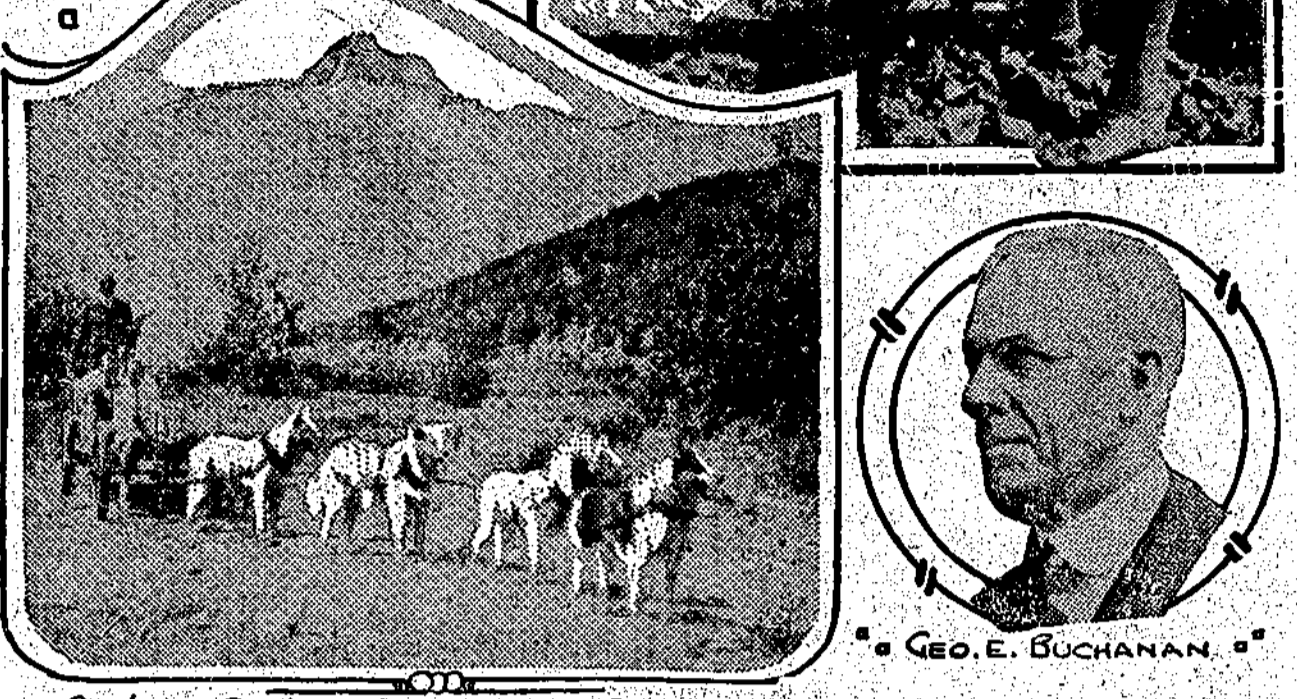

Buchanan's Boys at Lake Atlin, B.C.

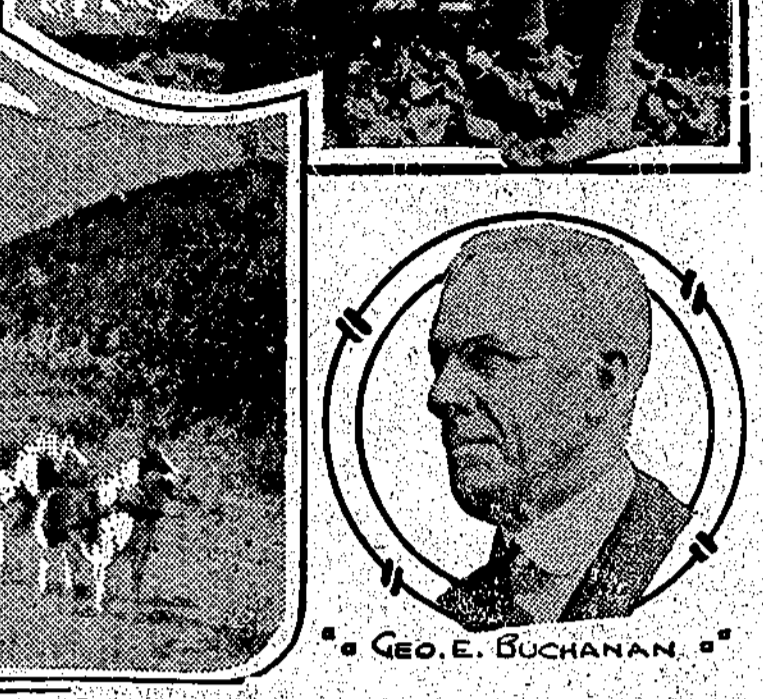


Buchanan drives a dog team.

