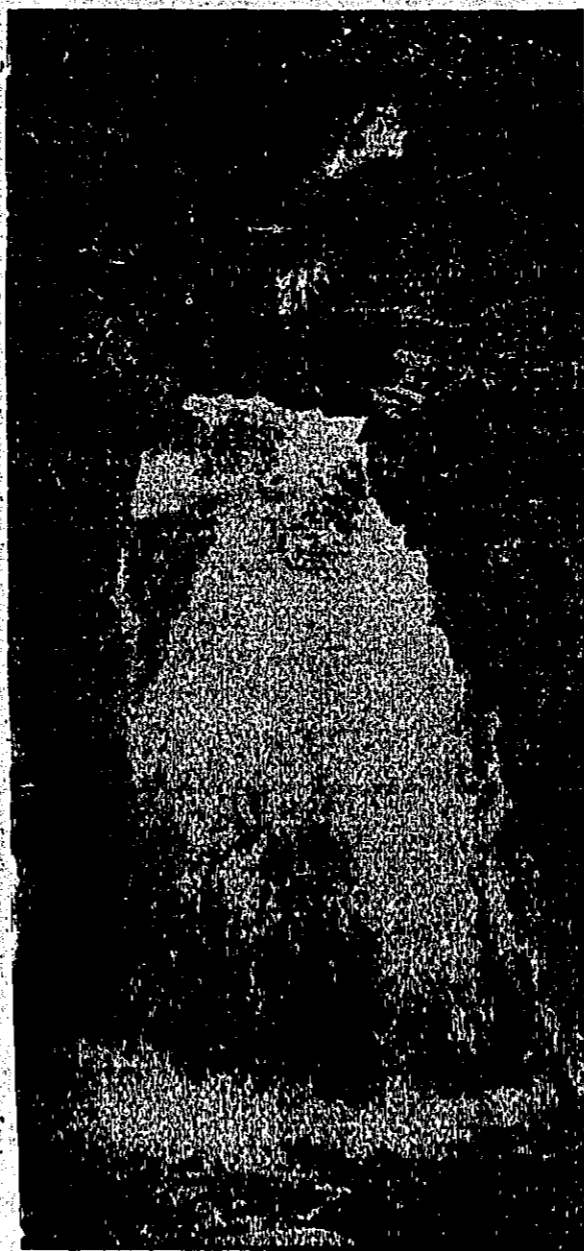

HOME AGAIN.

Mr. Alex. Steven Returns Home After Enjoyable Trip to Bonnie Scotland.

Mr. Alex. Steven returned to Summerland on Good Friday last after a three month's visit to the old country. According to Alex.'s story, he certainly must have had the time of his life. Not only did he have a good time personally, but he did a lot of useful missionary work for B. C., and already the fruits of his labors are being made manifest by the influx of the most desirable class of immigrants. He brought out a number with him, all of whom have already gone to work. Others are coming.

The plan adopted for work in the old country was the visitation of the immigration offices and making it known that he was from British Columbia. Wherever he went he was besieged with enquiries about the west and in many cases the only hindrance to immediate emigration was a lack of the necessary money to make the break. There was apparently a large emigration to Australia, on account of assisted passages being given to that continent.

While looking into conditions and seeking the best object lesson to be used for prospective settlers, he found that one of the first questions asked was relative to the cost of living in the west, the general opinion apparently being that living was almost out of reach. As a matter of fact, he found the average wage in Scotland about \$5 a week, while here the average wage is about \$60 per month, approximating 300 per cent higher, while living in the west is only about 15 per cent in excess of the old country.

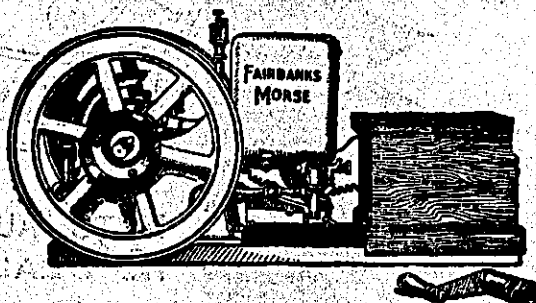
Part of Mr. Steven's time was spent with Mr. McKerracher, who runs the government seed waggon, and who is doing valliant service in the interests of Northwest immigration. Together they were kept busy, and were so besieged with enquirers that on several occasions they were compelled to move off.

Without doubt Aleck did good work. He was from one end of Scotland to the other and those who are coming, as a result of hearing "the gospel according to Aleck" come from every section of the land 'o cakes.

It is expected that Mrs. Steven will come along a little later in the season. Of course by Mrs. Steven, we mean Aleck's mother who will make her home with her sons, di-

viding her time between Summerland and Kaleden. However, Aleck says he hasn't had enough of Scotland yet, and won't be satisfied till he has made another trip.

Starting with the first of April, post offices are to be opened at Shingle Creek and Kaleden. The former will have a weekly service and the latter tri-weekly.

Oxford defeated Cambridge at the historic boat race on the 23rd, by three and a half boat lengths.

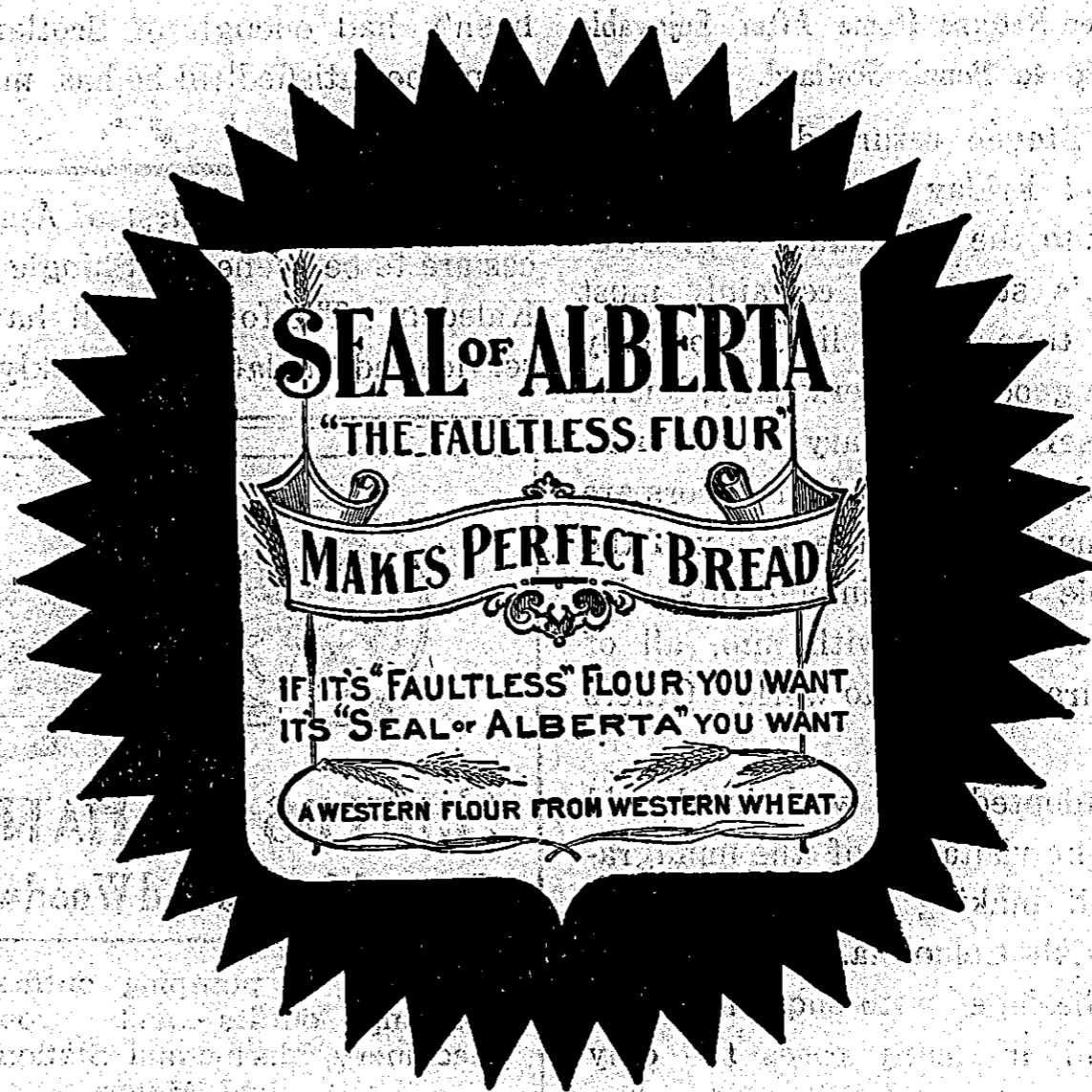
Mount Etna has been in violent eruption. Soldiers were set to work to dig trenches to carry off the molten lava. Several villages were saved only by great exertion.

