

#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A recent article in the Penticton Herald "Small museums do local best" by the Manager and Curator of the Penticton Museum and Archives sums up very well, the importance of small, local community museums.

"Every small community museum exists because a unique community grew up around it. That museum is there to interpret that community's history and none other. No one else will collect and preserve the artifacts, tell the stories, and put together the exhibits that tell the story of your town."



The heart of any local museum is community support combined with a hard-working staff and the many hours which are contributed by volunteers and museum boards. At this time all local community museums in British Columbia face similar challenges with regard to ongoing funding for museum operations, artifact maintenance, inflationary pressures, and volunteer and board member attrition.

In order to successfully maintain and grow the museum and its mandate to preserve and promote Summerland's unique shared heritage, our board has identified three current priorities;

- 1. We need at least three new directors to augment our board by the time of our AGM in April, 2023.
- 2. We need to ensure we have sufficient operating funds for the coming fiscal year.
- 3. We continue to focus on securing sufficient funds for our renovation and expansion plans for additional gallery space, secure storage, improved working conditions, and an enhanced visitor experience.

We are working hard on these priorities, while at the same time ensuring a high standard of service to the Summerland community through our spring and summer programs (see pages 4 and 5 for more info).

We look forward to welcoming you to the museum and hope to see you at some of the exciting upcoming events we have planned.



This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Okanagan Mountain Park Fire, an event that changed how many of us perceive our safety and the extent to which we have control (or don't) of the natural world around us. This exhibit will open on Saturday, July 1st 2023 and be on view for the remainder of the year.

#### Don't miss our current temporary exhibit!

Doreen Tait (1921-2006) was a longtime Summerland resident and the daughter of pioneers Magnus and Alice Tait.

Doreen began collecting art as a young adult in the mid-1950s. She would later say "There are so many people in Summerland who are damned good artists . . . I thought, Summerland should have an art collection – for generations to come."

Doreen Tait bequeathed her art collection to the Summerland Museum after her passing in 2006.

Artists featured are Irvine Adams, Michael Beulah, Robert Brinton, Bruce Crawford, Marjorie Croil, Jack Davis, Les Hill, Mollie Hunter, Irene Scott, and Percy Thornber.

#### **Growing Community Access to Heritage**

Our artifact digitization project is ongoing with artifacts being photographed each week. Many of these items have never been photographed before -or, if they have, the photo on file was of poor quality. Having photos of our collections items greatly helps our staff and volunteers identify, locate, study, and exhibit artifacts. Later this year we will be moving on to the next phase of our project, which includes integrating a public and searchable artifact database onto our website (much like our online photo database). 

#### PRO-D DAY CAMP


#### Monday 24th April, 9am-3pm