CANNERY PLANS LARGER PACK THIS SEASON

Big Force Now Operating on Royal Anne Cherries

PEARS WILL ALSO BE PROCESSED THIS YEAR

Big Quantities of Cots and Peaches Are in Sight

Penticton - The local cannery is now in full operation for this season, it having been made yesterday on Royal Anne cherries.

The cannery last year put up about 500 tons of fruit and this year may possibly exceed that quantity by 50 per cent.

It will run heavily this season on apricots and peaches. Last year, plums and prunes were given considerable attention. Pears will also be canned this year. Many favorable comments have been heard on the local cannery's pear pack of 1928 which was particularly nice.

Manager Hughes states that the cannery is at present employing about 75 female workers, with 15 men. This force employed throughout the coming season will mean a substantial payroll for the town during the summer, probably well ahead of last season's, which was regarded by the business men as very satisfactory for the community.

The cannery recently installed automatic machines for the delivery to the packers of cans for the fruit and for taking the packed cans away on belts to the heating chests and sealing machine. This new

equipment is of great advantage in speeding up operations.

The Co-op is employing between thirty and forty girl packers at present on fresh fruit shipments of cherries, and a considerable male staff is also on the payroll. Other packing houses are using quite a number of packers.

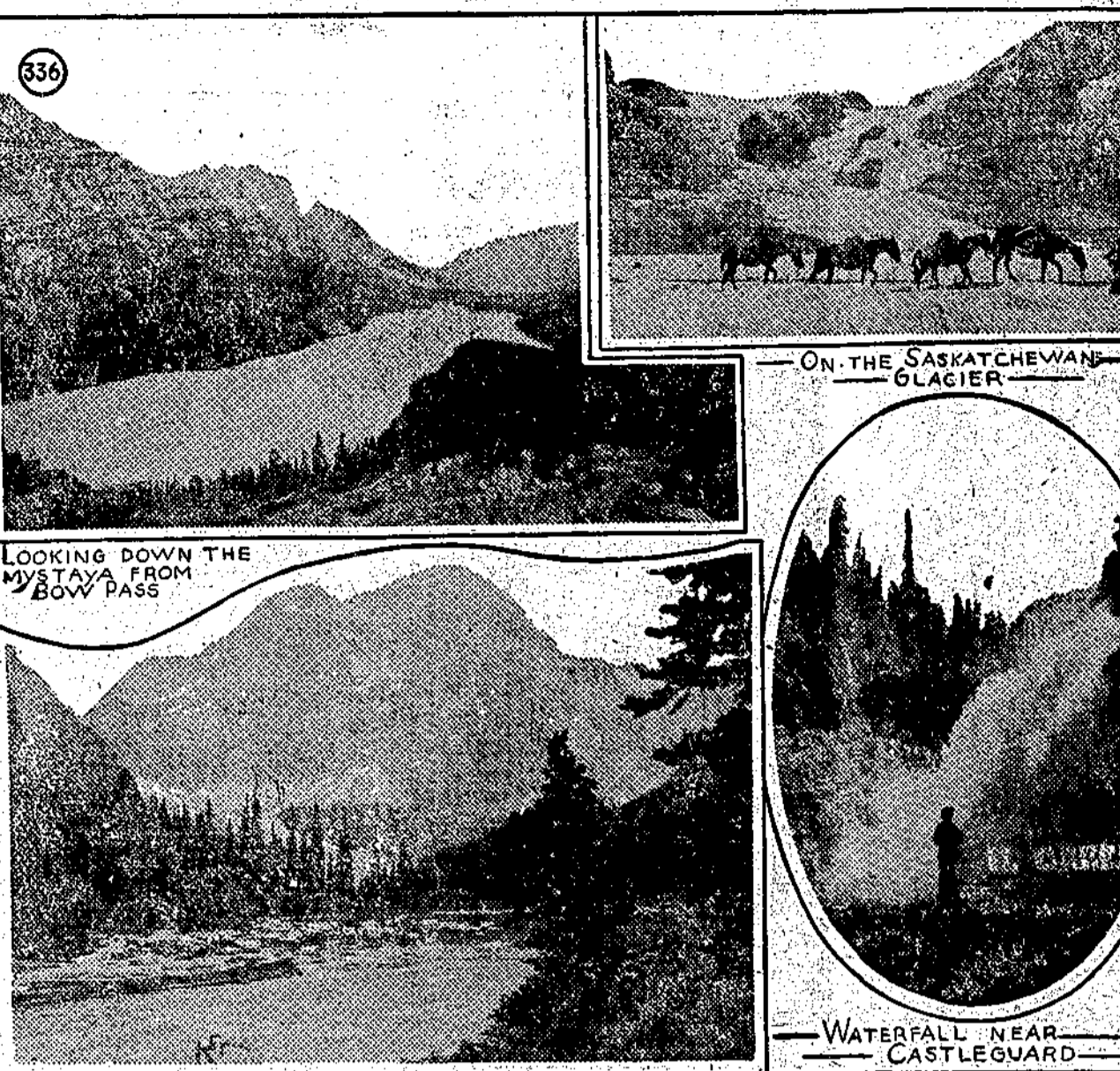

DROUGHT CUTS DOWN GRAIN YIELD IN PRAIRIE AREAS

Canadian Crop Report No. 6 July 18.—Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the head office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches.

General. The general grain crops throughout the prairie provinces with the exception of Southern Alberta and northern and southwestern areas in Saskatchewan, have been badly damaged through drought and there seems little doubt that the West will harvest crops that will be much below the average.

Alberta: Western area.—In the north, prospects are fairly good and in the south, excellent, but in the central portion crops will have a small yield even on summerfallow and breaking. Northeastern area.—Recent rains were too late to benefit any grain other than well prepared summerfallow and breaking.

Province of Quebec. Hay cutting is becoming general, and the promise is for an above average yield of good quality. Grain and root crops have improved splendidly and look well. Pastures are in very good condition. Small fruits are plentiful.