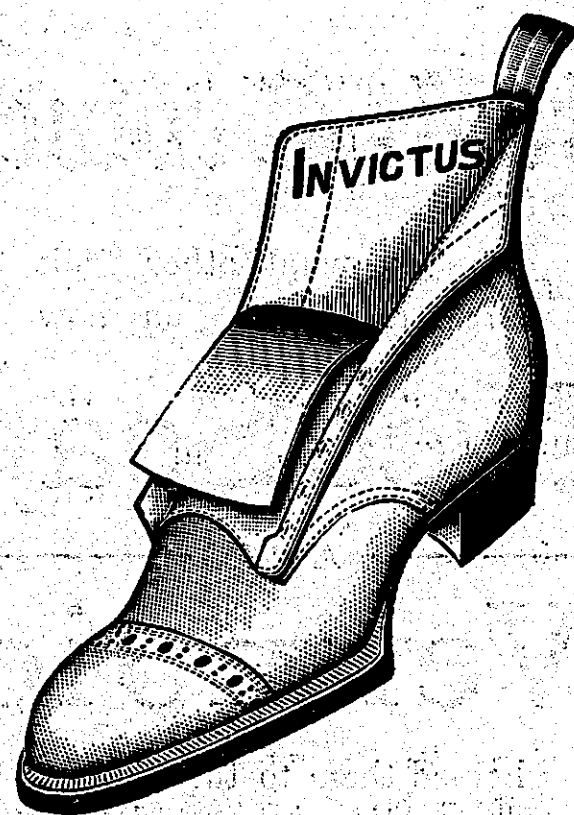

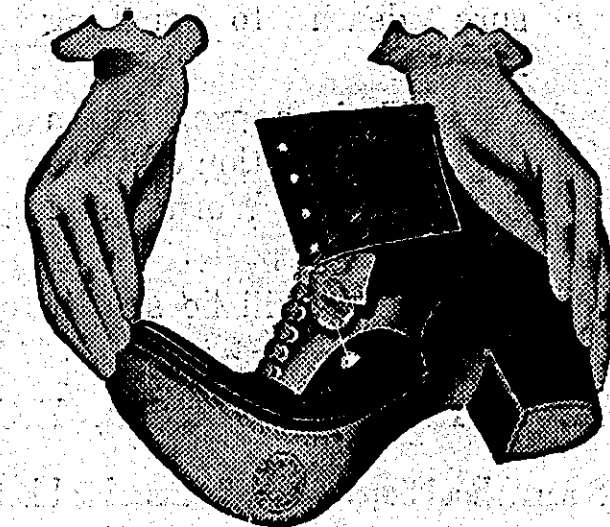

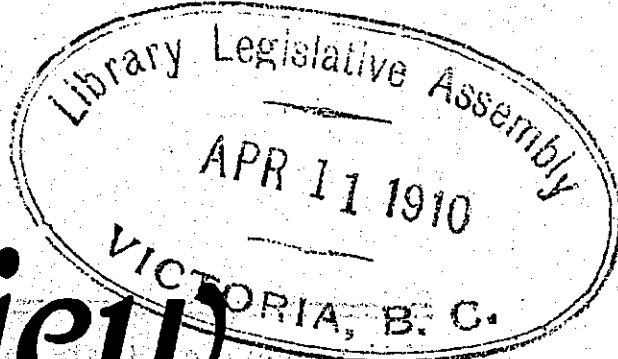

COUNCIL STARTS CLEAN-UP CRUSADE

SANITARY INSPECTOR APPOINTED, WITH POWER TO ENFORCE DEMANDS.

Water and Road Commissioner, Municipal Accountant and Other Officials Appointed---Petitions to be Signed by Ratepayers.

The regular meeting of the Municipal council was held on Monday forenoon. All members of the council were present except Councillor Brown. A considerable amount of business was transacted and history was made.

The council has inaugurated a clean-up campaign, with Mr. D. H. Watson as sanitary inspector. Mr. Watson has already commenced operations, and clean-up activity is already in evidence. A water and road superintendent, was formally engaged also a municipal accountant and municipal teamster.

Communications were received as follows:

From A. F. Solly, requesting that the irrigation flumes be extended so as to include his property.

From C. H. Burgess & Co., Toronto, and Savage & McGavin, Winnipeg, re purchase of debentures.

From Percy Thornber applying for position of electrician.

From T. B. Young, re completion of his contracts.

From J. C. Robson asking permission to camp in Peach Orchard by mouth of creek.

From A. E. Moore asking permission to camp in Peach Orchard.

From Thos. E. Moore, asking leave to take gravel from side of road, about 25 yards east of his premises for the purpose of filling in approach to his store.

Councillor Ritchie brought up question of filthy condition of lake front and asked what could be done to put things in shape.

The following petitions were approved by the council and are being submitted to the ratepayers for signatures:

1. For raising debentures to the extent of \$80,000.
2. Garnett Valley Irrigation system, water agreements, dam, &c.

3. Completing and extending the Domestic water system.
4. Domestic Water system.
5. Water records, agreements, &c.
6. Purchase of Electric Light system.

GYMNASIUM FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

LARGE AND COMMODIOUS STRUCTURE IN COURSE OF ERECTION.

Students Work Hard for Project Assisted by Faculty—About \$4,000 to Expended on the Building This Term.

Work has been commenced on the College gymnasium, at the foot of College Hill and west of Dr. Anguin's cottage.

The work of excavating is an accomplished fact and work on the main structure has been commenced. Volunteer labor is being utilized, the residents of the district giving the use of their hands and teams for the purpose. In that way, the building will be built at a minimum of cost.

The plans call for a truss roofed building, 40x90 feet, with a gymnasium floor 40x70, with an elevated stage at the rear for the accommodation of spectators, the width of the building and 40 feet deep. Below the rear of the building there will be a basement in which will be located ladies and men's dressing rooms, parlor, Instructor's room, furnace room, shower baths, etc. The main entrance will be at the northwest corner of the building and another entrance will be adjacent to the stage.

The equipment of the gymnasium will be as complete this year as the money in sight will furnish and the same with the finishing. It is expected that in the neighborhood of \$4,000 will be expended this year and it is hoped that the building will be completed by the end of the present term. A concert will shortly be held in aid of the gymnasium fund.

The students of the College are to be complimented on the manner in which they have worked for and carried to a successful issue their gymnasium project. They recognized the need of such an institution and with commendable energy, went to work to provide for their own needs,

With the full approval of the faculty they started a subscription list, giving among themselves as largely as possible. They then sent one of their number, Mr. Ward Duncan, to the coast in order to coax the elusive dollars out of the pockets

of the people of that section of the country.

His silver tongue and persuasive powers made him successful, and warranted the proceeding with the project. Plans were secured from Architect Peters of Kelowna which, after some changes and modifications were accepted.

Such an institution will do much for the students of both sexes, as it is a recognized fact that mental and physical energies are inseparably connected. The action of the students of to-day will benefit the students of future generations and their enterprise is worthy of fullest commendation and support.

Boat service is being inaugurated on Nicola Lake.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster has retired from active politics on account of ill health.

Greenwood liquor licenses are to be reduced to five at \$900 per year each.

The contract has been let for a \$70,000 Y.M.C.A., building in Victoria.

Reciprocity is being discussed by Canadian and American officials at Washington.

The Imperial Limited between Montreal and Winnipeg starts April 16 and from Winnipeg to Vancouver shortly after.

Canada's Customs revenue returns show an increase of \$4,000,000 over previous year and have passed the \$100,000,000 mark.

A big seizure of opium was recently made at Vancouver which was valued at \$2000. The casks were labelled vegetables.

The town of Ladner is to have a water-works system. Debentures for the purpose to the extent of \$135,000 are being issued.

Ex-President Roosevelt has determined to forego an audience with Pope Pius rather than comply with conditions imposed. The press blames Mons. Merry Del Val's imperiousness for the difficulty.

A couple of trapper's shacks, fully equipped, and indications of activity in catching fur bearing animals were recently discovered in the heart of Stanley Park, Vancouver. The occupants had taken alarm and fled.

SUMMERLAND'S ASSESSMENT.

The municipal assessor has furnished the following interesting figures on the 1910 assessment.

For a place only a few years old the figures are remarkable, especially when it is remembered that they represent land values only. It is doubtful whether Mr. J. M. Robinson, when he laid his plans for the opening of this district and formally turned the first sod less than seven years ago, had any conception of what would be found seven years hence, large as are his ideas of the possibilities and prospects of the Okanagan Valley. In the editorial of a couple of weeks ago we placed Summerland's 1910 assessment at approximately \$1,500,000. As it transpires we were well within the limit, as the new assessment roll exceeds the estimate by nearly \$23,000. The figures stand as follow:

TEACH CITIZENSHIP.

A short time ago the citizens of the ill-starred city of San Francisco, after much talk from press, pulpit and platform, called a meeting to discuss the graft evils of their civic life, and if possible, to find to what influences they may have been indebted for the "bad eminence" to which they have attained in that regard.

Certainly they have attained, for in a nation full of graft eaten cities, there is none so wholly sold to evil as San Francisco is, and has been. Justice has been bought and sold like merchandise and any vice which could afford to pay its way, needed not to fear the lex talionis, so much dreaded in all well regulated communities.

At the meeting referred to, a committee was appointed to investigate and report on the causes and the cure of the sad ills of the body politic. This committee in due course rose from its labors and presented an elaborate report, one clause of which reads as follows:

"No child should be permitted to leave the grammar school until he has thoroughly instilled into him a strong sense of his obligation to the state to set aside all prejudice and private interest and act as a jurymen in any case on which he may be summoned. He should be taught that this obligation is sacred, that its performance is the highest kind of public service, outranking the mere physical courage and devotion of a soldier." To which we say. Amen. Religion may be safely left out of the school curriculum, since we do not conceive it to be the business of the state to teach a man his relation to his Maker. The civic compact was not made for that, and the more strictly it keeps its

hands off it, the happier is a people likely to be. If the home and the church can't attend to the religious part of man's life, then certainly the polyglot state cannot do it.

But with ethics, with man's relations to his neighbor, the state is most directly concerned, since the state has to pay the price of a defective code in practise, and may even find its deepest life and best interests imperilled, as in the case of the city mentioned. In every jail, penitentiary, reformatory, poor house and asylum, we are paying in cold cash for the lack of ethical development in our citizens.

Yet it never seems to occur to the educational authorities that a boy's moral nature may be as important to the state as his intellect. "Intellect, like ice, is cold and colorless. No one has more of it than the devil." What we need is not so much more intellect as better conduct, but unless a boy is properly instructed as to his conduct, how is he going to know how he should order it? Especially when his conduct relates to that indefinite and many headed thing that we call the state.

It is not enough to teach the boy who is entering the unknown world of manhood his duties to the state; he should also be taught his duty to his neighbor and himself, and the lessons should be as well taught as his mathematics and his history. The subject is just as important and may be a little more so, and it should not be scamped or allowed to be regarded in a cavalier manner by the teaching body.

Given such a text book of morals for boys entering the high school, at an age when they are naturally anxious to learn all that may become a man, and a long step will have taken towards cleaning up the political cesspools of fifteen years from that time. We could well dispense with some of the lessons on drawing cubes, spheres and other artistic gimeracks, for the sake of a few minutes given to pounding into plastic brains some of the great essentials of manly conduct, as men will shortly be expecting the boys to exhibit it.

If children have to be taught the superficial manners of the table and the drawing room, what right have we to expect that instinct or the stars will teach them the profound truth, that such a task as serving on a jury, "is the highest form of public service, outranking the mere physical courage and devotion of a soldier."

If boys got something of this training the time would soon come when every alderman would not have to prove his inno-

cense, nor every member of parliament retain a special solicitor to defend his best intentions against the ungrateful, spiteful or vicious aspersions of the mob on the other side of the political fence.

Let us teach citizenship intelligently and teach it concurrently with those other rudiments which lie at the base of all knowledge subsequently acquired.

The action of the municipal council in taking active steps towards improving the sanitary condition of the water front and district, will be generally applauded and the choice of Mr. D. H. Watson as sanitary inspector, with power to go ahead and do things up in good shape is also a happy thought. D. H. has a reputation for doing things, and those who don't want to be "done" would do well to take the mild suggestions which he may make, seriously, especially as we now have a magistrate in the district in active commission. All should combine to make it "sanitary Summerland" as well as "sunny Summerland."

In our report last week of the Easter celebrations at the Anglican Church, Good Friday was inadvertently included as a day of special rejoicing.

District Municipality of Summerland By-Law No. 24.

A BY-LAW for raising \$23,500 to purchase the irrigation system and plant of The Garnett Valley Land Company, Limited.

WHEREAS by an agreement bearing date the Sixth day of April, A. D., 1910, the Garnett Valley Land Company, Limited, agreed to sell to the District Municipality of Summerland who agreed to purchase from the said Company the latter's irrigation system and plant as defined in said Agreement, for the sum of \$23,000, upon the terms and conditions in such agreement set forth.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to complete the said purchase.

AND WHEREAS in order to pay for the said irrigation system and plant, including in such price engineering and appraising charges, it is necessary to raise by way of a loan upon the credit of the said District Municipality of Summerland the sum of \$23,500, payable on the fifth day of May, 1940, bearing interest in the meantime payable half yearly at the rate of five per cent. per annum.

AND WHEREAS for the payment of the said principal and interest it is necessary to raise the sum of \$1594.00 by rate in each and every year.

AND WHEREAS the whole rateable property of the District Municipality of Summerland, according to the last revised Assessment roll, is \$1,522,000.

AND WHEREAS the total amount of debenture debt of the said District Municipality of Summerland is \$25,000, of which none of the principal or interest is in arrears.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Reeve and Council of the District Municipality of Summerland, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the District Municipality of Summerland to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same on the credit of the said Municipality by way of the Debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$23,500, and to cause all such sums so raised and received to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said Municipality for the purposes and with the objects hereinbefore recited.

2. It shall be lawful for the Reeve to cause any number of debentures to be made for the sum of not less than \$500 each, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum, not exceeding in the whole the sum of \$23,500, and all such debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Municipality, signed by the Reeve and countersigned by the Treasurer of the said Municipality.

3. The said Debentures shall bear date the fifth day of May, 1910, and shall be made payable in thirty years from the date hereinafter named for this By-Law to take effect, at the agency of the Bank of Montreal, in the Townsite of Summerland.

4. The said debentures shall have Coupons attached for the payment of interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on the amount of the said Debentures, and such interest shall be payable half yearly on the fifth days of May and November in each and every year, and the signatures to such Coupons may be either written, stamped, printed or lithographed.

5. A rate on the dollar shall be levied and shall be raised annually in addition to all other rates on all the rateable property of the Municipality sufficient to pay interest on the debt hereby created, during the currency of the said Debentures and to provide for the payment of the said debt when due.

6. The sum of \$1175 shall be raised and levied annually by a rate on all the rateable property in the Municipality, in addition to all the other rates, for the payment of the interest on the said debentures.

7. The sum of \$419.00 shall be raised and levied annually by a rate on all the rateable property in the said Municipality in addition to all other rates, for the payment of the debt hereby created when due.

8. It shall be lawful for the said Municipality from time to time to re-purchase any of the said Debentures at such price or prices as may be mutually agreed upon and no re-issue of any Debenture or Debentures shall be made in consequence of such re-purchase.

9. This By-law shall, before the final passage thereof, receive the assent of the Electors of the said District Municipality of Summerland in the manner provided by the "Municipal Clauses Act, 1906," and Amending Acts.

10. This By-law shall come into force and take effect on the fifth day of May, 1910.

11. This By-law may be cited for all purposes as the Second Irrigation Purchase Loan By-Law 1910.

A By-law to raise \$77,000 to purchase the irrigation system and plant of the Summerland Development Company, Limited.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to repair, enlarge, extend and improve the Domestic Water system and plant recently purchased from the Summerland Development Company, Limited.

AND WHEREAS it is necessary for the said purposes to raise by way of a loan upon the credit of the District Municipality of Summerland the sum of \$44,520, payable on the fifth day of May, A.D. 1940, bearing interest in the meantime payable half yearly at the rate of five per cent. per annum, the principal of such sum when raised to be applied for the purposes aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS for the payment of the said principal and interest it is necessary to raise the sum of \$3018.44 by rate in each and every year.

AND WHEREAS the whole rateable property of the District Municipality of Summerland, according to the last revised assessment Roll, is \$1,522,000.

The fleet sailing Orillia is once again hard at work delivering orders of lumber for the Smith Lumber Co.

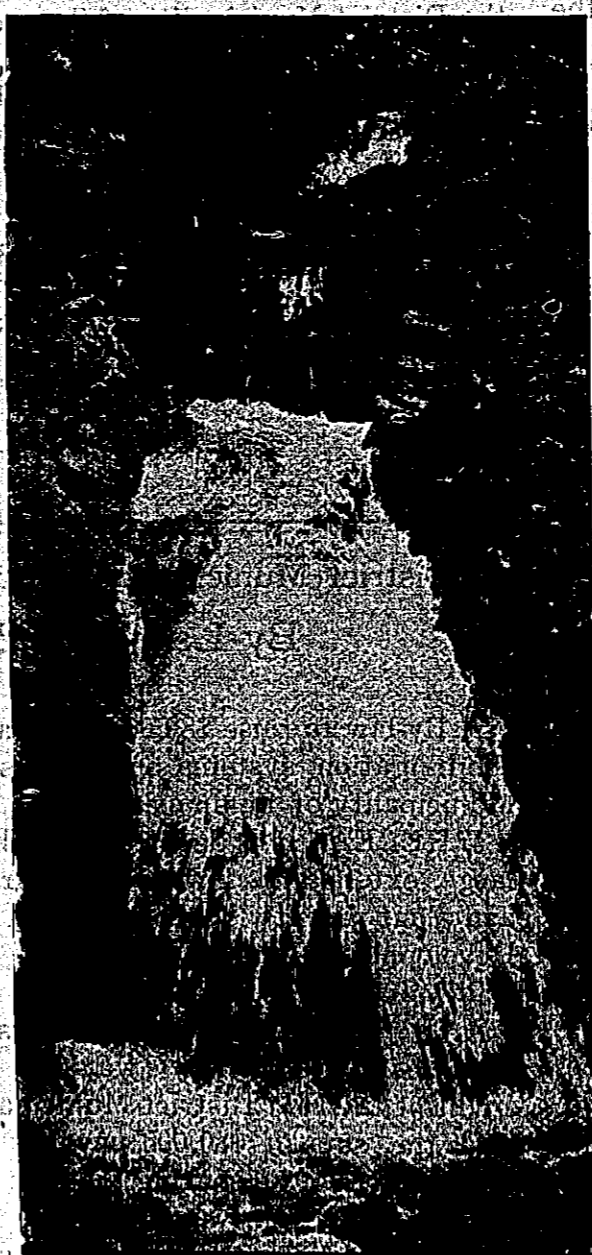
The young folks who are members of the Card Club met last Tuesday evening and spent a pleasant evening at the home of Mrs. T. H. Boothe.

CAPTAIN TATLOW IS CALLED HENCE

PROMINENT FIGURE IN BRITISH COLUMBIA
DIES AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT.

Frightened Horse Throws Ex-Minister from Trap,
Causing Fatal Injuries—Brief Account of
his Public Career.

Capt. R. G. Tatlow, late Minister of Finance and Agriculture for British Columbia died at 10 o'clock Monday morning as a result of injuries received from being thrown from his trap on the preceding Friday afternoon. The funeral which took place on Wednesday afternoon was one of the largest ever witnessed in Vancouver.

The late Captain Tatlow entered the government in 1903, and initiated the Provincial fruit exhibits in the old country.