Province of Ontario. Fall wheat continues to ripen fast, and a good average crop is predicted. Oat and barley heads are filling well and the yield will probably be average. Corn should be a satisfactory yield. Early potatoes are very good. Mangolds, turnips and growing well. Sugar beets will be somewhat below an average crop. Apples promise to be better than average and small fruits are doing well.

Province of British Columbia. Weather conditions generally are favorable, though rain is needed in some districts. Hay is practically completed, a heavy crop has been harvested in good condition. Early potatoes are being shipped and all root crops are doing well. Pasturage is abundant. Raspberries have improved, and the crop now being picked should yield 60 per cent. of average. Apples and pears give promise of 90 per cent. of average; peaches, plums, prunes and apricots, 80; cherries, 85.

Winnipeg

Business has been very good during the past week; the weather has been very warm with little rain. A part car of B.C. raspberries arrived yesterday morning and was a little bit soft. The trade here has also received several cars of B.C. cherries, which arrived in good condition, and are now pretty well cleaned up.

Edmonton

Business has been good during the week, but there is little to report of outstanding interest. Strawberry arrivals are dwindling and the most part are of excellent quality and in good condition. Some are arriving much too green, but the larger proportions are arriving in the proper state of maturity, firm-ripe to ripe, just nicely colored, but not soft.

Medicine Hat

Unfortunately the weather here in the last week has been extremely hot. The thermometer has registered over 100 in the shade and the crops have been damaged considerably. It is to be hoped that we get some rain soon which will ensure plenty of feed at any rate and possibly a 50% crop.

The Cost of Carelessness

Attention is again called to loss sustained each season by the fruit and vegetable industry by reason of carelessness in the packing of produce. The quality has been excellent, but here and there the careless packer has been in evidence. The packing house manager should be given a free hand to weed out the inferior produce.

REGINA. The weather continues very dry and warm. Reports of crop conditions covering the southern portion of the province are rather discouraging, but the northern portion has had considerable rain and the outlook is much brighter.

B.C. growers who have suitably sized fruit would be well advised to market it at once as the price drops very quickly once the deal is opened.