He was an Irishman by birth having first seen the light on Sept. 6, 1855 at Scarva, County Down, Ireland. He was educated at Cheltenham, England. In April 1893 he married Miss E. M. Cambie, daughter of H. J. Cambie, C. E., of Vancouver.

He was formerly a Captain in the First Prince of Wales' regiment, Montreal, and was attached to B battery, R. C. A., for over a year.

He was an unsuccessful candidate for Vancouver to the legislature in 1894. He was elected to the legislature at the general elections in 1900 and re-elected in 1903. He was chairman of the Vancouver Parks board for eight years.

He was appointed minister of Agriculture and Finance in the McBride government in 1903 and retained it until his retirement in November of last year.

The first report of the tragedy was as follows:

Capt. R. G. Tatlow is lying unconscious at the Royal Jubilee Hospital at Vancouver as a result of being thrown from his trap. On passing an automobile, his horse shied, throwing the Captain heavily to the road: The head and body are seriously injured and his demise is expected.

PERSONALLY CONDUCTED PARTY.

As a result of correspondence between the secretary of the Board of Trade and Mr. F. W. Freir, editor of the Colonizer who personally conducts parties through Canada, arrangements have been made whereby Mr. Freir will bring a large party down the Okanagan, arriving in Summerland on May 23rd and staying over May 24th.

It is hoped that the residents of the district will make every effort to give the visitors a swell time and drive them throughout the district.

NO MORE ROOSTERS.

Mr. Robert Pollock Secures Sexophone for the Determination of Sex in Plant or Animal Life.

Mr. Robert Pollock has secured an interesting little machine, by which the sex of eggs, plants or trees can be determined. More than that, it will demonstrate whether there is life in the subject tested or not.

It works on either human beings, animals, or plants, and is coming into use by poultry fanciers. The instrument consists of a celluloid bell on a metal frame, about the size and shape of an ordinary tumbler. Inside the bell is a pendulum contrivance consisting of a metal ball suspended by a wire. The suspended wire is placed in contact with the hand of the operator, when the pendulum will swing in a circular motion if the object to be tested is male, and straight backwards and forwards if the subject be female. If there is no life, the pendulum declines to move. Unfertilized eggs can thus be rejected, and the proportion of pullets obtained according to the wish of the operator.

The instrument is being generally used in the old country and poultry raisers are reaping excellent results. Mr. Pollock who has secured the agency for Canada, has set a full setting of eggs tested for pullets, and his friends are watching for results with a considerable amount of interest.

The first local ball match of the season was played between the College and Town on Thursday afternoon last. The college team were beaten by 16-2, much to their surprise, especially after having won out against Peachland so very recently.

MUSICAL FEAST BY LOCAL ARTISTS

LADIES' GLEE CLUB AND OTHERS PROVIDE
SPLENDID ENTERTAINMENT.

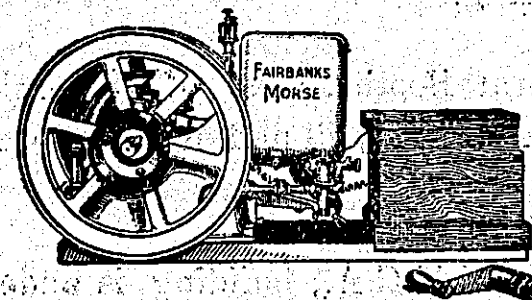

GETTING MORE NEIGHBORLY.

It must be a matter of gratification north and south that the threatened tariff war between Canada and the U. S. A. has been averted. To have strained relations with the next door neighbor is always unpleasant, and Statesmen who encourage it for greed of gold are culpable. Seeds of economic discord always fertilize in rich soil and bear their evil fruit downward. The "dumb, driven cattle" among the populace may not know why or whom they pay, but merchant princes are not to be bamboozled by any methods of indirect taxation, and when they get sour they become mischievous.

The Ottawa government is worthy of commendation for the firm, courteous and dignified bearing they have maintained throughout the diplomatic entanglement and the Hon. Mr. Fielding has plucked such fresh laurels from the hour as will help along considerably, his claim to the rights of succession, when the present veteran leader shall have retired.

In looking over the negotiations and contrasting them with those of other days, it is pleasant to learn that the Republic's symptoms of megacephalus are not quite so violent as they used to be, though still bad enough. The President found it not beneath his dignity (possibly emulating the noble example of his predecessor who was wont to butt in whenever he got a decent chance) to meet our representatives and talk matters over in a friendly way.

Moreover, they were actually obliged to grant certain concessions, such for example as that Canada has a right to mind her own business and give a preference to Great Britain and the other members of the Imperial family if she has a mind to.

This is wonderful when we think of it. The marvel is that they did not twist such a procedure into a violation of the Munro doctrine. In winning the point, Mr. Fielding has played the part of a statesman. Not to have stood firmly there might have compromised Imperial interests in other days very sadly, since precedent has almost the force of law in some cases. To have stood pat is to have maintained an open door for all kinds of possibilities in the future.

Still there are some things hard to understand, as, for instance, why Canadians should continue to pay 50 per cent duty on soaps going to the States, and 60 per cent on other toilet articles in grateful recognition of which we reduce ours from 35 to 32 1-2 per cent. Ditto with millinery, lithographers' supplies and some other things.

There may, however, be compensating advantages elsewhere. The subject is a large one and somewhat involved. If Mr. Fielding has put up a good front on the larger issues, the chances are, he has been not unmindful of the smaller ones. But that phase of it will figure more prominently in the negotiations for a general reciprocity treaty now pending. Let us hope the details will be protected when it comes to that.

COOK AGAIN DISCREDITED.

The Fairbanks expedition to Mount McKinley reached the summit April 3, after a climb of one month from base. No traces of Dr. Cook's alleged ascent were found. Thomas Lloyd, leader of the expedition arrived at Fairbanks, Alaska on Tuesday of last week. His companions were D. Patterson, W. R. Taylor and C. McGonigle and all reached the top of the great mountain.

The expedition, which left Fairbanks Dec., 15, while the controversy over Dr. Cook's disputed ascent was still raging, was financed by Gus Peterson and William McPhee of Fairbanks. The plan was to go into camp as high up the mountain as possible and about the middle of May to make a dash for the summit. The obstacles were not so great as were anticipated. Four camps were established during the ascent and a trail blazed all the way to the crest.

Up to 12,000 feet the climbing was fairly easy. The last 4000 feet was over a steep ice field. The expedition was provided with Dr. Cook's maps and book and endeavored to follow his alleged route, but utterly failed to verify any part of his story.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed advisable in the interests of the Municipality to complete the said purchase.

AND WHEREAS in order to pay for the said waterworks system, including in such purchase price engineering and appraising charges, it is necessary to raise by way of a loan upon the credit of the said District Municipality of Summerland the sum of \$17,500, payable on the fifth day of May, 1940, bearing interest in the meantime payable half yearly at the rate of five per cent. per annum.

AND WHEREAS for the payment of the said principal and interest it is necessary to raise the sum of \$1187.08 by rate in each and every year.

AND WHEREAS the whole rateable property of the District Municipality of Summerland, according to the last revised Assessment roll, is \$1,522,000.

AND WHEREAS the total amount of debenture debt of the said District Municipality of Summerland is \$25,000, of which none of the principal or interest is in arrears.

A By-law to authorize the purchase of the Irrigation System of the Garnett Valley Land Company, Limited.

WHEREAS on the sixth day of April, A.D. 1910, The Garnett Valley Land Company, Limited, by an agreement in writing agreed to sell to the District Municipality of Summerland and the said Municipality agreed to purchase from the Company the latter's entire irrigation system, as defined in the said agreement, designed to supply water to certain lands situate wholly within the boundaries of said Municipality, at and for the price or sum of \$23,000.00, subject, however, to the terms and conditions of the said agreement, which said agreement is in the words and figures following:

Between

THE GARNETT VALLEY LAND COMPANY, LIMITED, a body corporate duly incorporated under the laws of British Columbia, with its registered office at Summerland, hereinafter called the Company,

Of the First Part

And

THE CORPORATION OF THE DISTRICT MUNICIPALITY OF SUMMERLAND in the Province of British Columbia, hereinafter called the Municipality,

Of the Second Part.

WHEREAS the Company is possessed of an irrigation system designed to supply water for irrigation purposes to certain lands situate within the boundaries of the said District Municipality of Summerland and has agreed to sell the same to the Municipality and the Municipality has agreed to purchase it and assume the obligations of such Company to supply water to said lands for the price and subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter mentioned.

NOW THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH that the parties hereto each covenant and agree with the other of them as follows:

1. The Company will sell to the Municipality for the sum of Twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000) and the Municipality will purchase for the said sum from the Company the latter's entire irrigation system designed to supply water for irrigation purposes to lands situate within the corporate limits of said Municipality and comprising:

- (a) All the Company's interest in water records Aeneas Creek and in those applications for licenses now pending for water from the Lakes at the head of said Creek, such records are numbered respectively : 227, 1195, and 1269.
- (b1) All ditches, flumes and pipe lines comprising fifteen and three-tenths (15.3) miles more or less, dam and reservoir at Aeneas Creek, ten acres more or less, and all other the gates, weirs, boxes, tools, stock-on-hand, and other goods and chattels now forming part of the Company's irrigation system designed and constructed to convey a supply of water to said lands for irrigation purposes.
- (b2) Ten (10) acres of land in Garnett Valley including Dam and Site.
- (c) All rights of way and other easements for all purposes necessary in connection with the operation and maintenance of said irrigation system now held, reserved or enjoyed by the Company.
- (d) All agreements heretofore made by the Company with purchasers from them of any lands to which the said water records are appurtenant, for the conveyance of a supply of water to such lands or any of them for irrigation

purposes, and all moneys to become due thereunder for rentals or otherwise with the full benefit and advantage of all covenants and agreements therein contained:

2. The Municipality hereby covenants and agrees to assume the obligations, covenants and agreements of the Company contained in the said water contracts and agrees faithfully to observe and perform the same and, further, the Municipality will indemnify and save harmless the Company from all loss, costs and charges they may suffer or bear by reason of the said water contracts or any of them or any matter or thing therein contained, done or omitted to be done by the Municipality from the time they take over the said irrigation system. Provided that in all water contracts the minimum and maximum rate shall be uniform and shall correspond with the rate charged in other water contracts taken on by the Municipality.

3. The Company hereby agrees to obtain the supply of water required for irrigating such of their irrigable lands as they are still possessed of capable of receiving irrigation by gravity from the said system and shall enter into contracts as soon as they require water for irrigating said lands, with the Municipality on terms and conditions not more onerous than those contained in the contracts heretofore made by them with their sub-purchasers, and the Municipality on their part hereby agree to supply to the Company or their assigns water from the said system to irrigate the said unsold lands or any part thereof and will enter into agreements to do so on the said terms and conditions.

4. The Municipality shall forthwith pass a By-law to ratify and confirm this agreement and after being so passed shall submit it to the Lieutenant Governor in Council for his assent and if such assent is given then the Municipality shall submit such By-law to the electors of the said Municipality for their approval in the same way as a money By-law is submitted for approval.

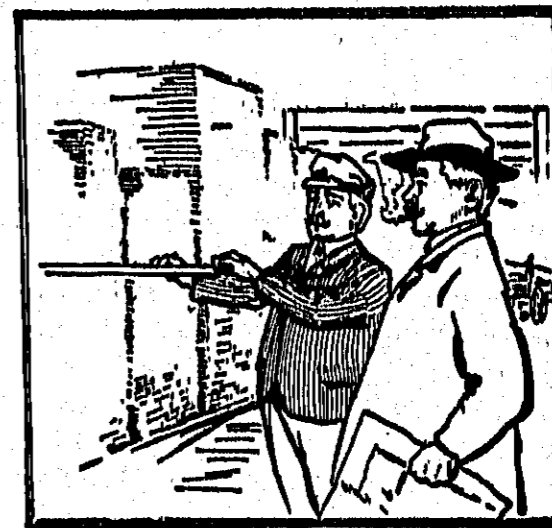

IMPROVING TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

It is expected that the local telephone service will shortly be improved by the installation of a lock-out system. It will meet the difficulty experienced on party lines. In the circulars sent out by the manager to subscribers, the following advantages are noted:

PEACHLAND PEOPLE MOURN.

Sense of Personal Loss Experienced by all in the Calling Hence of Mrs. C. W. Whyte.

The good she has done and the discouraged ones cheered by her will only be known when the mysteries of life shall all be revealed.



A NEW WAY TO CATCH COYOTES.

The Chico Enterprise is the authority for the following method of catching coyotes. If the cat has the prescribed nine lives this way of catching coyotes ought to be a success.

Secure a pole six feet in length and sharpen one end, and place the other in the ground. Make the pole perfectly smooth so that a ring will slide up and down without danger of catching. Over this pole place a ring large enough so it will work easily. To this ring is attached a chain and to this a common house cat. Outside the circumference of the circle which the cat can reach is placed a number of steel traps. These are securely hidden as Mr. Coyote is very suspicious. After these arrangements are perfected the farmer gets on his horse and riding for a mile or more he drops a piece of meat that is attached to his rope and then rides to the pole, dragging the meat after him. He does this in several directions, thus leaving a scent for the coyote to follow. The coyote comes skulking along and follows until he comes in sight of the cat. He at once loses his caution and makes a dash for the cat as this is a special delicacy of Mr. Coyote.

The cat in turn, following its instinct for safety, rushes up the pole. The coyote in his eagerness, races around the pole through the brush until he steps into a trap which immediately closes. To be sure he forgets the cat and hikes through the brush dragging the trap after him to which is attached a chunk of wood. This sooner or later becomes fastened in the brush and the farmer who comes along next morning soon finishes the coyote.

There being no place for the cat to sit upon, as the end of the pole is sharp, it soon comes down and the bait is ready for the next coyote that hits the trail. One man says that five coyotes have been caught in one night that way, and the cat was safe and sound.

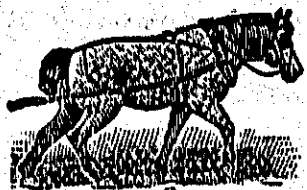

MUNICIPAL MATTERS IN THE LIMELIGHT

RATEPAYERS GAIN INFORMATION UPON LOCAL ISSUES.

In Absence of Reeve, the Municipal clerk gives Lucid Explanation of By-laws and their Objects—
Full Discussion by Public men—Action of Council Fully Endorsed.

The Municipal meeting on Monday evening drew a large crowd of ratepayers to the municipal hall, and the full and frank discussion of public matters did much towards clarifying the municipal atmosphere.

Any disagreements which have apparently arisen, found their origin in a simple lack of comprehension of the terms of agreement and the lack of understanding as to just how much was embodied in the ownership, by the municipality of the various franchises. Finally, a motion was unanimously carried, endorsing the action of the council.

Reeve Agur who had expected to be back in time for the meeting, was unavoidably detained at the coast and Mr. Hector Sutherland was voted to the chair. Mr. J. L. Logie, was then called upon for an explanation of the proposed by-laws which he proceeded to do in a very simple and succinct manner. He then took up the question of the water rates which the council proposed charging should the by-laws pass. Some had jumped to the conclusion that the council proposed charging a five dollar rate. That was an erroneous idea. The council could charge a five dollar rate, but only proposed charging the minimum, which was \$2.50.

It was fully believed that that would meet the needs at present. Should the revenue so raised prove inadequate, the deficit would in all probability be met by direct taxation.

In connection with the sale of the debentures of the municipality, the council had

met with gratifying success. The first offer received was 98c., on the dollar, which was not considered enough. Eventually an offer of 99c. was received and there was little doubt but that the council would finally secure 99 1-2c., on the dollar, which was an exceptionally high and satisfactory rate.

There were some who had been inclined to object to the increase in assessment, but this was made necessary in order to increase the borrowing powers of the district, hence the jump of 50 per cent. Even with that jump however, the assessment was still by far the lowest in the Okanagan Valley. The council might have taken another course and have placed a tax on improvements, but it seemed to him a poor policy to place the heaviest burden on the man who was patriotic enough to improve and beautify his place, and let the speculator, who hung onto his land, waiting for a rise in values to go scot free. (Applause.)

Opportunity was given to ask questions and a number of queries were propounded as to the rate of taxation and methods of borrowing.

Mr. C. S. Stevens wanted to know whether the money accruing from the sale of debentures would have to come all at once, or whether it would come in a series. If it all came at once, the municipality would have to pay the interest on the unused money and thus lose on the deal.

Mr. Logie explained that the money would all have to come at once, according

to the terms of agreement, and the course was a wise one, as eventualities might occur which would place the money beyond the reach of the municipality a year hence and they might find themselves stranded as a result. The money would be placed to the credit of the municipality on which they would draw the bank interest of 4 per cent. The municipality would have to pay five per cent for the use of the money, which would mean the loss of 1 per cent, and it was well worth it to have the money where it was absolutely sure.

A question was asked as to whether it was necessary to vote favorably for all the proposed by-laws, or whether some could be voted for, and some against. To this the clerk replied that the by-laws were all separate and the ratepayer could vote for or against as he deemed advisable. It was strongly recommended afterwards, however by Coun. Ritchie and others that all might be supported as it would make no end of trouble if the interests should be divided.

The chairman asked whether any had objections to raise as that was the time.

He had some objections to raise and on Mr. Logie assuming the chair, proceeded to unfold them. He stated that he doubted as to the advisability of so small a municipality assuming such a heavy burden as a debt of \$300,000. Then again, what was to prevent a changing policy? The council in charge at present was all right, but not infallible, and only elected for the current year. Next year might see them all out and in their places, a new set of men and a new policy. Then again, vast sums of money were to be spent, and personally he would like to know a little as to the way in which it was to be laid out.

Mr. G. J. C. White in reply to Mr. Sutherland stated that smaller municipalities had private companies with vested interests worth still more, and if a private company were able to run such a system and pay a dividend at the end of the year, surely the municipality, with no dividends expected, could operate it profitably. (Cheers.)

The query was raised as to plans to be adopted for the extension of the domestic water system. Mr. Logie stated that the engineer's report had called for the increasing of the system to supply 400 users,

and their estimate had been considerably raised by the council in its estimates.

Mr. W. J. Robinson wished to know more of the programme of expenditure, and while approving to the full the taking over of the systems, he considered that the ratepayers had a right to be taken into the confidence of the council and be enlightened as to their programme.

Councillor Ritchie stated that the by-laws laid down expressly what the money was to be expended upon. Two years ago the council had borrowed money, and if the district was gone over, it would be found that dollar for dollar had been received on moneys expended. The present council only lasted for the current year, but so far as this year was concerned, he could assure the people that the same caution would be shown in the future as in the past. With regard to the programme for the year, all that could be done with the irrigation system for the present season was to put what was in existence in as good shape as possible. By the end of the season the water commissioner would be more fully conversant with the system and better qualified to recommend plans for improvements and extensions.

With regard to domestic water, the council would go at the matter at once, and rush the work of laying mains as rapidly as possible. \$20,000 would probably be spent right away and more when needed.

In connection with the electric lighting system, no provision was being made for its extension at present. The council had been approached by the Coteau Power Co., offering to buy the local plant and to provide light at a better rate than the council could expect to supply it.

In speaking of the water rates and feasibility of maintaining the present rate, Mr. Ritchie pointed out that the only safeguard was municipal ownership, as if the companies continued to hold the reins, the rates would certainly rise.

Mr. C. S. Stevens stated that he had been anxious as to the tactics the council would adopt with reference to paying back the moneys borrowed. Many surrounding municipalities had been foolish enough in their borrowing to extend their payments over a period far exceeding the life of the plant and were still paying for defunct systems. He was glad that the term of thirty years had been decided upon in preference to a longer term.

Mr. Logie explained that the difficulty had been met in the estimates and the sums borrowed included the cost of com-

pletely renewing the plant twice during the term.

Mr. Cancellor, Mr. Tait, Mr. Cordy, Mr. Watson and others spoke briefly, heartily approving the action of the council and the course proposed by them. Special emphasis was laid upon the extension of the domestic water system. The whole district needed such a system and all would welcome any agency which would supply the need.

Residents of the Trout Creek district were on hand and anxious to know what the council proposed doing with the little system owned and operated by them.

Coun. Ritchie stated that the council had been waiting to receive a petition from the residents of that section relative to selling the system to the council. He assured them that the council was prepared to take over the system, just as soon as they were willing to sell. The Trout Creek section could not be exempted from the municipal tax required in order to meet the demands which would be made upon the district.

In response to a criticism as to the tardiness manifested in getting water on the land this spring, Coun. Ritchie explained the difficulties which had been met and endeavored to show that the council had been as expeditious as circumstances would permit.

Coun. Brown was called upon for a few remarks. He stated that he had not come prepared to make speeches, but to find out what the people were kicking about.

He had heard that some had kicks to make, but so far they had not been registered. He would like to hear all about it right away.

After further debate, Mr. C. S. Stevens moved, seconded by Mr. C. H. Cordy, That the ratepayers here present heartily endorse the action of the council and call upon all ratepayers to support the bylaws. The resolution carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned.

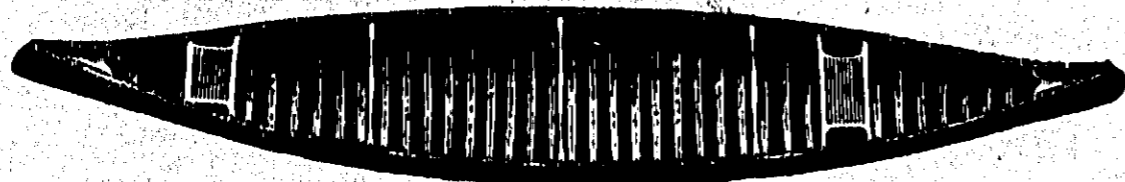

Then comes the question of Summerland's display at the various big exhibitions of the ensuing season, and fostering and providing the requisite amount of fine fruit.

The question of completing the tree census, and the labor question must also receive consideration.

The meeting will be a very important one and no man whose interests are centered Summerland can afford to stay away.

POULTRY FANCIERS ORGANIZE.

At a meeting held in the Council Chamber last week it was decided to organize a poultry association. Mr. Borton was moved to the chair and a discussion as to whether it was advisable to organize now or later was entered into. There were so many arguments in favor of starting in at once that a motion to that effect was presented and carried. It was then decided that the principal object of the association should be the attending to the commercial side, and while the fanciers' claims were to receive a secondary consideration, they would not be entirely disregarded.

Mr. G. Parker was appointed president, and Mr. Walter M. Wright secretary. Mr. Parker then took the chair and called for the appointment of officers.

Mr. Fulton was appointed treasurer and Mr. Simpson vice president. A membership committee was then appointed and a membership fee of one dollar was decided upon. The executive committee were to present a set of rules for the sanction of the members at the next meeting.

In order to see if there are enough eggs marketed so that it would pay the Association to appoint an agent to locate and ship the eggs produced in Summerland it was decided that the secretary should try to get a sort of census of the poultry in the Municipality.

Any who have poultry or eggs, even in small quantities, to dispose of, will be helping themselves to a good thing if they will fill out the questions below and mail them to the secretary, Walter M. Wright, even though they do not join the Association. The members who have already joined are requested to answer these questions also.

1. How many eggs would you have to sell weekly if a good market was provided?
2. How many chicks will you likely have for market this fall?
3. What breeds have you?
4. How many of each breed?
5. How many laying hens do you intend to keep this winter?
6. When will your earliest chicks be ready to market?

TO HOBBLE THE OCTOPUS.

Whatever boards of trade may say and however plethoric capitalists may shout and gesticulate in frantic disapproval, we are sure the common people of Canada will be glad to hear that Mr. King's bill in the House of Commons designed to scotch the trust octopus, passed its second reading last week.

Of course the bill met with opposition and there were the usual remarks about hasty legislation, legislative interference with private rights and vested interests and all that sort of twaddle. That's the way capital always goes on when attention is suddenly focussed on its questionable doings. It develops an amazing concern for the welfare of the country all at once. For of course the country would go to smash if profane hands were allowed to touch the altars of Mammon. And so, as the cray fish eludes its pursuers in the blackness of the inky fluid it exudes, the piratical capitalists make off with the swag just as usual in the outcry as to what might happen to the industries of Canada.

All this talk about blue ruin befalling Canada if her government should turn the searchlight on what great capitalists are doing is idle nonsense. Its purpose is to befog, befuddle and alarm. All bandits scare off intruders when they are sitting on a job, of course. We expect that, so do national bandits.

But the question is, should they be allowed to go on looting? We take it that is the question Mr. King's bill is concerned with. Canada has many and great prizes for the financial buccaneers of our day. Formerly they sailed alone. Now they

combine their forces. Every day they grow stronger. Like evil, all they want just now is to be let alone. But if we let them alone. Soon the pack of sea wolves will be strong enough to dictate terms to the government, and then liberty will be a jest. The most patent liberty we shall possess, will be the liberty to work in the interests of the financial idols we have made.

The governments of the United States are to-day so many Laocoons, all but helpless in the grip of the serpents they have fostered.

A like fate must overtake Canada unless something is done while yet the government may, to limit the rapacity of our capitalistic combinations.

We are not condemning the capitalists as men. They are men of brains. They play the game and they play to win, pretty much as every other man is playing it. The difference lies in the fact that the massing of capital in the hands of a few gives them both power and opportunity to exploit the public to their own advantage unjustly. Every citizen has a right to a certain portion of the wealth of Canada; but this massing of capital enables ten men to appropriate what belongs to a million. It is said there is one man in Canada who is a director on the boards of thirteen of the largest corporations in this country. Twelve or fifteen others form the bulk of the directorate of these powerful institutions, now fast growing so strong that they can get pretty well whatever they go after, particularly if the claims of one are backed up by all, as they are apt to be at times.

Money is power. So long as the government owns the wealth of Canada it may rule. Let corporations get the money and they will rule both parliament and people.

When the bulk of the lands of ancient Rome passed into the hands of 1800 men, Rome died. History repeats itself. Let us beware. Let us not get frightened, capital is said to be timid. We know it to be voracious; but we know also that it will never be timid so long as dividends of 8 or 10 per cent are in sight. And that we are prepared to concede. It's the 100 per cent dividend that kills. Wherefore we applaud Mr. King's timely effort to hobble the octopus and commend his sagacity in refusing to allow the responsibility of action to be shifted from the members generally, to that institution of the House which exists for the purpose of stifling or emasculating obnoxious bills, viz., the special committee.

ENTERTAINMENT AT NARAMATA.

At Naramata on Thursday evening a very unique and original mode of amusement provided splendid entertainment for about 175 people.

The ladies of the Unity Club and men of Athletic Club each providing seven items.

The ladies were escorted from the home of Mrs. Gillespie by the gentlemen in a torchlight procession, led by the Naramata band. Arrived at the hall, the entertainment proceeded without delay, and a spelling competition was first on the programme and the ladies won out. The Unity Club then commenced their part of the programme, Mrs. Gillespie acting in the chair. The curtain was drawn aside and the ladies were found to be assembled in the lodge room of the "Silent Workers," having met in solemn burlesque at their annual festival, forgetting their motto, of course, and making as much noise as it is possible for a crowd of about 30 ladies to make, each doing her level best.

SUPT. KILPATRICK TELLS OF ADDITION TO
C.P.R. PLANT.

**\$38,000 to be Expended at the Waterfront on
Cold Storage Plant and other Shipping
Facilities. Site Selected not
Quite Large Enough.**

A cold storage plant, including packing house, also a wharf and slips will be under construction in Summerland in the course of a couple of weeks, according to Mr. T. Kilpatrick, Superintendent of this division of the C.P.R., calling for an expenditure of \$38,000.

Thursday evening's boat brought into Summerland, Mr. Kilpatrick, also Mr. A. W. Lee of Vancouver, Supt. of the Dominion Express Co. and Mr. J. P. Forde, resident engineer at Revelstoke. Officials of the company had been on the field a couple of days previous taking the necessary levels and staking out the site for the proposed improvements. Their task was not a particularly enjoyable one as a considerable portion of their work was accomplished waist deep in the Okanagan.

The contract for the cold storage plant has been let to a coast firm, and it will be built on the west side of the road, below the Anderson house. The wharves and slips will be located in the vicinity of the old hay wharf.

On going over the ground, the surveyors found that the land which had been granted for the proposed works was inadequate for the plans and on Friday morning the officials held a meeting with the municipal council, seeking a larger land area for their purposes. Although the result of the meeting was not available before going to press there is little doubt but that the difficulty will be satisfactorily met.

The Baptist church services at the Front will be held until further notice in Elliott's hall at the foot of Shaughnessy avenue. The services on Sunday will be conducted by Rev. Mr. Freeman of Revelstoke.

The prospects for the season's fruit crop were never better. The apricot trees are in full bloom and present charming pictures. Peach trees in the more sheltered orchards are also in blossom. If nothing untoward occurs, Summerland will this year produce a fruit crop such as will make the outside world sit up and take notice.

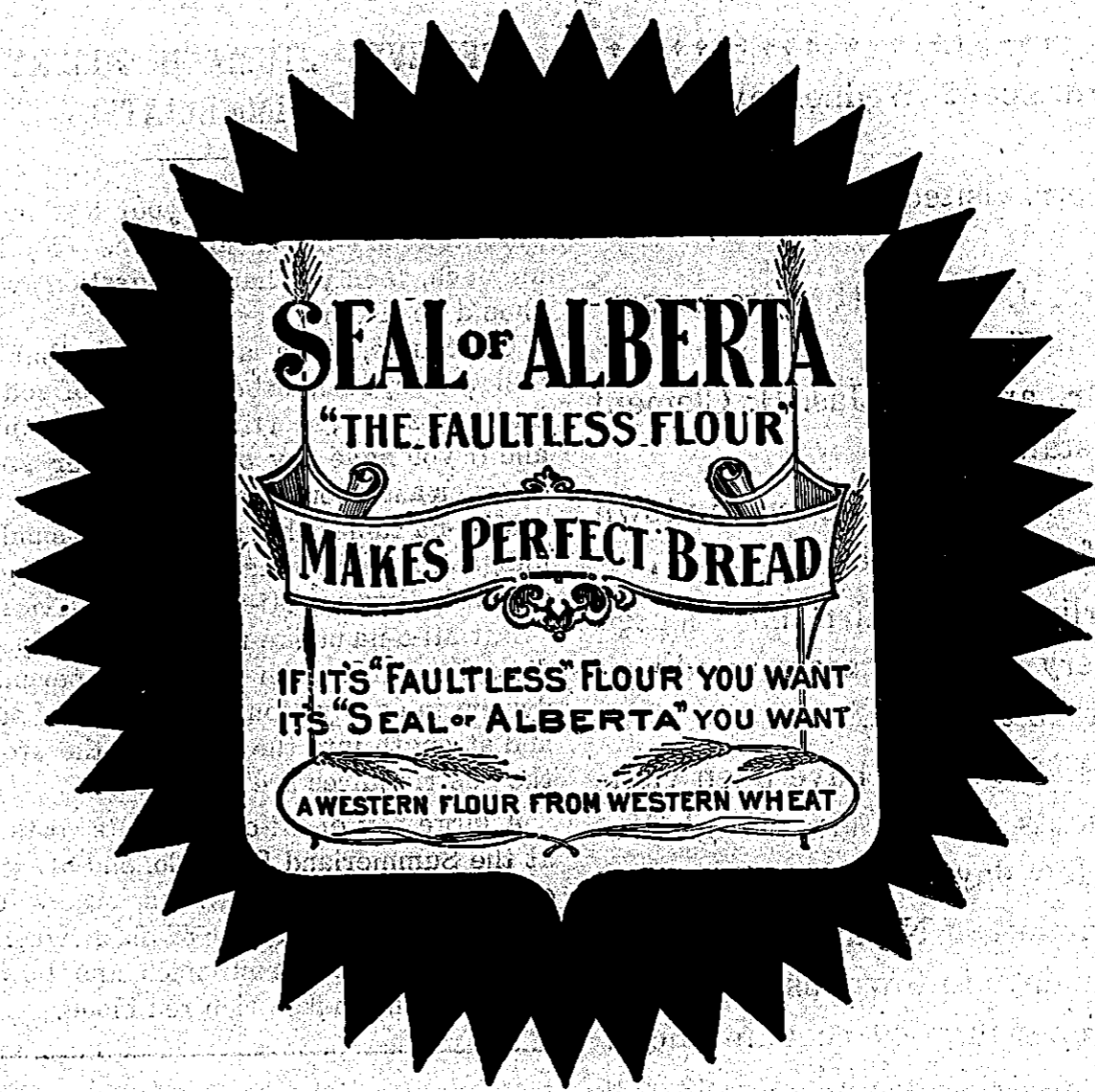

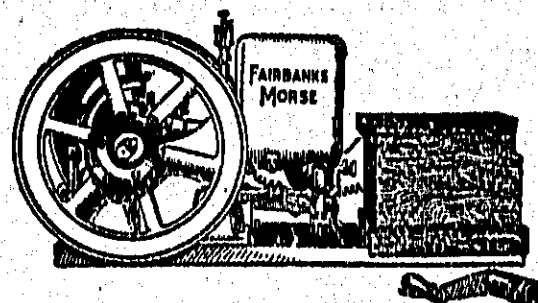

FRUIT CANNERY IS NOW A NECESSITY

Board of Trade Decides That Summerland Must Have Facilities for Using up Ripe Fruit--Com- mittees Appointed to See the People and Report on Monday Next.

The quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade was held in Municipal Hall on Tuesday evening with a fair representation present. The meeting was carried on in a delightfully informal, go-as-you-please manner, and in spite of the occasional efforts of the chairman to keep the debaters to the subject on hand, the controversy went around in a circle before it got fairly started.

The evening however was a profitable one in spite of its undue length, and steps were taken to get in touch with Mr. Frier, editor of the Colonizer, at Montreal when he lands there with his "personally conducted" party of Englishmen with whom he is to travel through and unfold the desirabilities of B. C., in order that the number of the party might be ascertained and proper preparations made for their entertainment when they reach Summerland on the 23rd and 24th of May. The question around which the greatest interest centered, however, was that of securing a cannery for Summerland.

At the beginning of the meeting Mr. R. H. Clouston was voted to the chair, and the secretary was called upon for the minutes of the previous meeting which were read and approved. Arising out of the minutes was a notice of motion by the secretary to alter the by-laws so as to change the number forming a quorum from 10 to 7. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mellor, and finally carried. There was a large sheaf of correspondence and the following new members were proposed and on motion of Messrs. Cordy and Stark, were admitted to membership on the board. Messrs. Fetherstonhaugh, McLaine, Cooper, Bentley, White, Thomson, Craig, J. R. Watson, Downton and Brown.

The correspondence between the secretary and Mr. Frier, the editor of the Colonizer was freely discussed, and finally it was moved and seconded by Messrs. White and Logie—that the matter be left in the hands of the executive with power to appoint committees to handle the matter. Carried.

The question of fruit exhibits was brought up by the secretary, but the meeting did not seem to be in a fruit exhibit humor, and sidetracked the issue, expressing the opinion that the matter was more under the jurisdiction of the Agricultural Society than the Board of Trade.

In connection with the fruit tree census the secretary stated that the returns were far from complete and urged that steps might be taken to get the returns completed. One of the members of the board said that he was not at all surprised at that as it would take a Philadelphia lawyer to do it properly in a number of cases as many of the people who had bought orchards already planted would find it impossible to comply with the demands of the census. It was decided however to urge upon the people the advisability of filling in the census as accurately as possible.

The desirability of placing fruit exhibits before the people of the prairies this season and the question of pickers occupied some time and it was decided to take matter up with Mr. Samson at as early a date as possible.

The question around which the greatest interest of the evening centered however was that of a fruit cannery. There were roseat prospects for an abundant harvest this year, and pack it as fast as might be, there would still be a vast amount of

over ripe fruit, which, unless a cannery were placed in the district, would be a total loss. The time had apparently come when such an institution was a necessity. The past history of the cannery situation was gone into and compared with conditions to-day. At first it was considered impossible that at this late hour a cannery proposition could be swung for this season. But the more it was discussed, the more hopeful the debaters seemed to become until at last they got into the "where there's a will, there's a way" spirit. The first idea of building a large and expensively equipped cannery was modified, and it was decided to make a brave attempt to float such an enterprise and float it quickly. With this end in view the district was divided into sections, and the following gentlemen were appointed to canvas the situation and report on Monday evening next:

North—Messrs. Sutherland, Mellor.

The Flat—Messrs. Watson, Ritchie.

Prairie Valley—Messrs. Tait, Craig.

Peach Valley—Mr. Clouston.

Garnett Valley—Messrs. Bartholomew and Theede.

South—Messrs. Hayes and White.

The Front—Messrs. Stark and McWilliams.

The meeting then adjourned.

GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION.

The effective remedy for graft evil in cities is government by commission. It is not only a remedy for the graft evil, but it is generally a remedy for the evils born of ignorance and incompetence. Many a corporation has lost heavily because a set of well meaning but inexperienced men have had charge of the city's affairs.

The new system does away with all that. By it the town is regarded as a great industrial or distributive concern with various departments be to run on such business lines as will give the highest degree of efficiency with the lowest rate of cost in each. The heads of the departments are elected by the people and paid a salary by the people. Each man, according to the type of commission government in vogue in Galveston, Texas, has absolute legislative and executive powers in his own department. He makes by-laws and engages men and discharges them without interference. He is responsible to no one till his term of office expires, then his tenure of office is judged by the electors. If they are satisfied with his conduct of the business of his department, they elect him again. If not, he loses his job—a consideration which helps to keep him straight while in office.

Up-to-date this system has been found a great improvement on the old methods, probably because a cleaner class of men has been chosen. Men who have made and held reputations for commercial integrity and ability would naturally be less open to corruption than the brood of ward heelers bred by saloon politics. Yet in the Galveston system there would be nothing to prevent these men going bad,

to the city's detriment, since once in it is hard to get them out before the set time. The difficulty is the same as that which marks the difference between our constitution and that of the United States. Once in, a Congressman cannot be dislodged for four years without impeachment, but a Canadian government may have to go any time. All the house has to do is to pass a vote of want of confidence.

This weakness in the commission form of civic government has elsewhere been remedied by taking hints from the two most progressive governments in the world, those of Switzerland and New Zealand, in Iowa and South Dakota. e.g., a by-law cannot go into effect for twenty days after publication by the commissioner. If during that time, 15 per cent of the ratepayers protest against it, the law must be submitted to the people. In the same way the commissioner may be brought up before the people at any time, and they even go further, and permit legislation to emanate directly from the people in the same way. Thus the commissioner is as immediately responsible to the ratepayers as a department head is to the superintendent of the board of directors of his company.

This system of government has been found to work admirably. Clean men and prominent now feel they can render public service without defilement and are taking hold. The dirty fangs of the saloon have been shaken off at last. Cities that were bled white, and going behind financially and every other way are now able to reduce their tax rates. Law and order are being restored. Undesirables have been cleaned out and hoodlums and grafters by the score have had to go to work for their living like honest people.

Yet, though all this is true more or less in sixty cities of the neighboring republic, it's dollars to doughnuts it will take us fifteen years in Canada to wake up to a proposition which is so obvious that the mere presentation of it should be enough without the collateral of experience referred to in the foregoing.

As yet it is in the urban communities the new government is found, but the time is coming when in rural municipalities, some form of the same will be in operation. Meanwhile our council labors on with its little business involving a quarter of a million or so, just as conscientiously as if they were paid a high salary for neglecting their own private affairs to do it.

WANTED---A FRUIT CANNERY.

One of the wisest lines along which the activities of the Board of Trade have been directed for a long time is that which arose out of the recent quarterly meeting—that of the erection and operation of a fruit cannery.

When the project was first talked of a year or so ago, the need was not nearly so great as it is to-day, and there was a great diversity of opinion as to where a cannery should be located. Apart from that, unforeseen circumstances arose which sidetracked the issue.

The time has now arrived however when Summerland must have a cannery or lose vast sums of money in over-ripe, and therefore unshippable fruit, and unless the growers of the district want to have the pain of seeing their luscious peaches, apricots, plums, etc., lying rotting on the ground, they will have to decide very quickly what they will say to the canvassers when they call upon them and invite their co-operation in a cannery project. It is possible that plans may be formulated whereby those who have not the money, may be enabled to give their season's ripe fruit in exchange for stock.

It has been suggested since the meeting of Tuesday last, that the cannery should be coupled with a jam factory, and there is no reason why that should not be, as the extra plant required would not cost very much.

The cannery must come, and if it can be run as a company, with the people of the district as shareholder, there is no reason why it should not be a profitable investment.

It is sincerely hoped that the meeting of Monday evening may be as largely attended as possible and that pledges received might be so considerable as to warrant proceeding with the project at once. However, whatever is done must be done with remarkable despatch if the plant is to meet the needs of the coming season.

Now is the time to act and to act quickly.

The fire of Wednesday evening demonstrated in no uncertain way the need of a fire hydrant in the vicinity of English's stable. As it was on Wednesday evening, only one line of hose could be brought into play upon the flames. The brigade was on the ground very promptly after the alarm was given, but even when first noticed the fire was beyond control.

NEW WORKSHOPS GO UP IN SMOKE

MESSRS. SHIELDS & HATFIELD'S WORKSHOPS
AND PLANT A TOTAL LOSS.

Fire Started at Midnight From an Unknown Cause
---Mr. Ed. Garnett Turned in Alarm--Prompt
Assistance Given---No Insurance.

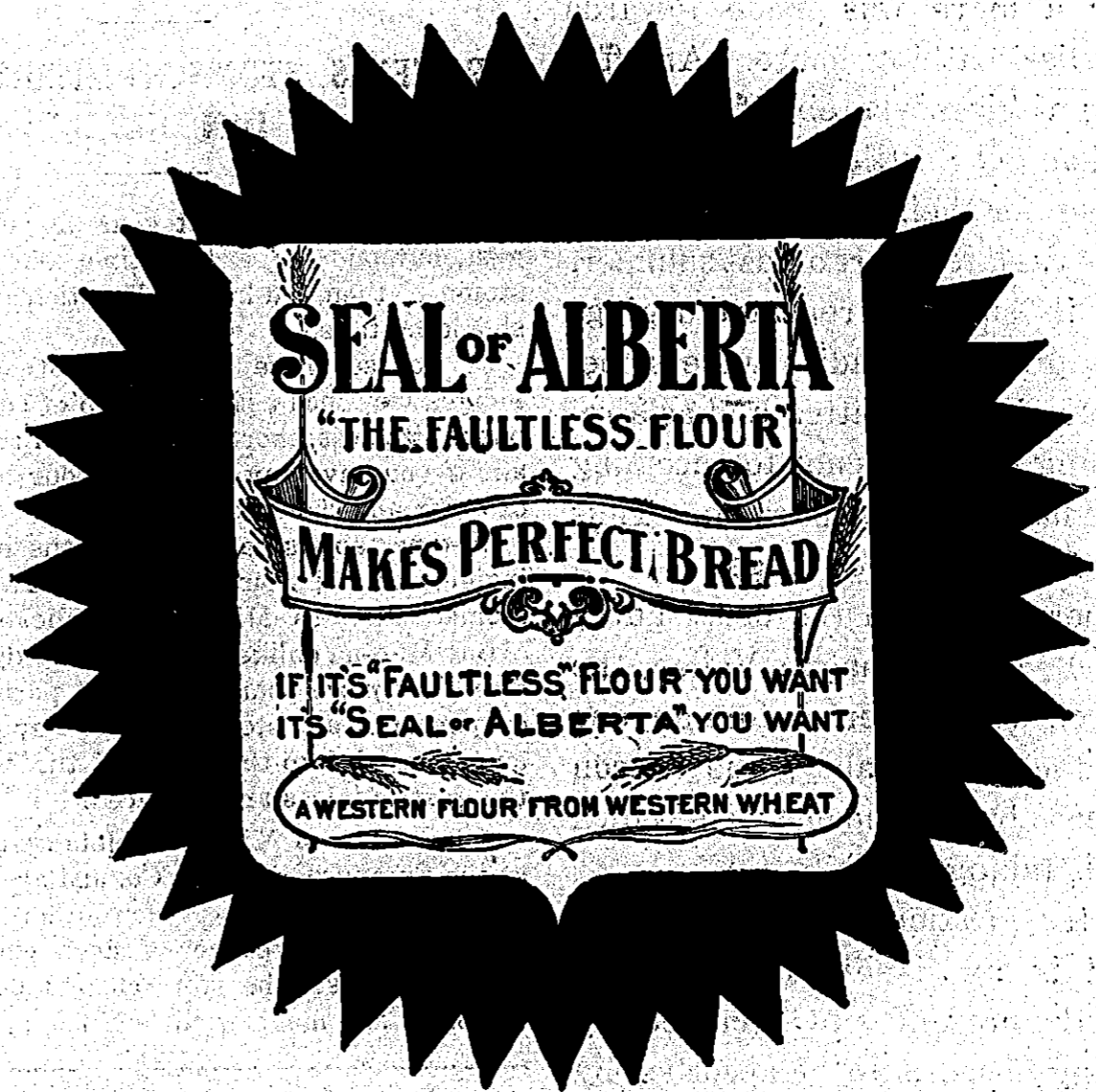
On Thursday morning all that was left of Messrs. Shields & Hatfield's blacksmith and woodwork shops was a handful of smouldering ashes. There was no insurance on the building and plant which was valued at about \$3500.00 and the origin of the fire is destined to be numbered among the list of unsolved mysteries.

The first indication of trouble struck the ears of Mrs. Ed. Garnett near 1 a.m., when she was aroused by the crackling and roaring. She aroused her husband who discovered that the shops next door were ablaze. He dressed hurriedly and aroused all the neighbors within call and in an incredibly short time, thanks also to the activity of Mr. Hayes at the telephone office a considerable working force was on hand, and hose reels and hydrants were brought into play.

The fire however had already gotten too much headway and the flames were soon shooting through the roof of the building. Some of the rigs which were outside were hauled away from the fire zone. Everything else was burned to a crisp. All the machinery and tools were a total loss. The building had only been erected and in use about a month. Messrs. Shields & Hatfield are already planning to rebuild.

Mr. Hatfield stated that he was in the shop at 10 p.m. He had felt a little uneasy lest there should be a little too much fire in the forges and had poured several pails of water over the dying embers in order to render them perfectly harmless.

It is a great pity that people who visit their neighbor's houses do not know enough to close gates after them. A man provides a gate and is careful to close it, and with a knowledge of that fact he allows his animals on occasions to run loose. A friend (?) comes along and very thoughtfully leaves the gate open and as a result the animal which is enjoying its liberty makes a break for still more liberty and the owner is out of both time and money. Where there is a gate those passing through should surely have sense enough to close it behind them.

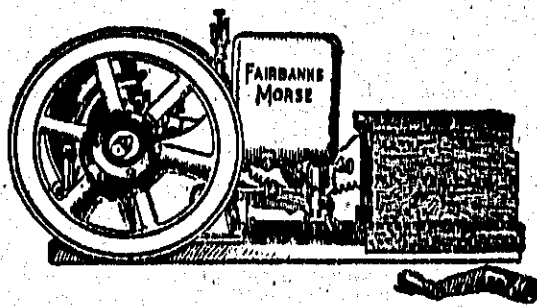
